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With A Very Colorful History...

After three unsuccessful attempts to establish a school, Dr. William H. Holtzclaw made a fourth attempt which was a success. The Utica Normal and Industrial Institute was established on March 19, 1903. For forty years the school was guided by the genius of its founder and was supported entirely by gifts from friends.

In 1946, the school was donated to Hinds County and became Hinds County Colored Agriculfure High School. The school grew from one of sixteen faculty members and three hundred students, to one with forty faculty members and eight hundred students.

In its regular monthly meeting in July, 1954, The Board of Trustees of The Utica Institute authorized plans to proceed with the organization of a Junior College program. In a special session of the Legislature in December, 1954, the State Legislature gave its approval and the Utica Institute Junior College was founded.

In July of 1958, the Board of Trustees again gave approval to the changing of the name of the school and it was officially changed to Utica Junior College.




THE REGISTRATION LINE in Ginn Hall. Seems as if the sophomores made the freshmen bring up the rear.

When "The War March of The Priests" is played in May, forty from the College Department and ninty from high school will receive diplomas. This is a far cry from the fourteen that graduated four years ago.




THE GRADUATING CLASS OF LAST YEAR IN FOR THE LAST TIME.



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

The demand for Zoology and other advance courses has been so great, until these courses will be offered this fall for the first time.





English



The productions of both groups were rated very highly last year. The High School received the second place trophy in the Big "8" tournament.







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






HIGH SCHOOL BOYS TEAM
