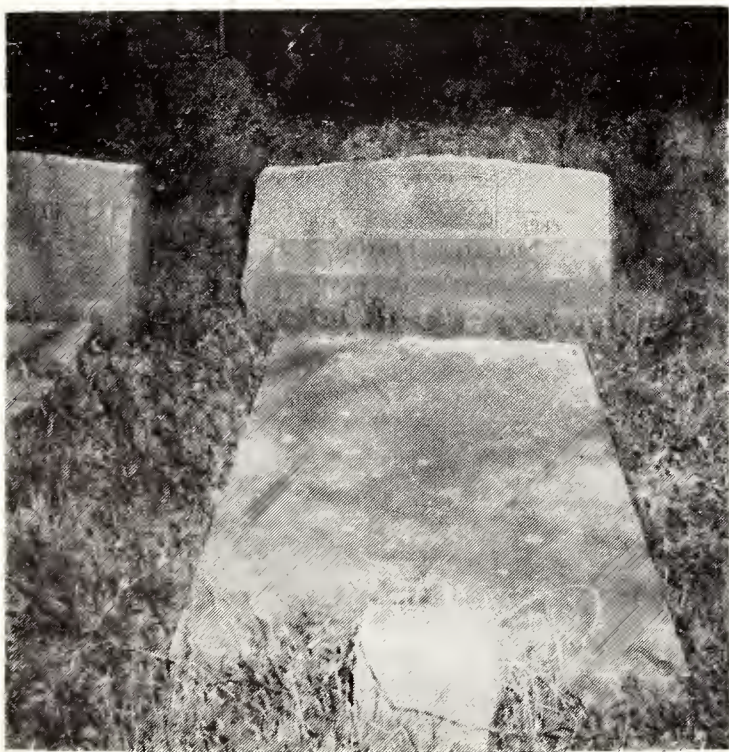
With A Very Colorful History...

After three unsuccessful attempts to establish a school, Dr. William H. Holtzclaw made a fourth attempt which was a success. The Utica Normal and Industrial Institute was established on March 19, 1903. For forty years the school was guided by the genius of its founder and was supported entirely by gifts from friends.

In 1946, the school was donated to Hinds County and became Hinds County Colored Agriculture High School. The school grew from one of sixteen faculty members and three hundred students, to one with forty faculty members and eight hundred students.

In its regular monthly meeting in July, 1954, The Board of Trustees of The Utica Institute authorized plans to proceed with the organization of a Junior College program. In a special session of the Legislature in December, 1954, the State Legislature gave its approval and the Utica Institute Junior College was founded.

In July of 1958, the Board of Trustees again gave approval to the changing of the name of the school and it was officially changed to Utica Junior College.

