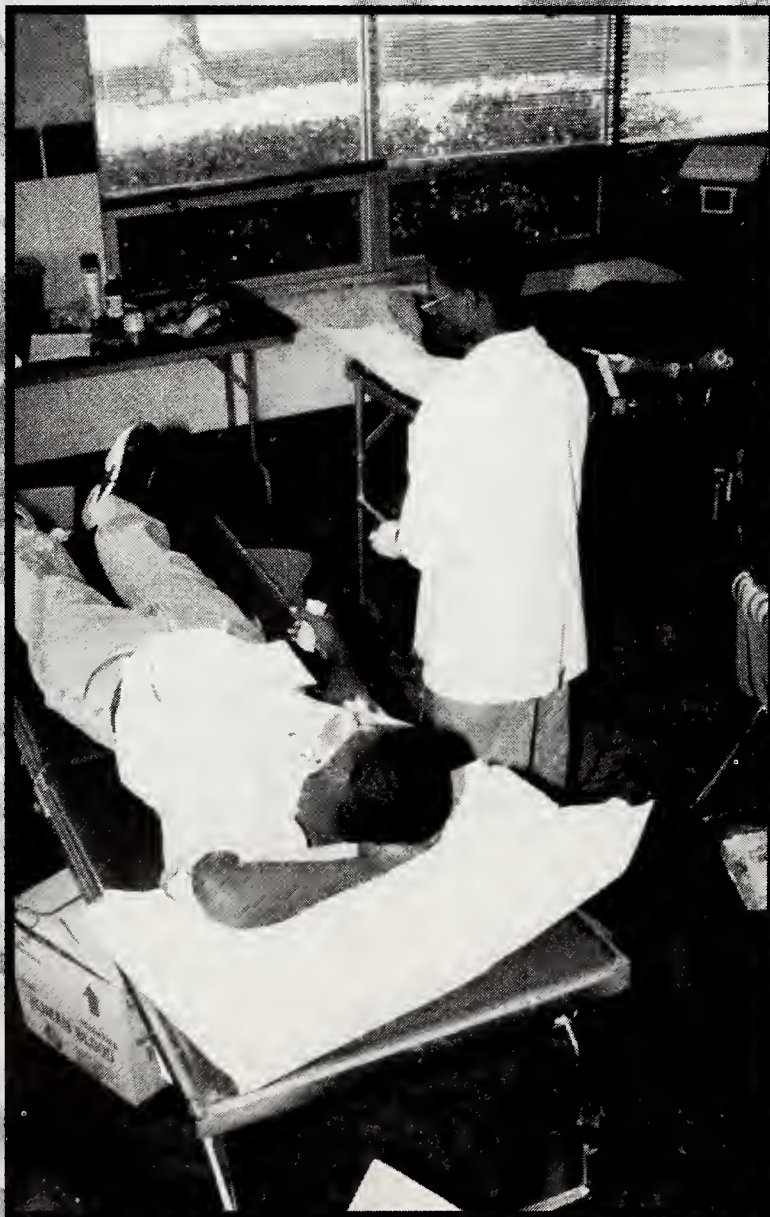
Norris' career goal is to become a secondary education teacher.

Perhaps, the best reason of all is that the donor is helping or even saving the life of another.

