College in 1947, I earned my tuition, room and
board by first milking cows at 4 o'clock every
morning and then working as a cafeteria
dishwasher until I received a basketball
scholarship. Starting with those early mornings in
Decatur, college affordability has always been
close to my heart. Mississippi's community
colleges – then and now – provide a world-class
education at a fraction of the cost of other
institutions. In fact, this year our state's
community college system was ranked #1 in the
nation based on cost and financing, classroom
experience, and educational and career outcomes.



In our role as the state's largest community college, Hinds is uniquely positioned to deliver innovative programs to equip the workforce of tomorrow. This year saw the launch of MI-BEST, a program where students earn essential career credentials while receiving academic support for their classroom work. Dual credit instruction has given students the chance to jump start their college education by earning introductory Math and English credits from Hinds while still enrolled in their high schools. 



Dancing with the Deans












Dancing Dolls (Bring It!)

The Uticanite Salutes Mrs. Marilyn Binion!

BELOVED UTICA INSTRUCTOR RETIRES AFTER 43 YEARS OF SERVICE TO MISSISSIPPI'S TEACHERS.

This year marks the retirement celebration of one of our living legends on campus. For 43 years now, Mrs. Marilyn Binion-Davis has been the driving force behind the Early Childhood Program at Hinds. She has worked tirelessly to impact the lives of her students, and by extension, the lives of the young people across the state who are in her former students' care.


Mrs. Binion grew up on a farm in rural Alabama as the youngest of 15 children in her family. "My mother always laughed that she was blessed with 10 girls and 5 boys." From her earliest moments, she knew that she would attend Tuskegee Institute. In fact, she was born in John Andrew Hospital at Tuskegee – the first in her family to be born in a hospital. While most of her other brothers and sisters attended Alabama State A&M and Hampton, Mrs. Binion couldn't help but grow up a Tiger.

When she was coming up, paying for college was a family affair. Tuition, room and board at Tuskegee was \$535 a semester. Her older brothers and sisters who had already graduated sent money each month to support her through college. One of her older sisters supported three of her siblings through college simultaneously on her teacher paycheck of \$70 a month.

Mrs. Binion recalled with fondness her days at Tuskegee. She arrived in June 1968 and was initially planning to major in Physical Education like her brother, but the workout routine quickly dissuaded her from that idea. She turned to Home Economics with a double minor in Fashion Marketing & Merchandising and Early Childhood Development. Home Economics students at Tuskegee lived in a big home at the college, with students taking charge of a different room each week to redecorate the room, including curtains, pillows, meal preparation, and interior design. This innovative program allowed students to experience a wide range

of skills related to the field.

But it wasn't all work and no play at Tuskegee. Far from it! Mrs. Binion loved going out to the Thursday nights dances to see the Commodores perform (the Commodores met at



first year on campus and, after winning the freshmen talent show, performed all over Tuskegee until they hit the national stage a few years later). Tom Joyner was her campus D.J. In fact, one night shortly after pledging Zeta, she caught Tom's attention with a powerful performance of "Bridge Over Troubled Waters" at a college night talent show; they have been friends ever since. Her cousin taught her the ropes of campus life: "freshmen and sophomores, do not go in front of the Union because you will get baptized in the water!" An active social life culminated with her entering the Miss Tuskegee pageant her senior year.

Mrs. Binion was also active in Get Out the Vote campaigns all across southern Alabama while at Tuskegee. The assassination of Dr. King during her senior year of high school had a tremendous impact on all in her class: "It was a terrible struggle to get out the vote." With some fraternity brothers, Mrs. Binion joined a group working on Saturdays and Sundays, traveling to various communities to register voters. After each session, the group would stop at The Chicken Coop "where you could get three wings for 50 cents!" She continued this important work throughout her time at Tuskegee.