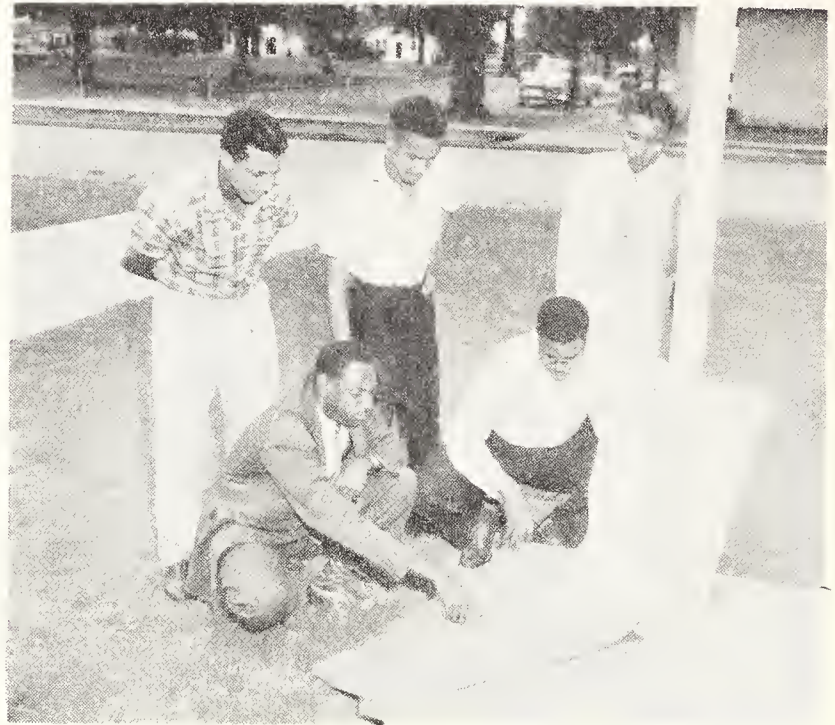

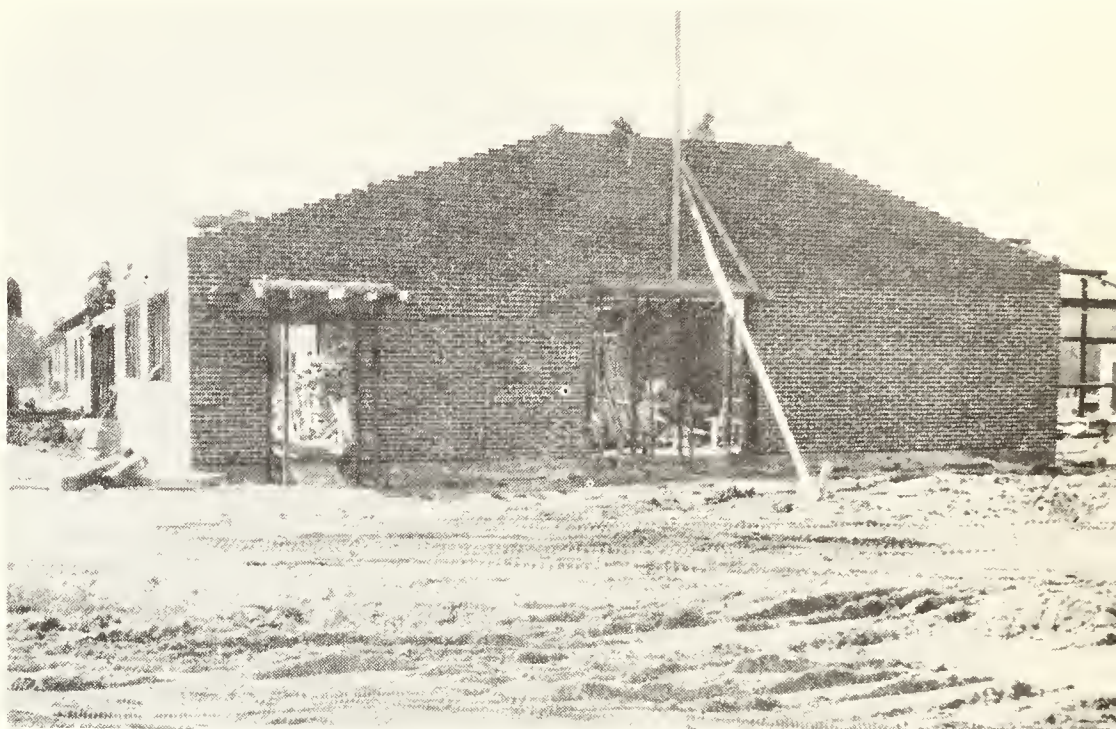

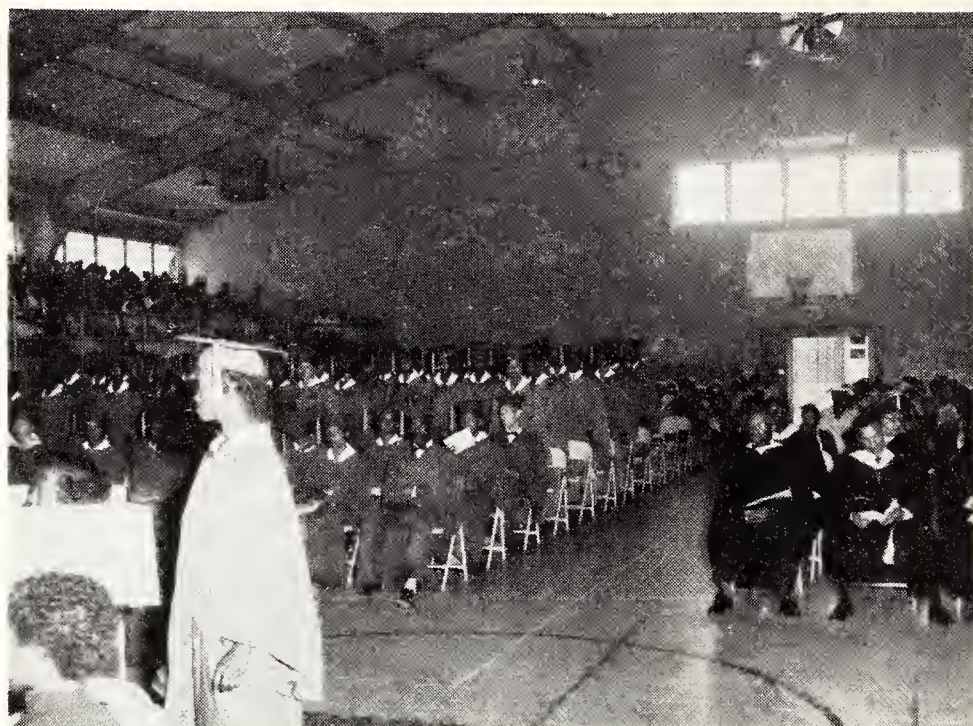

There are four sections of beginning typing, four sections of beginning shorthand and one college section of Introduction to Business in the department this year.