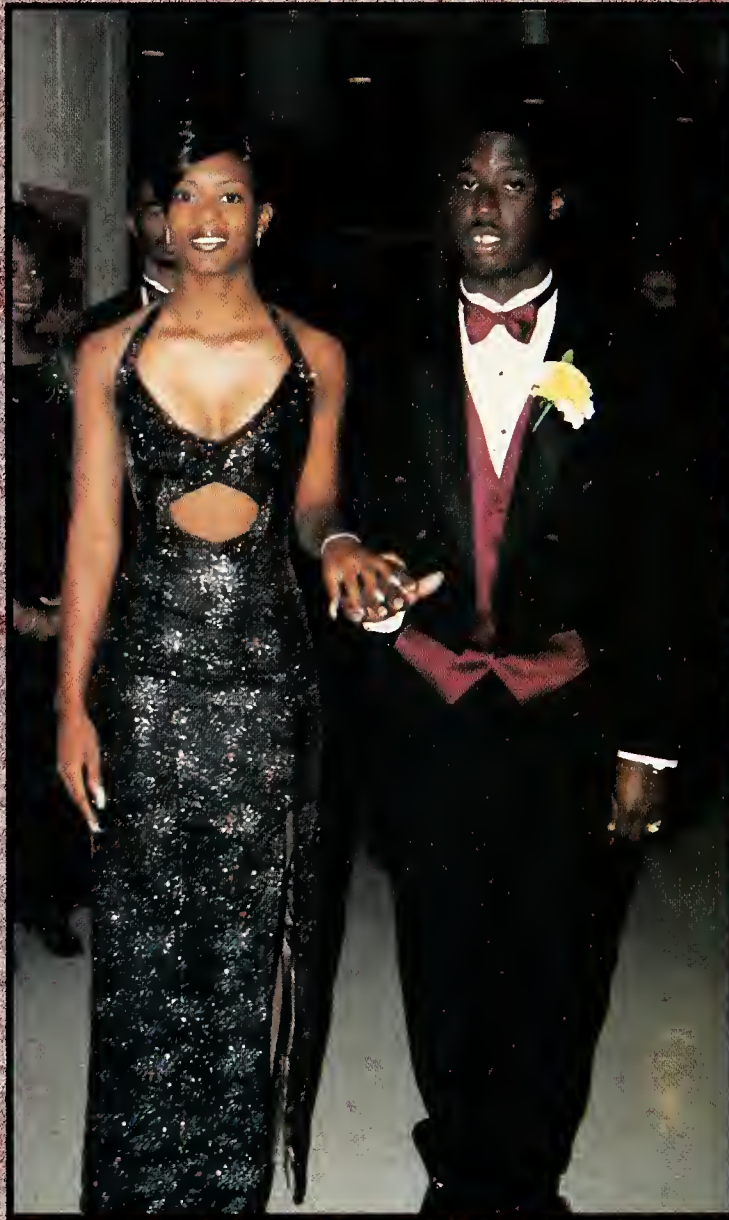

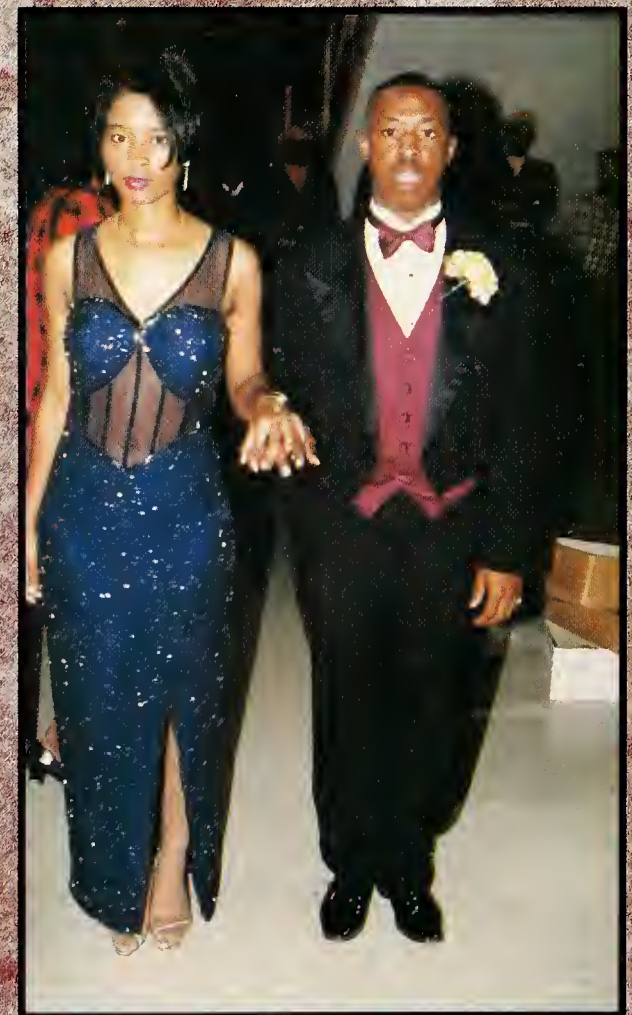

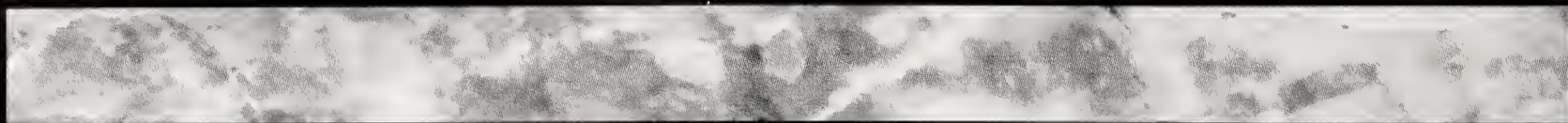

The role of the residents assistants is to help maintain a clean, congenial environment within and around the housing complex.