In 1973, after earning her Master's in Early Childhood from Jackson State, Mrs. Binion joined the faculty at Utica Junior College. Her experience at Tuskegee came into play right from the start: "I also ended up teaching Modeling and Grooming, Fashion Marketing and Merchandising. I also ended up teaching a food class, so I was just using all of my Home Economics skills." Mrs. Binion's huge fashion shows back when the gym was built are the stuff of legend. She utilized the talents of the Industrial Arts teachers and students to create elaborate stage displays and artwork. Her shows would pack the gym with enthusiastic audiences ready to see the latest fashion

fashion shows "really allowed both areas to grow – fashion merchandising and early childhood education." Eventually, Mrs. Binion transitioned from being a jack-of-all-trades

instructor, to focus exclusively on early childhood education. However, her love of fashion never left, as her coworkers have told us that you can always count on Mrs. Binion to be beautifully and elegantly attired for every occasion.

With the passing of her coworker, Freddie Jackson in 1991, Mrs. Binion decided that she would push for national accreditation of the childcare center in Ms. Jackson's honor. This was no easy task, as it involved many hours of research and writing, along with a number of site visits. After several years of effort, the Freddie J. Jackson Child Care Center became the first in the state of Mississippi to receive national accreditation.

While her time at Hinds has not been without its share of challenges, Mrs. Binion enjoyed her years on campus. She described impromptu faculty cookouts and fun times centered around a real family environment here on the campus. While Mrs. Binion may be leaving us, she will never be far from our hearts. As we reflect on the many years of hard work and dedication to help her students become strong educators and advocates for Mississippi's youngest citizens, we at *The* Uticanite wish Mrs. Binion all the best in her retirement and ask that you join us in congratulating her on 43 years of service!

I gotta love for every single person on this earth, and it won't go away.


To finish this race, we got to love each other every single day.





The Ultimate Measure of a Woman: Maya Angelou by Wykena Cockerham

A person who emulates Dr. King's thoughts of the ultimate measure of a woman is no other than May Angelou! Ms. Angelou was a wise woman who truly defined love for all people, unity, and non-violence as it relates to social differences and changes and service to mankind. All of these are very important characteristics to have when others look up to you. I never knew her personally but I understand her deep sentiment for her fellow man and although I haven't mastered it like she did, I try to model the same characteristics. She faced discrimination from other races and her own race. The hurtful things that were said to her caused her to struggle with her physical appearance most of her life. This understandably caused her self-esteem and confidence to be very low. Somehow she overcame that challenge and other controversy and went on to be a successful author and philosopher. She never let discrimination from others stop her from being all that she could be.

As she grew, she came to understand what racism was and what it meant to be a racist. She noticed how her own family and other blacks were treated unfairly because too often white people felt that Black people were inferior to them. We now know that they were never superior to us to begin with but the manner in which Maya Angelou taught us to deal with this definitely emulates how Dr. King taught her and I am thankful for that. The late Edgar Hoover said that "...violence must be met with violence!" Violence is never the answer when a peaceful solution can be reached. I'm reminded of the section in her book where she recalled being taught by her grandmother who she affectionately refers to as "Momma," and before she came to know Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., taught her to ignore discrimination and follow God's Holy Word. She did this because she exhibited love and respect for her grandmother because she was the closest person in the world to her.

Another challenge that changed her life forever and that she overcame was being sexually molested at the tender age of seven while visiting her mother in Chicago. Too ashamed to tell anyone in her family and when it got to be too heavy of a burden for her to carry anyone on her own, she finally broke down and confided in her brother who went further and confided in their uncle. Not willing to take the peaceful road, she later found out that her uncle killed her attacker. She on the other hand, remained a strong supporter and advocate of non-violence. In fact, she stated that she ultimately felt that she was the one who had killer her attacker because she told someone what he did. As a result, she was so traumatized by what her uncle had done that she didn't speak for five years after that. Although she doesn't say she was happy about what her uncle did, I can't help but wonder if somewhere deep down inside of her if she was the teeniest bit happy about it.












Finding the latest fashions at the right price had to become a talent when Shricker Johnson's children developed their own tastes in clothes.

"I have two daughters, and my youngest one is a diva with clothes and everything," said the Crystal Springs native and first-year student in the Fashion Technology program at Hinds Community College's Utica Campus.

In the program, Johnson is blending her desire to continue her education with her creative eye in the hopes she can make a better living for her family.