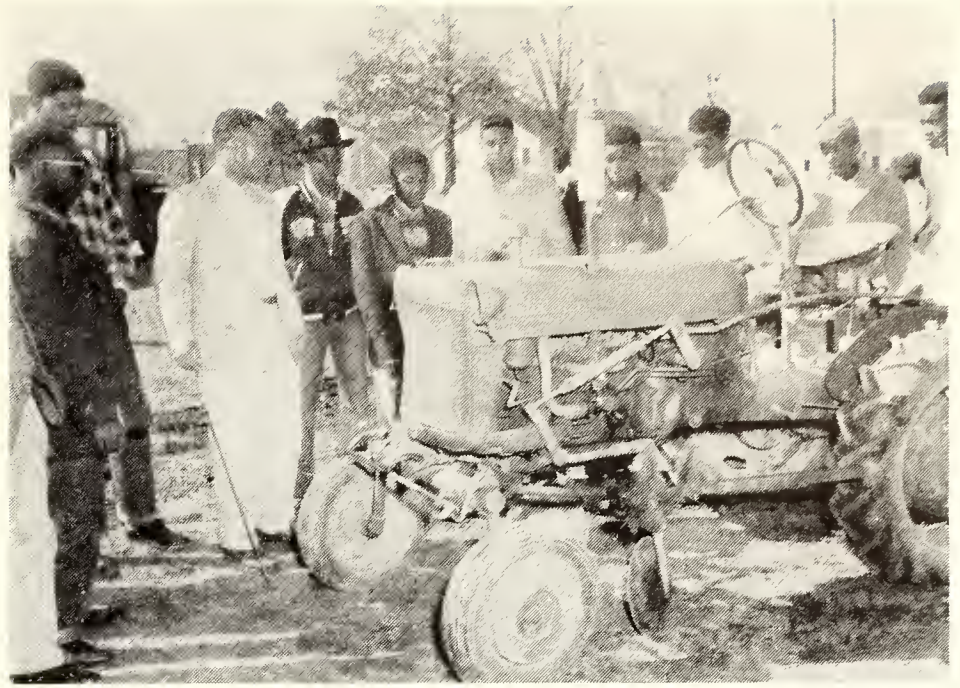
When the new terminal building is completed the Business Department will move to this building and the many students who desire to participate in this department can find accommodations.