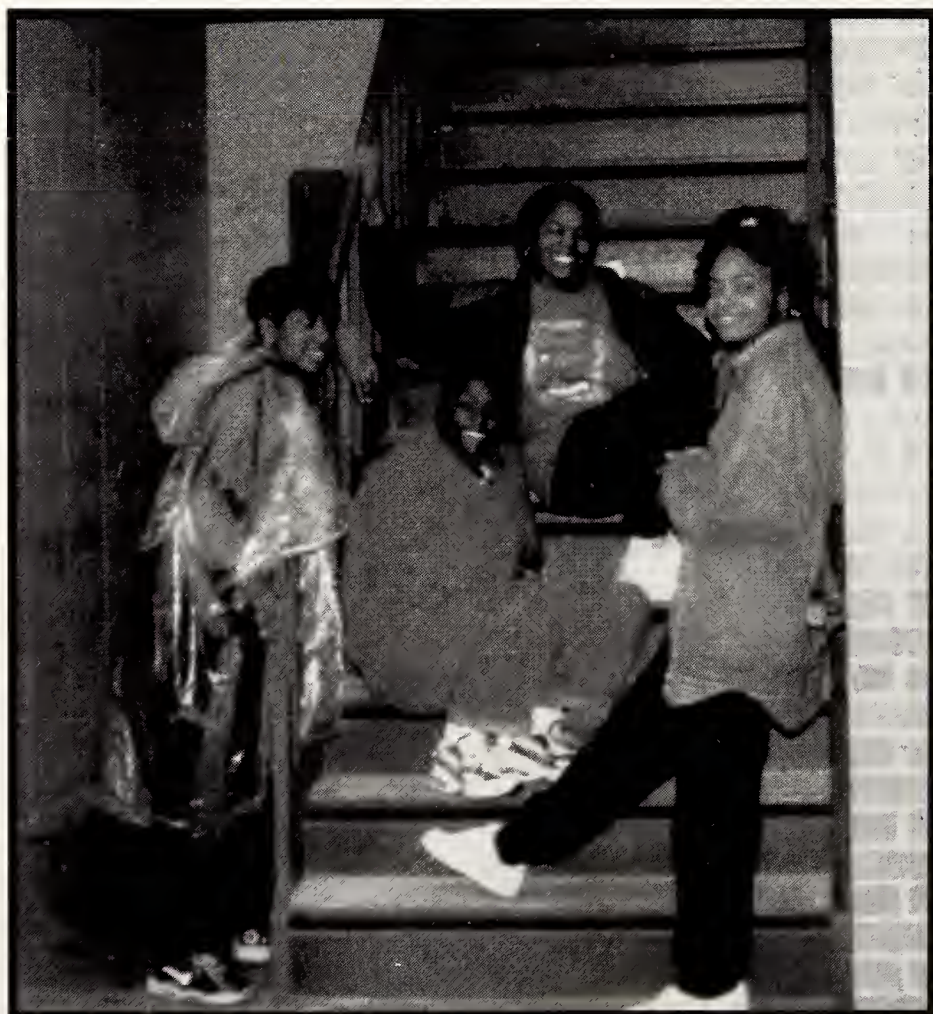
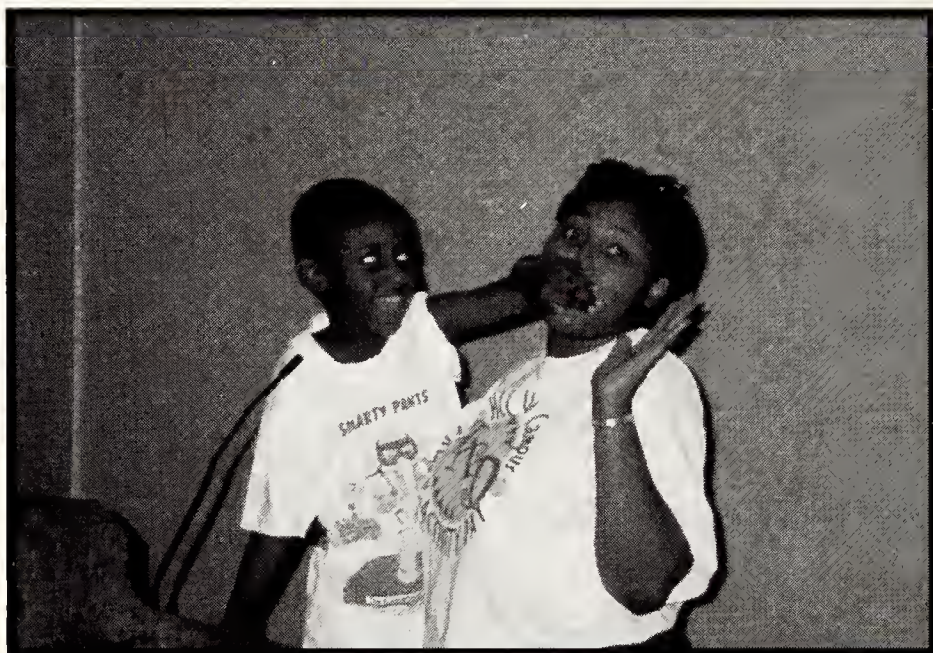
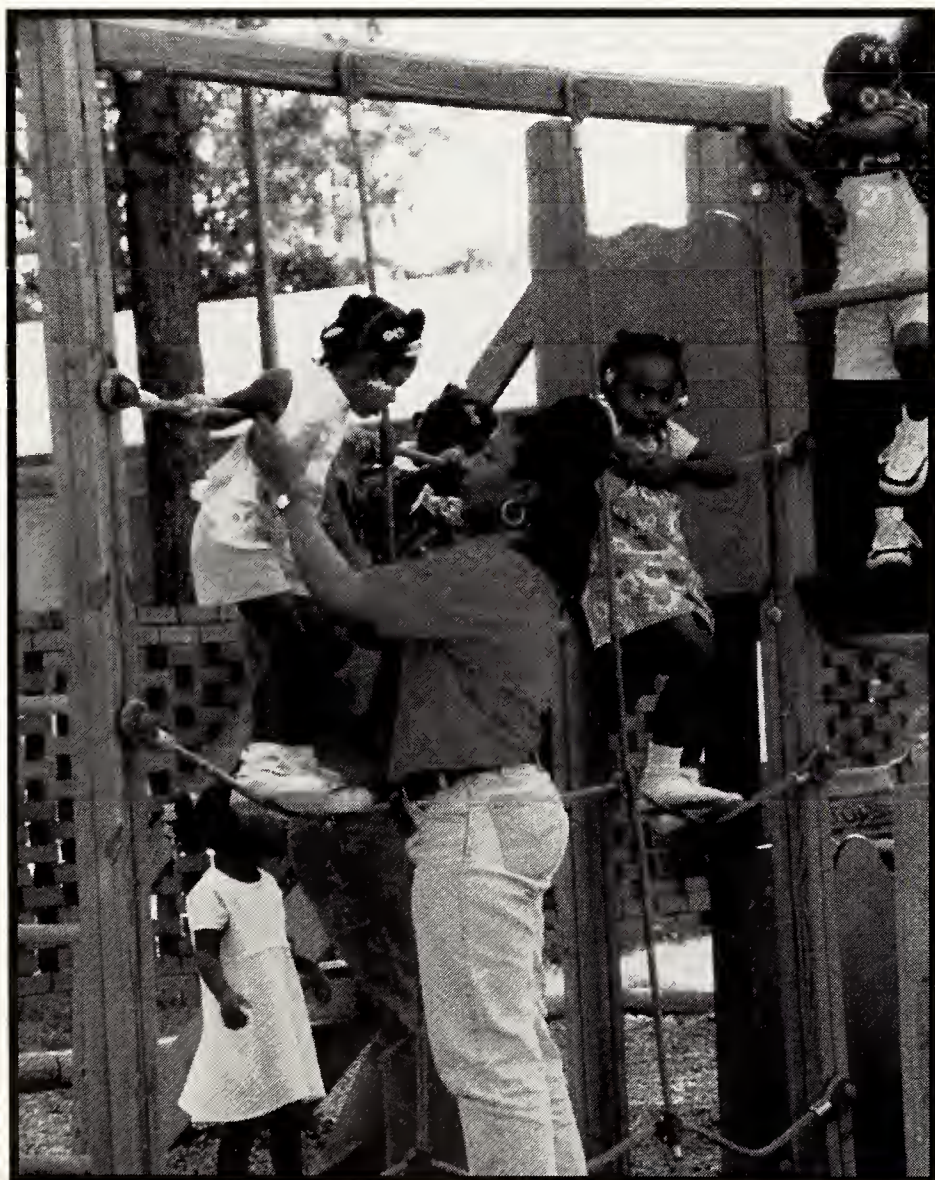