"I was interested at first in cosmetology, then early childhood education," she said. "Now, I want to do my own business, me and my girls."

The Fashion program is one of 14 career-technical programs offered at the Utica Campus. With a one-year career certificate in hand upon completion of the program, students can take the skill to the workforce – fabric stores, alterations companies and manufacturing plants, to name a few.

"The program offers experienced faculty and small class sizes that prepare you for successful employment in clothing, textiles and fashion design fields," said District Director of Enrollment Kathryn Cole. "This program includes instruction and training in construction, fabric design, pattern design, principles of construction, fitting and alterations, custom tailoring, home furnishings and textiles testing."

The expansive Fashion program prepares home tailors, crafters, novice sewers and every other kind of student in between with comprehensive coursework on the latest in sewing and embroidering technology. In short, it's not your grandmother's sewing machine anymore. Today's machines are faster and more versatile, Gore said.

"Those machines are computerized, so they have different types of stitch settings," said Gore, a 20-year clothing designer featured in more than 100 fashion shows in the South. "If you wanted to do some embroidering, say the cuff on your shirt, it has patterns ready once you log into the machine. You can also use a jump drive to download certain images and patterns you want to do."

Students in the program begin with the basics and work up to mastering the modern-day machines used in large-scale manufacturing outfits.

"We start off with garment construction, where we help students use the equipment in the classroom, mainly the sewing machines," Gore said. "In the tailoring class, students learn to tailor garments to the body, working with linings and things like that. Another is equipment usage, industrial and domestic, which is about how to safely use and maintain the latest sewing and embroidery machines, such as the ones made by Brother and Entrepreneur.

"We teach them to use industrial machines because they may end up having to use one, especially if they end up working in a factory," Gore said.

For the entrepreneurs-in-waiting like Johnson, it's a chance to show off some practicality. Her final exam in the class was a turquoise polyester show-stopper of a dress tailored for her older daughter's senior prom.

"The class shows me how I could take it and transform a shirt I might see on sale somewhere for \$40 or \$50 into what I really want," Johnson said. "You can get some fabric of your own and make a top-notch shirt – a shirt of your dreams that won't look cheap and that nobody else has."







Cosmetology

ELECTRONICS TECHNOLOGY







Dewayne Jolly puts the finishing touches on a firing mechanism for his group's zombie themed board game.







"In this program, students benefit from experienced faculty and small class sizes with both classroom instruction and hands-on training."

Today's visual media industries demand versatility beyond what Martin saw even just a few years ago growing up in Summit. Already an intern at a local television station as a result of the program, she'll continue learning how to operate TV cameras, shoot video, find the best sound bites and write copy.

"You'll be expected to shoot it, write it and post it before it even gets to the air," program director Tim Crisler said. "So, we teach a mixture, everything from writing, speaking and all the behind-thescenes of putting together and anchoring a whole news show."

It's the quality cross-training that has Crisler's students already in demand.

"All my students have internships at TV and radio stations in the Jackson market," said Crisler, who worked in broadcasting and public relations 20 years in the Jackson area before coming to Hinds during the fall 2015 semester. "Our goal by the time they leave here is to have more experience than some university students. It's essential to me to get them out into the industry, so that when they graduate they can walk right into a job."

Martin and her classmates are taking full advantage of their education both in and out of the classroom.

"I didn't know I had the capability with the equipment and the software," she said. "I put what I learned in class into their workstation and it was interesting.

Quality time behind the lens, whether as part of the class or her internship, is priceless for Martin.

"It's about getting the experience, then getting a good job," she said.

Special projects and on-campus productions can include covering what's going on at other career-tech programs on campus, among various opportunities to hone skills.

"We partner with all our departments here on campus and with career-tech to practice our production pieces," Crisler said. "And I try to cover all six campuses, because learning about different people is part of being a good journalist.

"It's a multimedia world, and it's transformed to where you have to know it all. But, when you graduate, your talents will be on the level with the industry."





Culinary Arts @ Utica

The kitchen is a diverse, popular place these days, particularly in television and social media. But there's plenty of room at the tables served in the economy.