Agriculture

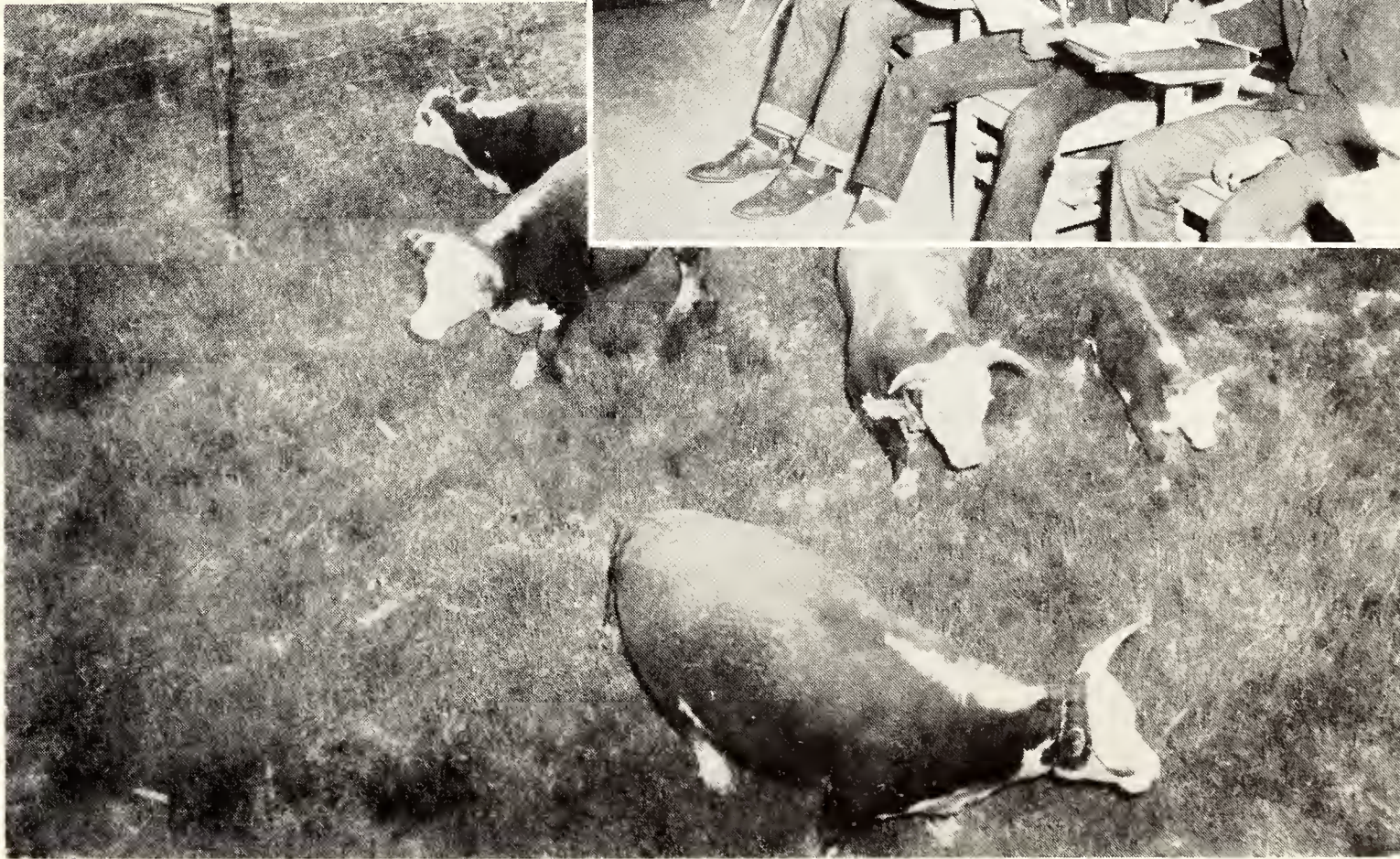
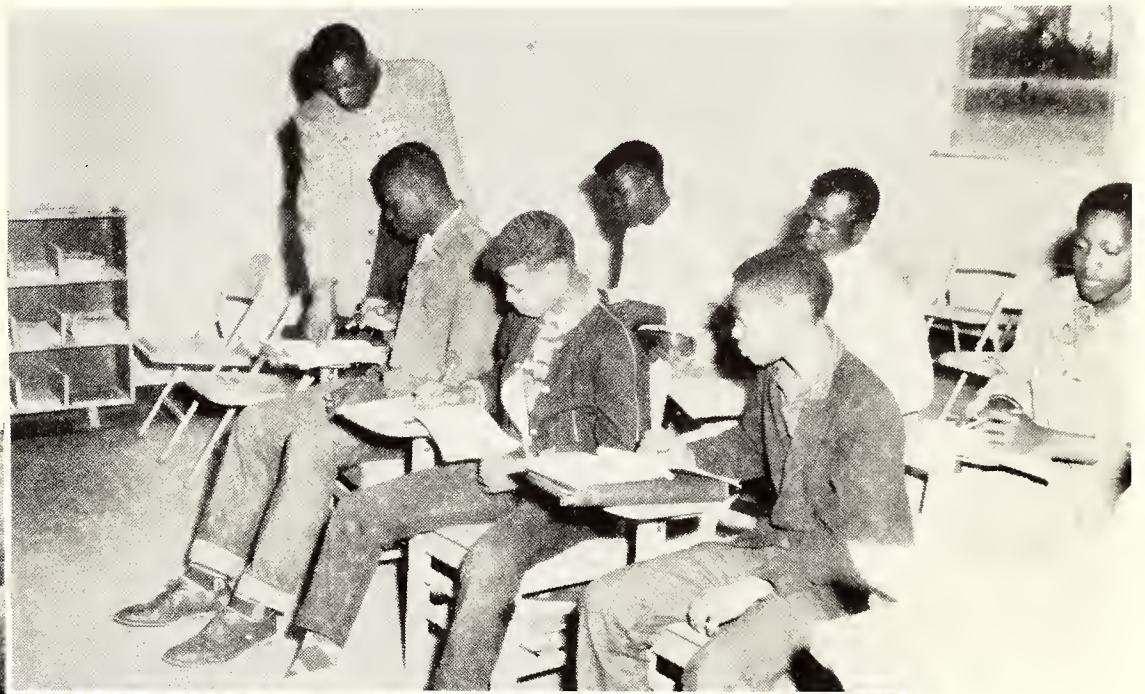
Agriculture, like home economics is required for all the boys of the high school department. Although, many of our students are from the farm, they enjoy the new techniques that are found in our agriculture classes.

A registered herd of cattle, a 200 flock of hens, 15 hogs and modern farm equipment are just a few of the things that these students have a chance to work with while taking agriculture.