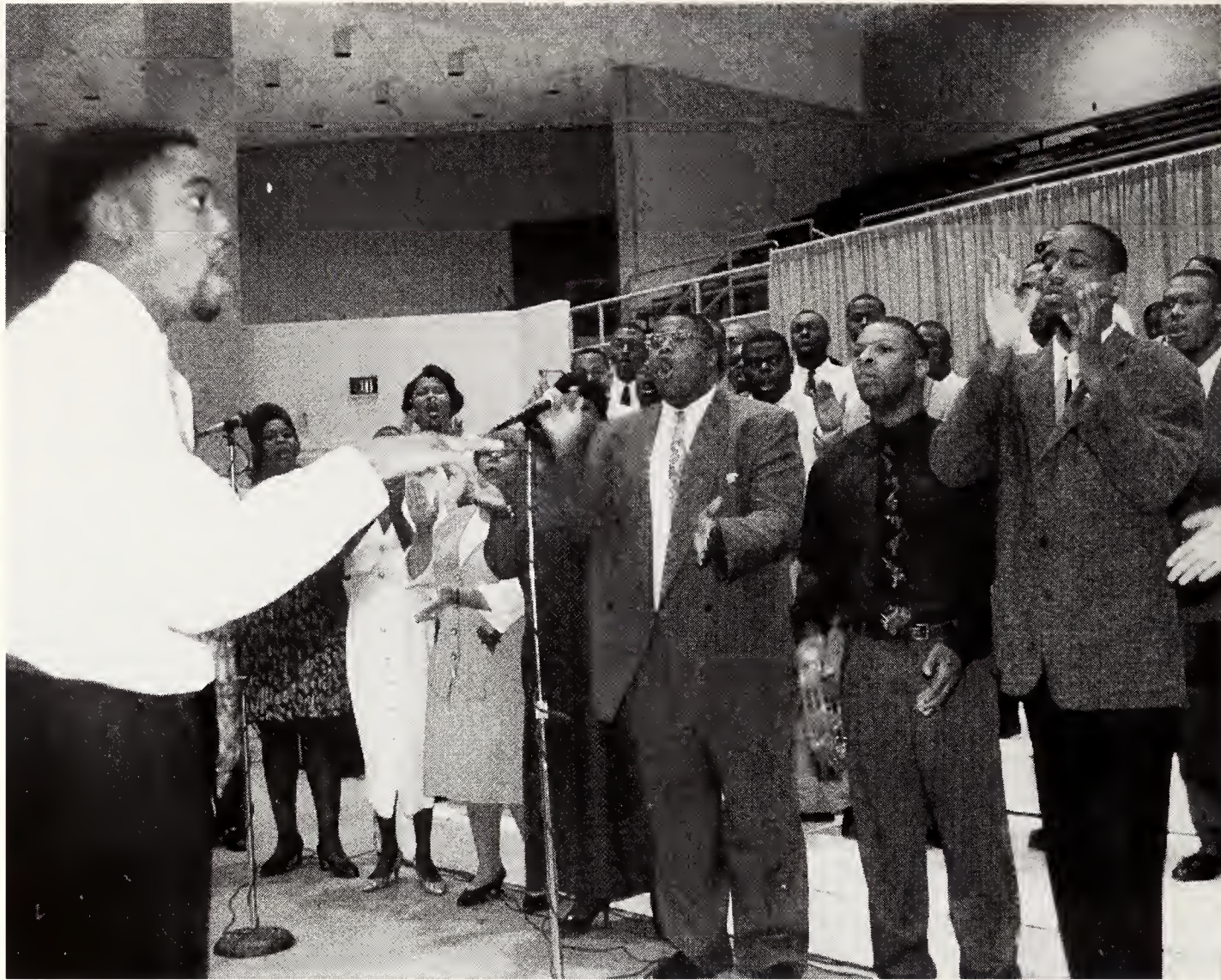
The child care program accommodates 20 to 25 students each year. Many of the students are children of Utica campus employees and students. Others are children from within the community.