Careers in food can lead students to several diverse lines of work, from restaurants to food management. In the case of Hinds Community College Utica Campus student James Chapman, it's a way to keep his options as versatile and varied as his interests. Although he left the farm to attend college, farming is still close to his heart.

"My grandmother and mom both grew up cooking," said Chapman, a first-year student from Carthage. "They grew crops and lived off the land, lots of greens, different vegetables and fresh food. Even with meat, they had pigs, cows and such.

"At first, I wanted to do weapons engineering for the military," he said. "But I had talked to a recruiter for the military who told me how much they love cooking because they need an escape. I found out about the culinary program here, and I'm glad I joined it."


Chapman was among a dozen students in instructor Durnitra Weeks' class in the Culinary Arts program at the Utica Campus in the fall 2015 semester. The campus is home to 14 career-technical programs including Weeks' class.

"The Hinds Utica Campus Career-Technical Division is proud of the growth we've seen in the past year," said Kenisha Shelton, dean of career-tech programs at the Utica Campus. "Our instructors have been working extremely hard this past year to recruit and retain students and to obtain certification for themselves to stay relevant and connected with industry. The Career and Technical division at Hinds Community College – Utica Campus is definitely turning vision into reality."

"We start out covering the basics – how to boil water and the correct temperature in which to cook certain foods," Weeks said. "Then, comes the sanitary part, which is cleaning the kitchen according to health standards. Later, we cover seasoning and flavoring techniques with meat and other things like that."

Weeks, a Bolivar County native and former executive chef and dietary manager in the healthcare industry, herself chose a cooking career over healthcare since it was second nature from an early age.

"I'm from a family of four cooks," she said. "So, the passion came from watching them and for the enjoyment on their faces."

"In the Culinary Arts program on the Utica Campus, students receive hands-on training by an experienced chef," District Director of Enrollment Kathryn Cole said. "Skills are built from the ground up – from simple boiling techniques all the way to working with specialized equipment and ingredients."

Chapman is keeping his career options open, but both are straight out of the kitchen.

"I have two paths right now. One of them leads to be a culinary specialist in the Navy, and another is finding an apprenticeship for a restaurant, catering or food safety. With that, I'd like to stay in Mississippi."




A TOUR THROUGH HISTORIC UTICA



Hinds Community College-Utica was founded in 1903 by William H. Holtzclaw as the Utica Normal & Industrial Institute for Coloreds. Holtzclaw arrived in Utica with the support of his mentor Booker T. Washington and a dream to start a "Little Tuskegee" in the heart of the Black Belt. Early on, the school emphasized Black land ownership as one way to fight the oppression of the Jim Crow south.

National Association of Black Journalists





The National Association of Black Journalists (NABJ) is an organization of journalists, students and media-related professionals that provides quality programs and services to and advocates on behalf of black journalists worldwide.

Founded by 44 men and women on December 12, 1975, in Washington, D.C., NABJ is the largest organization of journalists of color in the nation.

Many of NABJ's members also belong to one of the professional and student chapters that serve black journalists nationwide.

NABJ holds an annual convention and career fair each summer with dozens of plenary sessions and workshops for professional development. The career fair draws hundreds of recruiters and is among the best means of finding a job in the industry. The annual Salute to Excellence awards and special recognition honors (Lifetime Achievement, Journalist of the Year, Community Service, etc.) are bestowed at each convention.

Each year, NABJ awards nearly \$100,000 in scholarships and internships to college and high school students nationwide, as well as fellowships for seasoned professionals.

NABJ is committed to the following:

Strengthening ties among black journalists;

Sensitizing all media to the importance of fairness in the workplace for black journalists;

Expanding job opportunities and recruiting activities for veteran, young and aspiring black journalists, while providing continued professional development and training:

Increasing the number of black journalists in management positions and encouraging black journalists to become entrepreneurs;

Fostering an exemplary group of professionals that honors excellence and outstanding achievements by black journalists, and outstanding achievement in the media industry as a whole, particularly when it comes to providing balanced coverage of the black community and society at large;

Working with high schools and colleges to identify and encourage black students to become journalists, and to diversify faculties and related curriculum; and

Providing informational and training services to the general public.