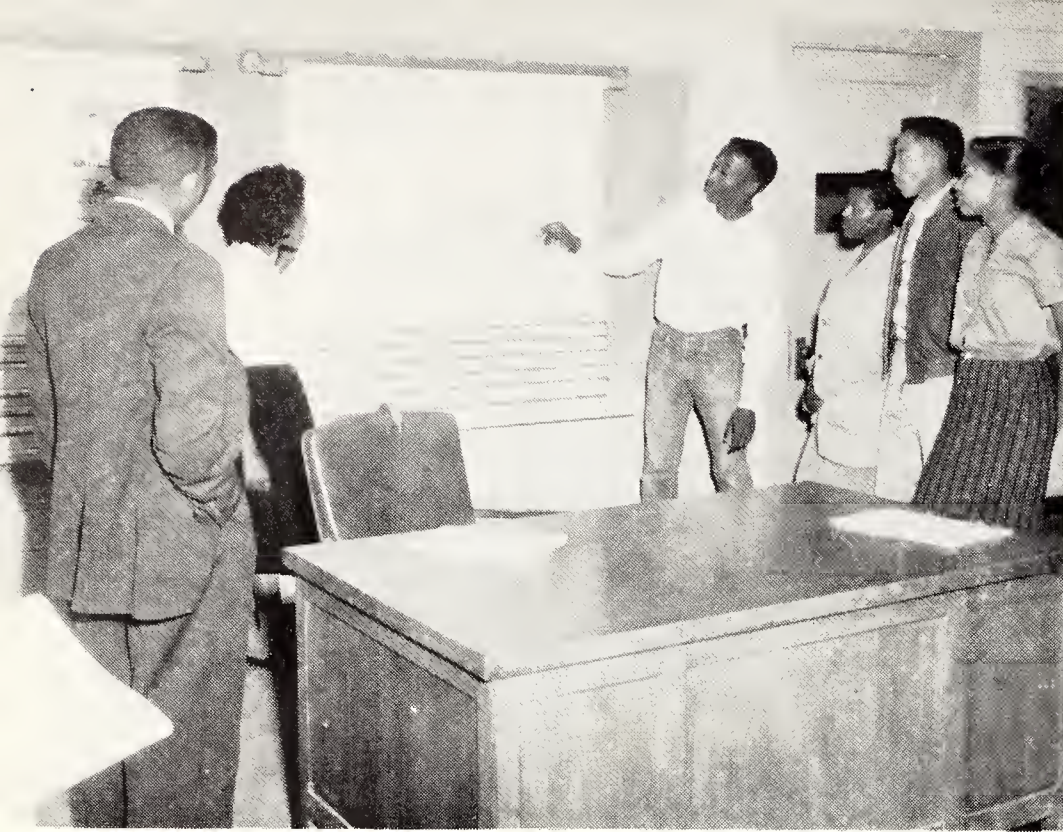

Science

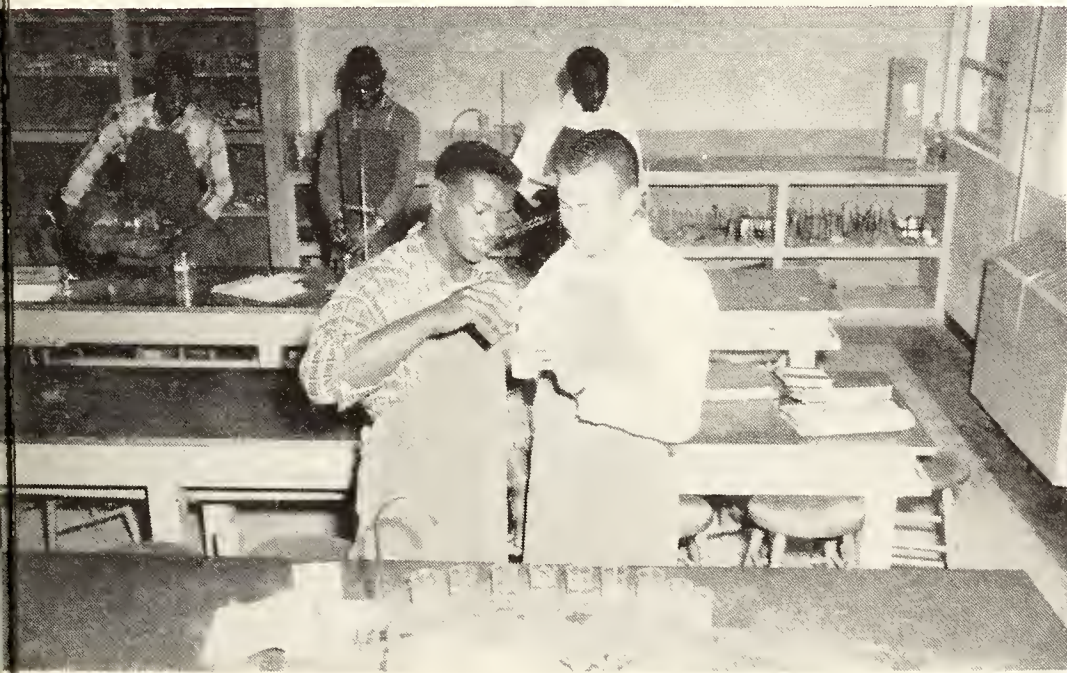

The demand for Zoology and other advance courses has been so great, until these courses will be offered this fall for the first time.