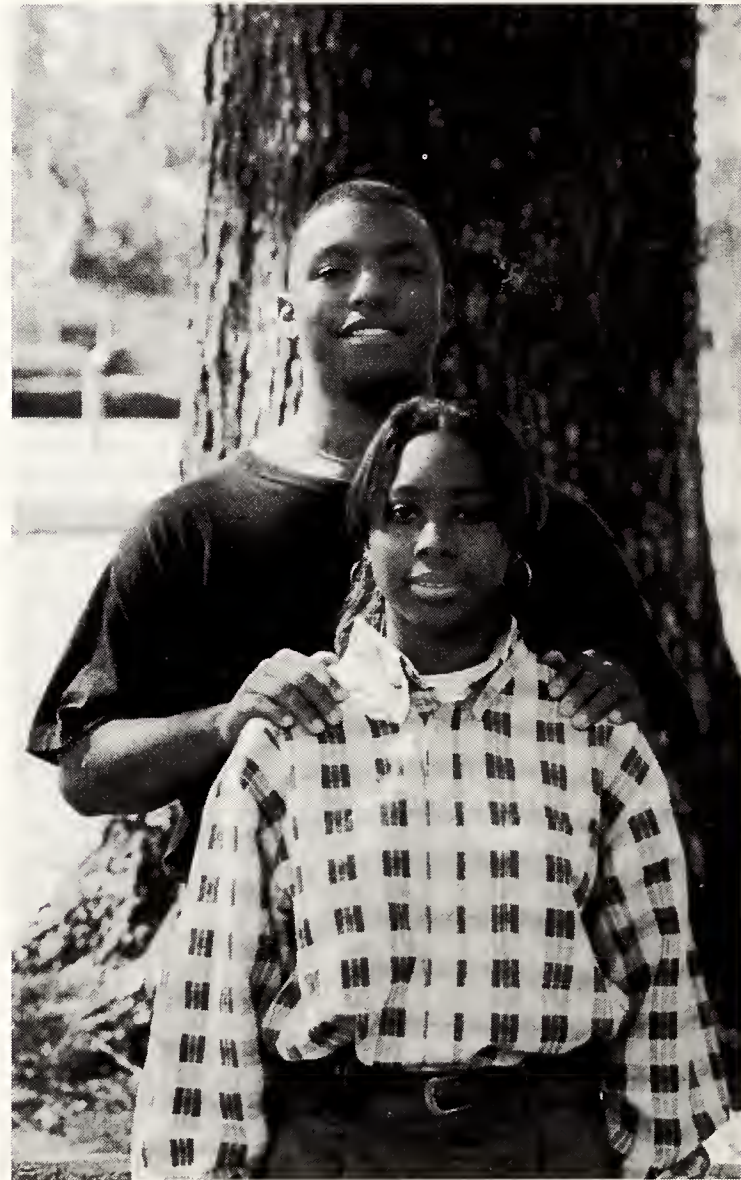

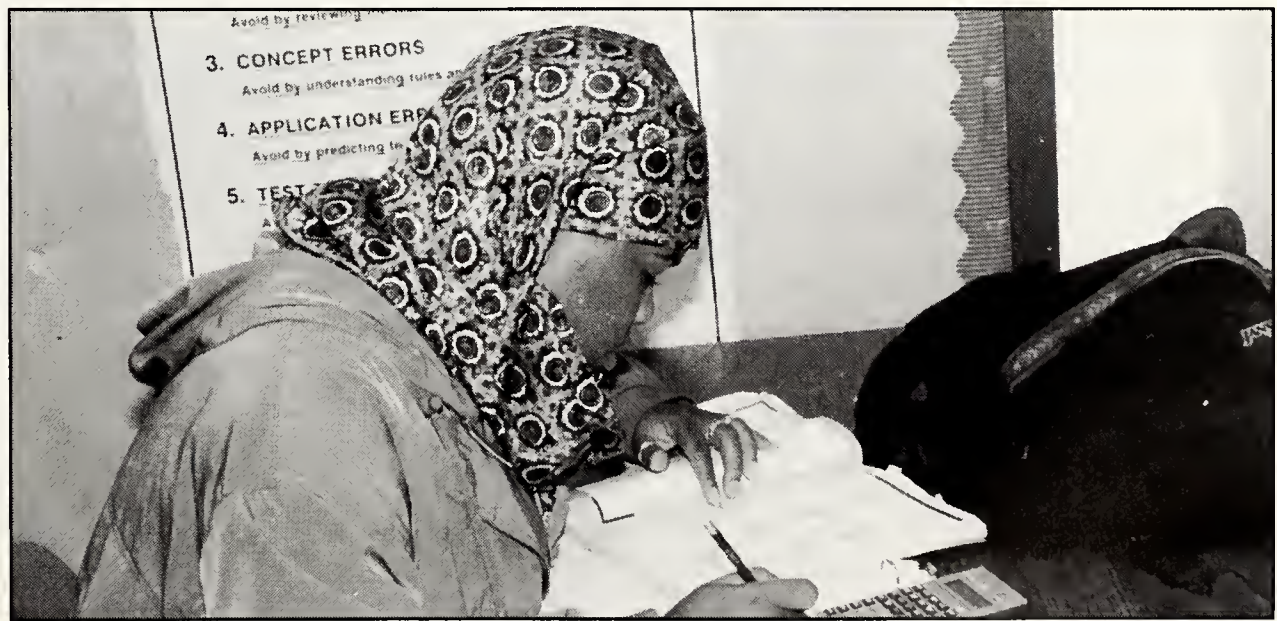

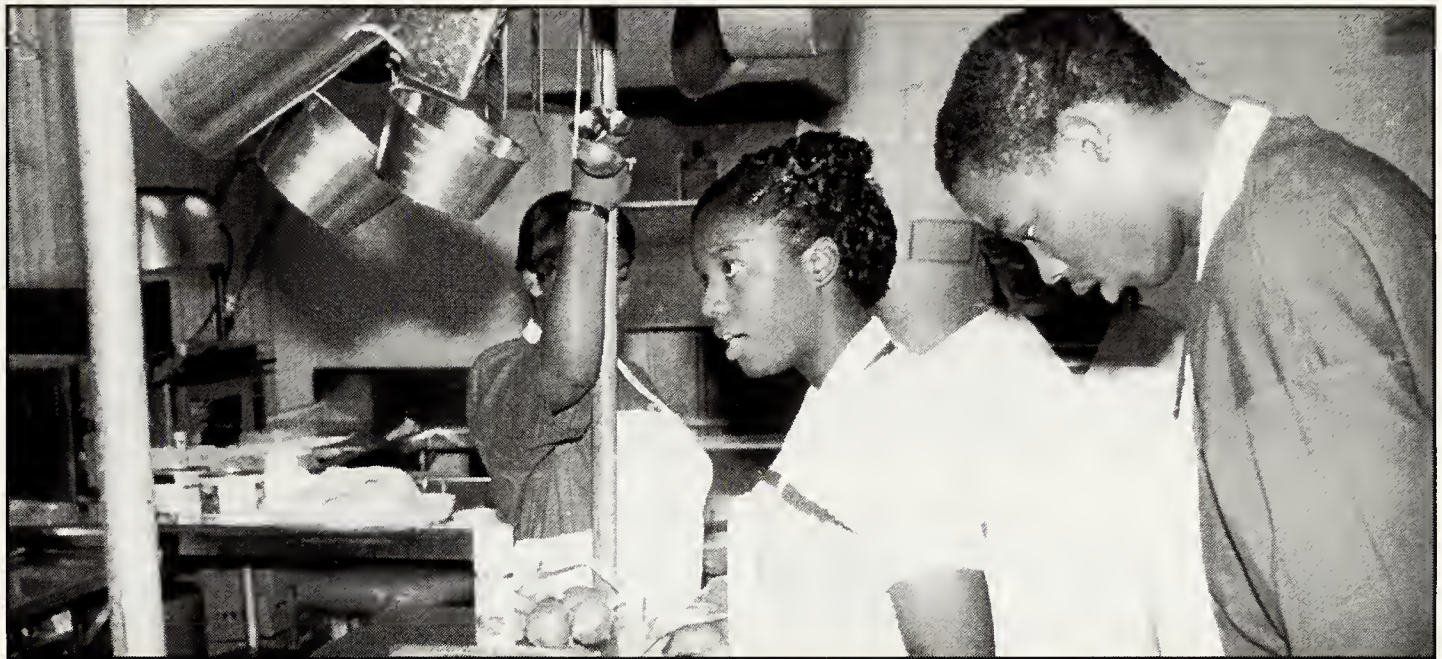

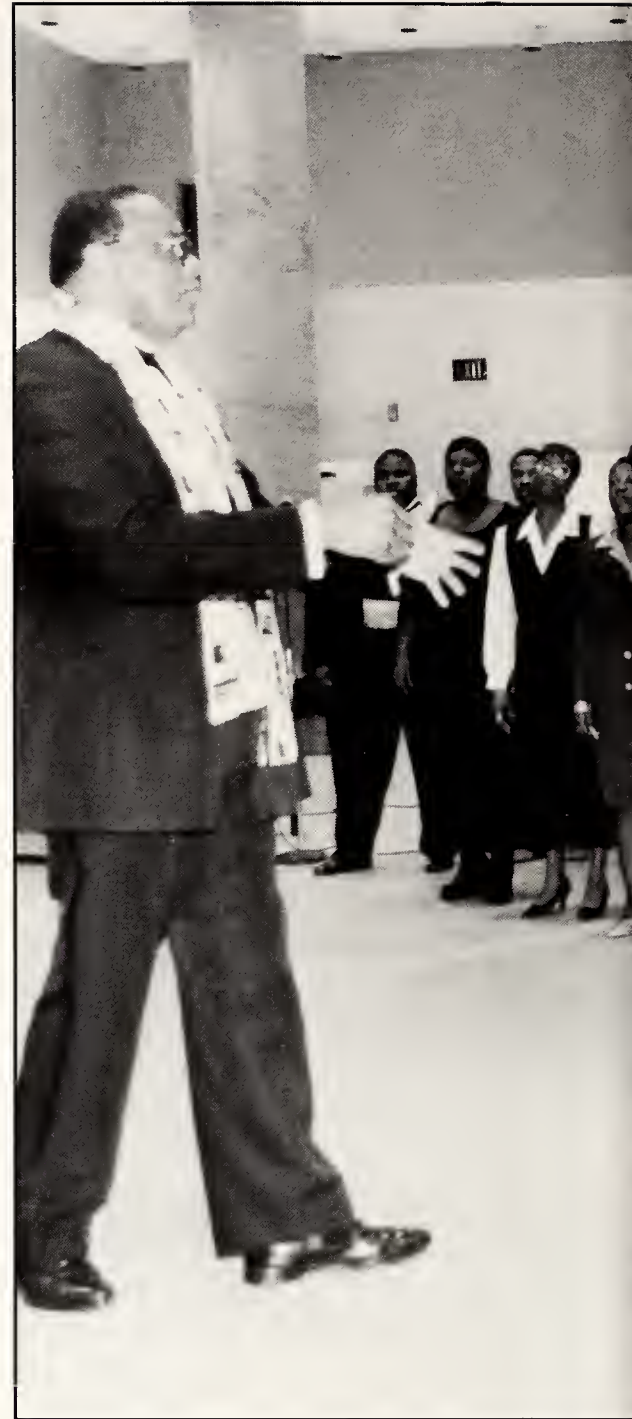

Celebrating A Legend: Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

On Friday, January 16, 1998, the Utica Campus celebrated the birthday of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. A general assembly was held at 12 noon in the J.D. Boyd Gymnasium. Socrates Garrett, publisher of "The Mississippi Link" Newspaper, delivered the keynote address. "Remember! Celebrate! Act! A Day On, Not a Day Off!" was the theme of the King program celebration.