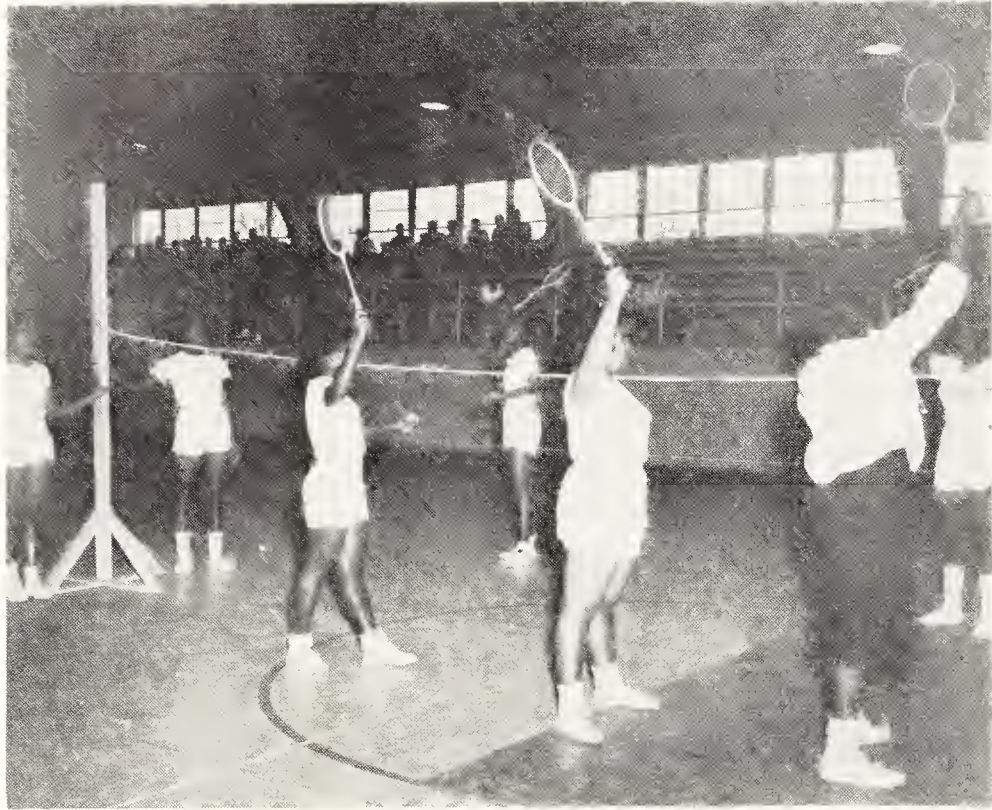

Competitive athletics give many of the students a chance to use the skills of physical education to his advantage as he progresses in his work here at Utica Junior College.

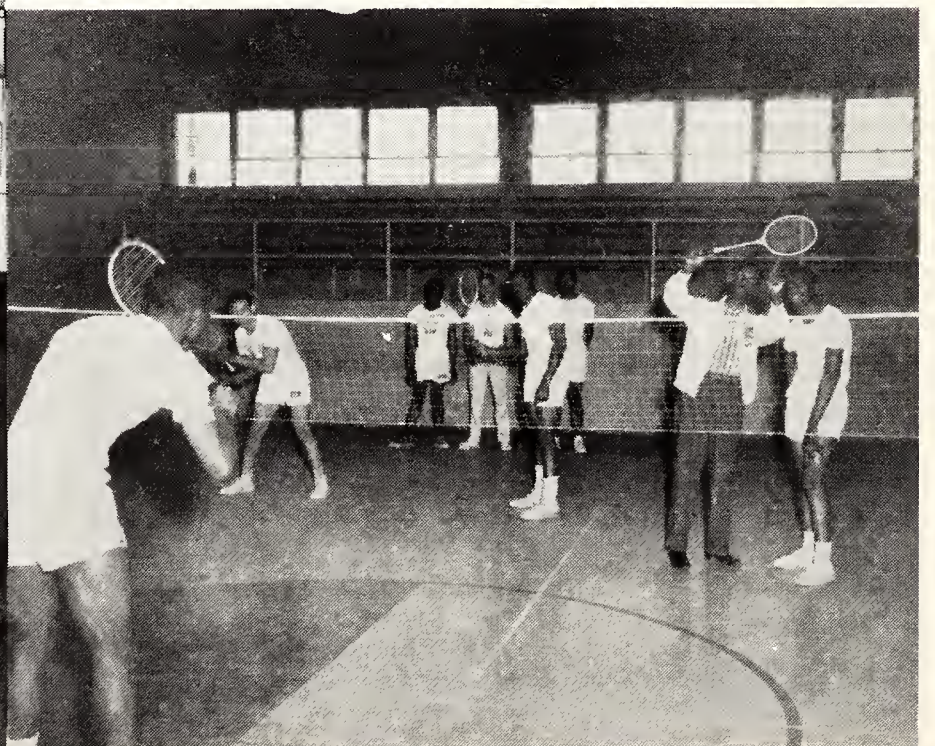
Since there is an expressed need for more health facts to be taught to our students, courses in health are being added.