Dr. King is recognized as one of America's most influential African American leaders. He is most noted for his historic march on Washington where he delivered his eminent "I Have a Dream" speech on August 28, 1963. His dream was one of hope and salvation — hope for the nation, salvation for the American people.

Dr. King was born January 15, 1929, in Atlanta, Georgia. He was assassinated April 4, 1968, in Memphis, Tennessee.

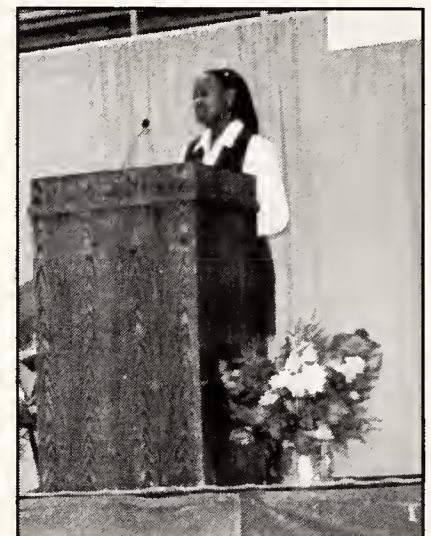

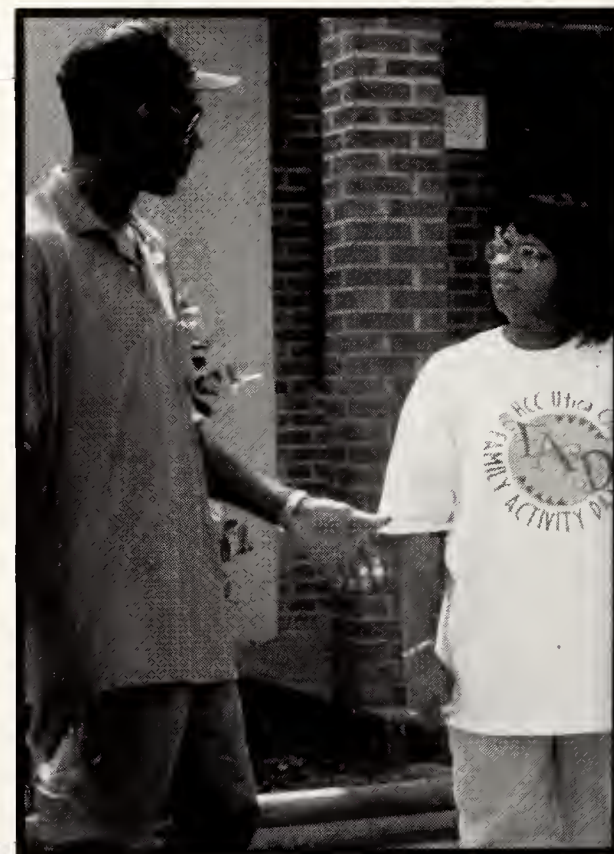
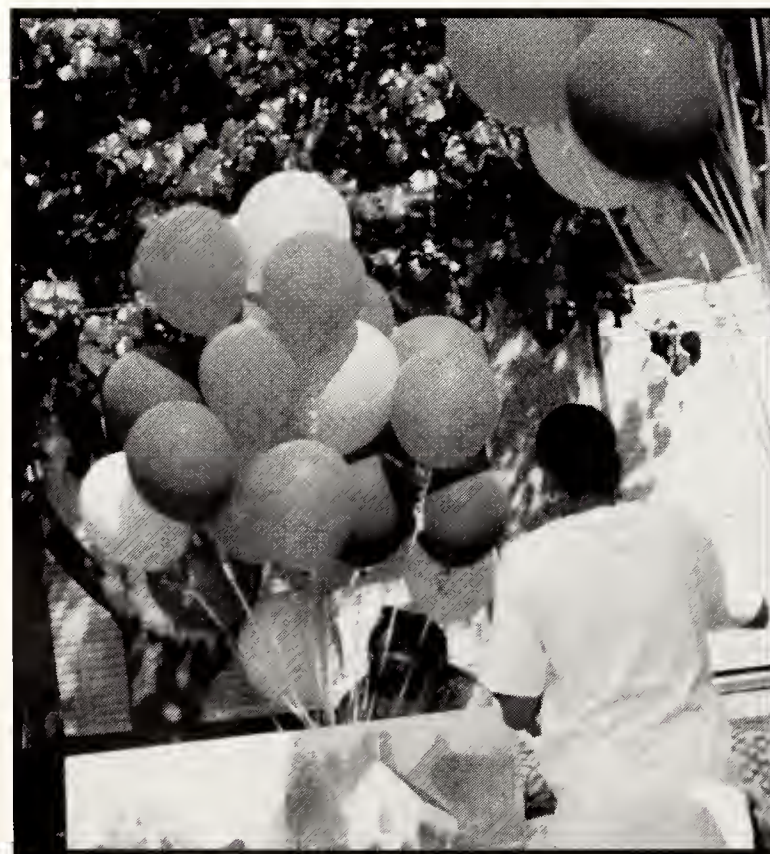
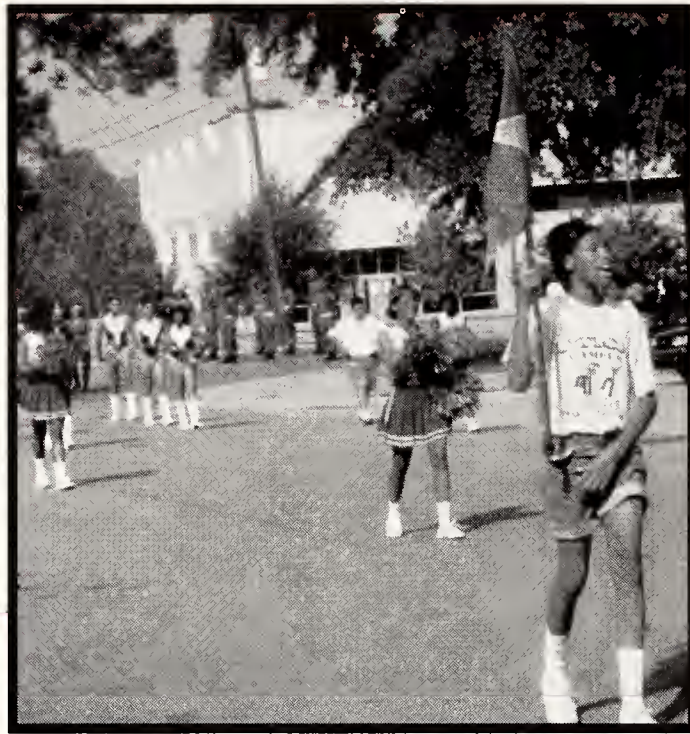