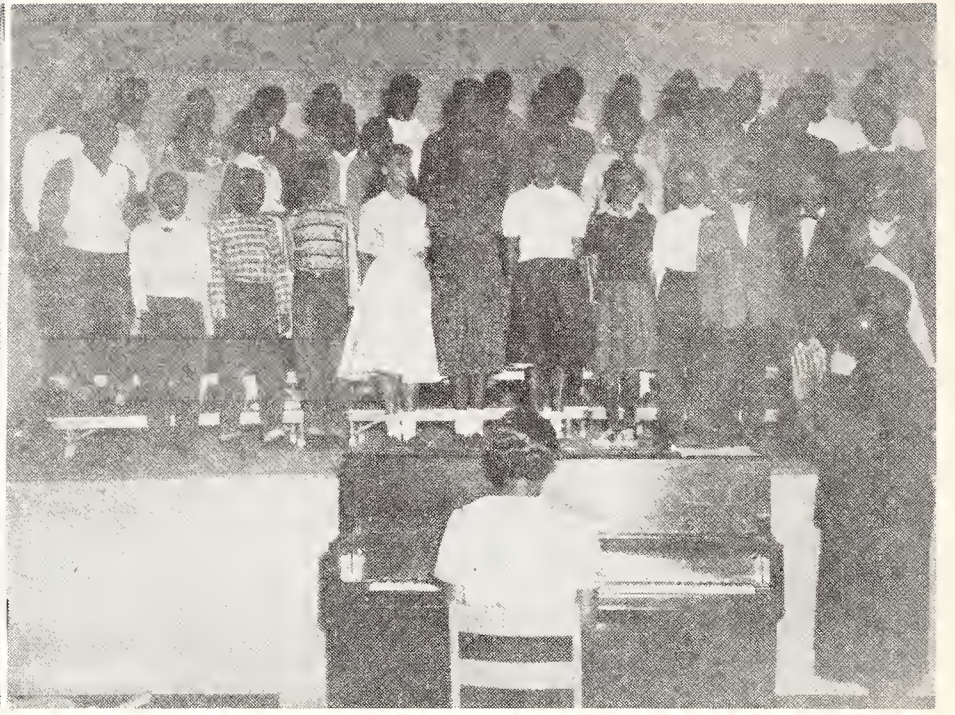

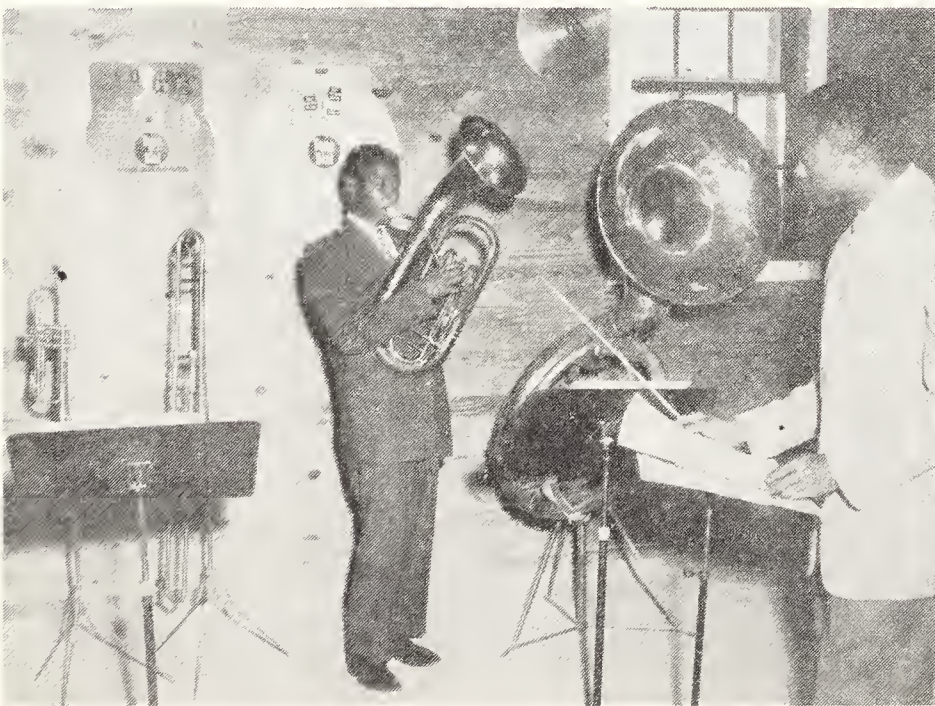

Glee clubs, solos, duets, trios and just a host of other skilled groups are a few of participants of this department. Public School Music and instrumental music are here for our students at all grade levels.

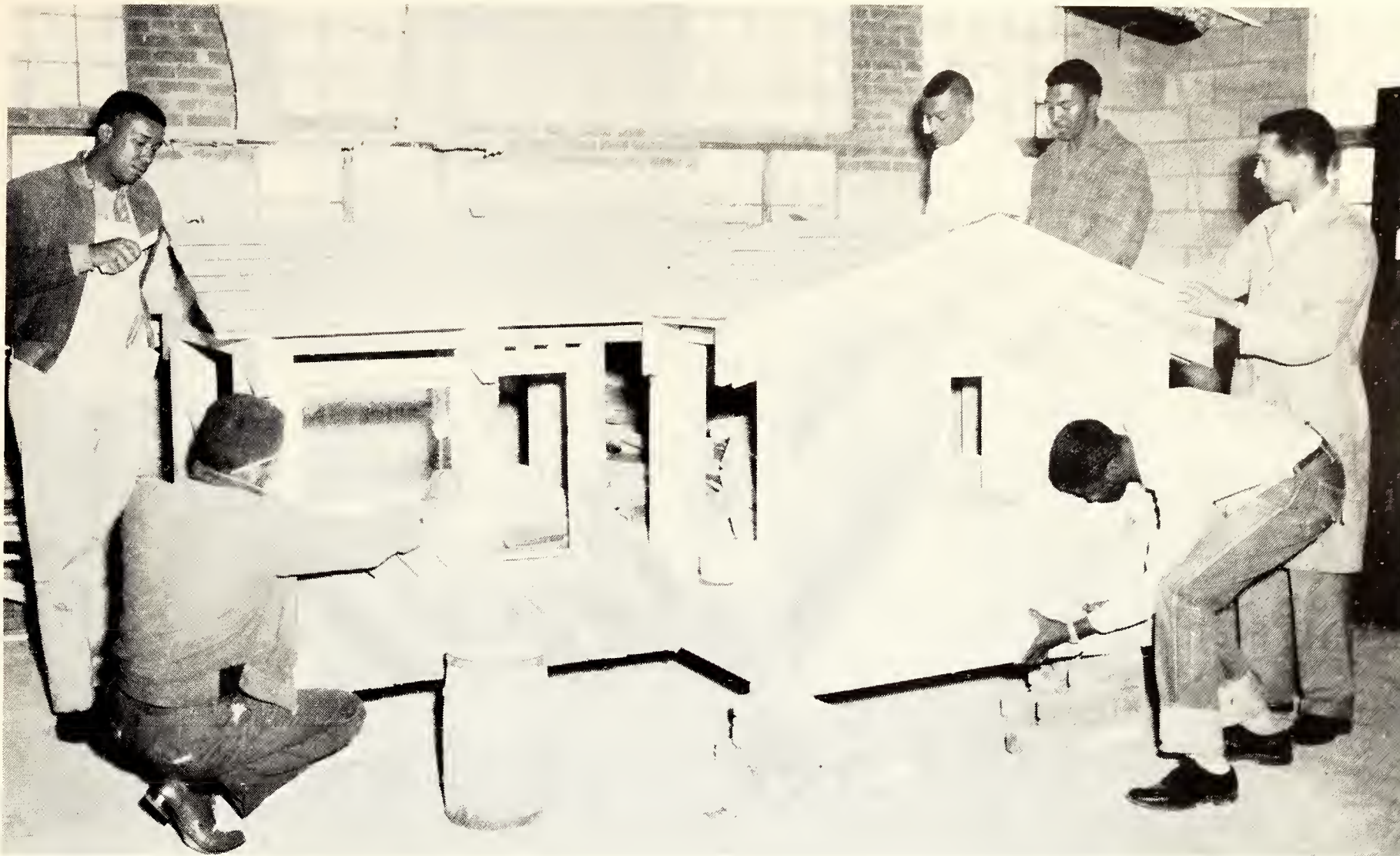

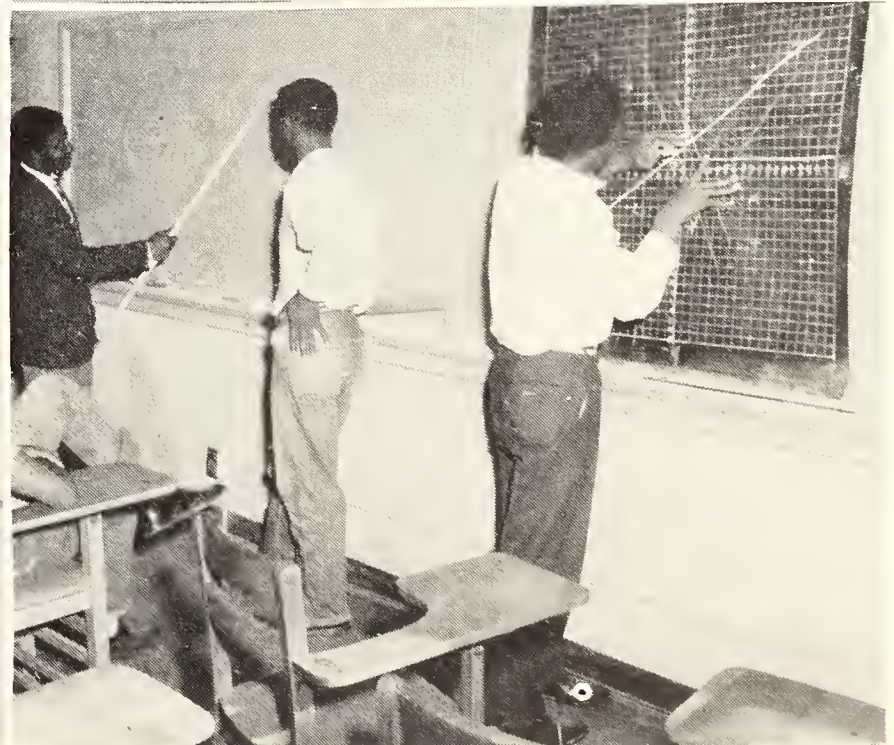

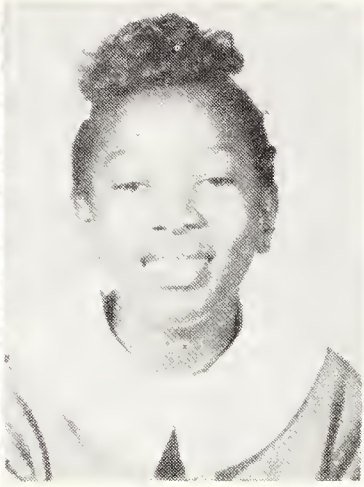
CHORAL MUSIC SOCIETY