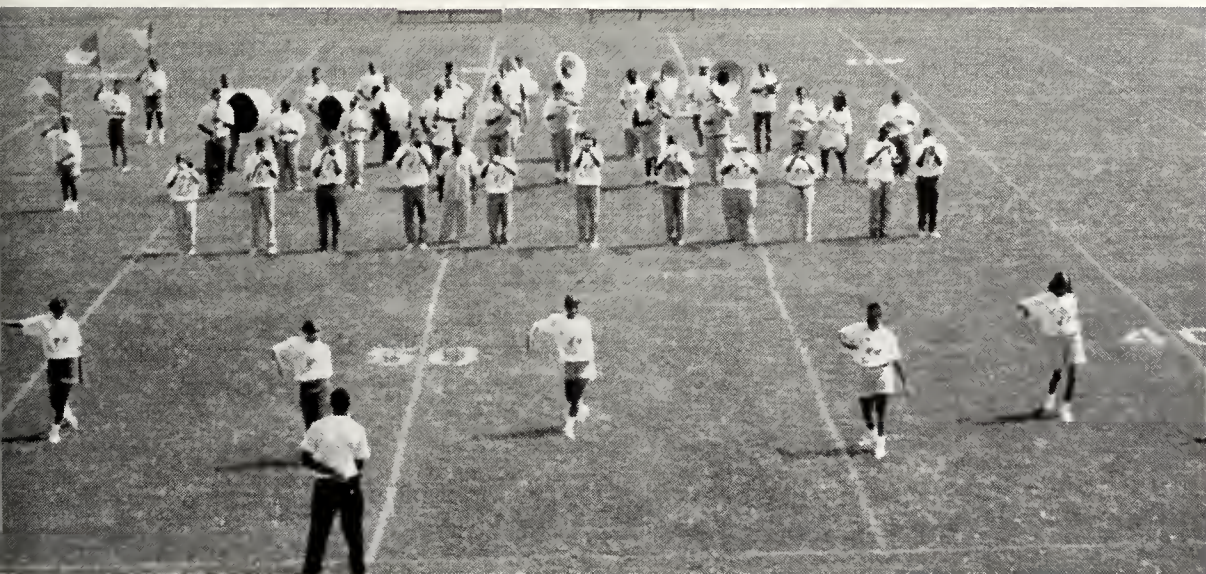
Family Activity Day (FAD)

The College is also looking to expand its offerings in the field of telecommunications which is currently a booming industry in the Jackson area. The growth of this business has created a shortage of qualified employees, and Hinds is meeting this need by including short-term intensive training in networking and technical support. Hinds also offers a two-year telecommunications degree and a one-year electronics communication repair certificate program.

As the College travels into the next millennium, technological opportunities will bring Hinds to the forefront as a state-of-the-art educational institution in the community, state, and nation. This innovation should encourage learning among students, expand their knowledge and skills, and give them confidence as they enter the world of work.

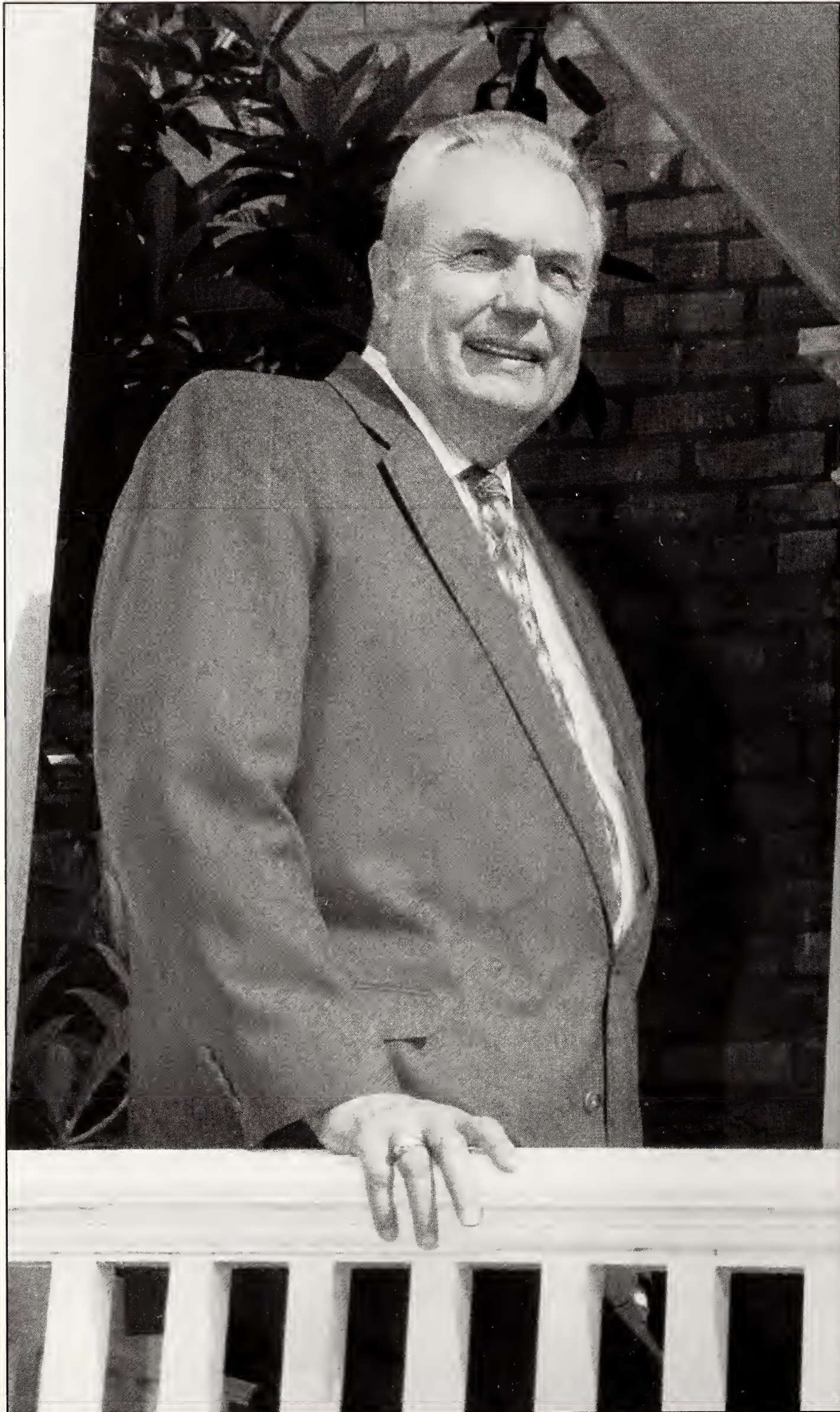

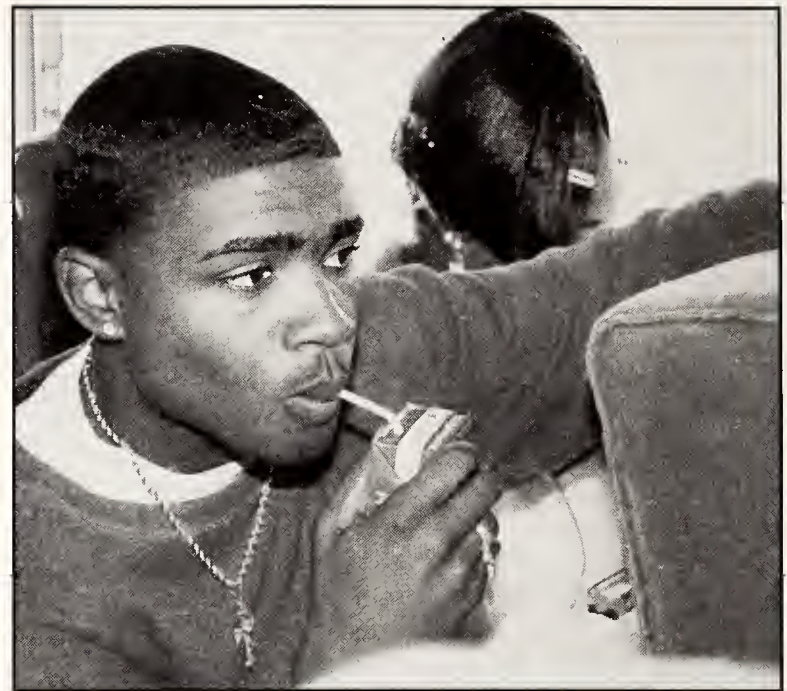
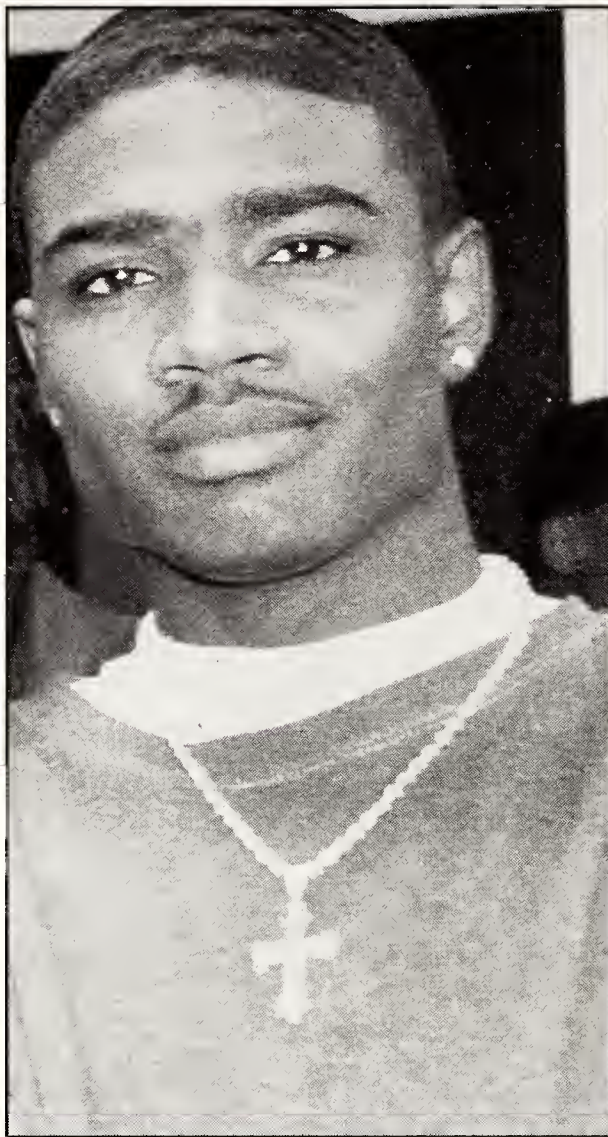
It'll Never Be Like This Again.
