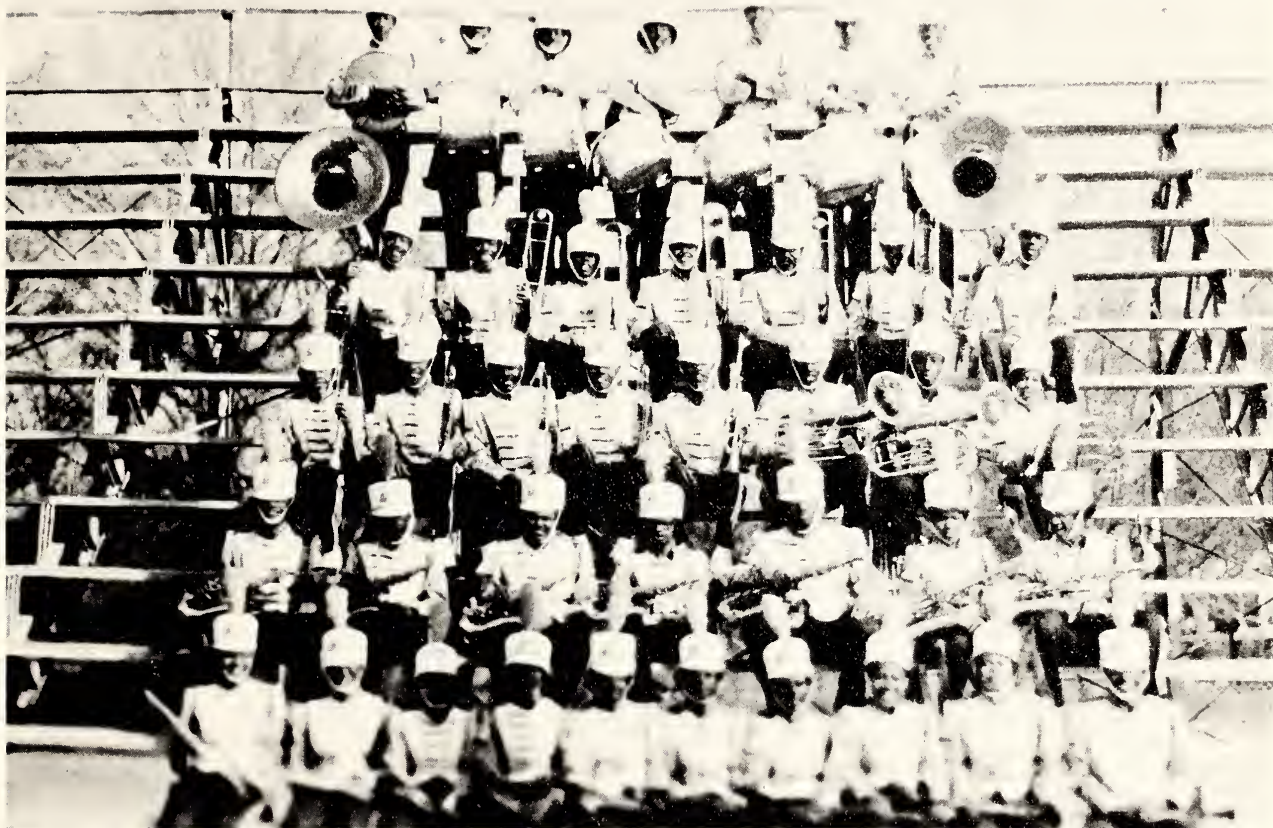

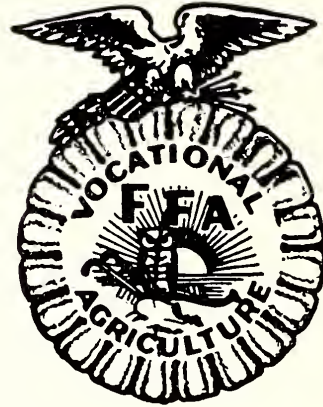

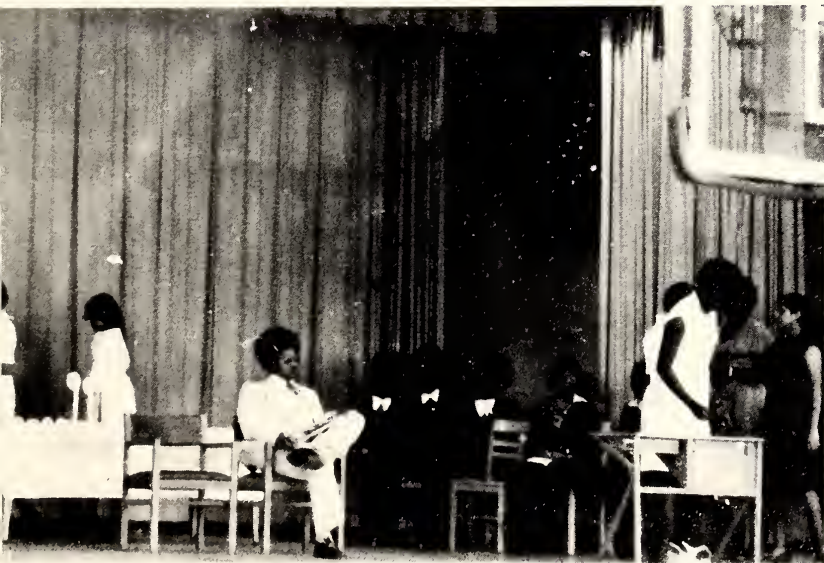
Honor Society

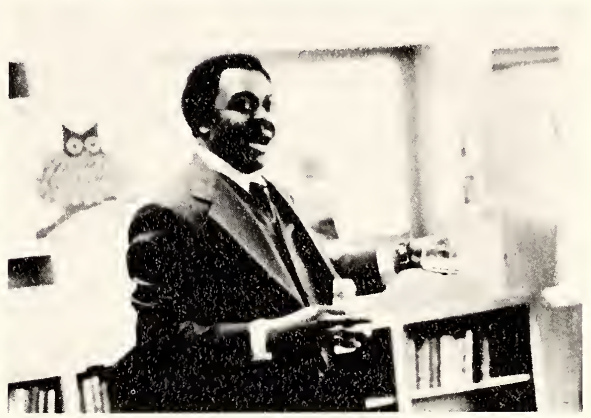


Future Homemakers of America

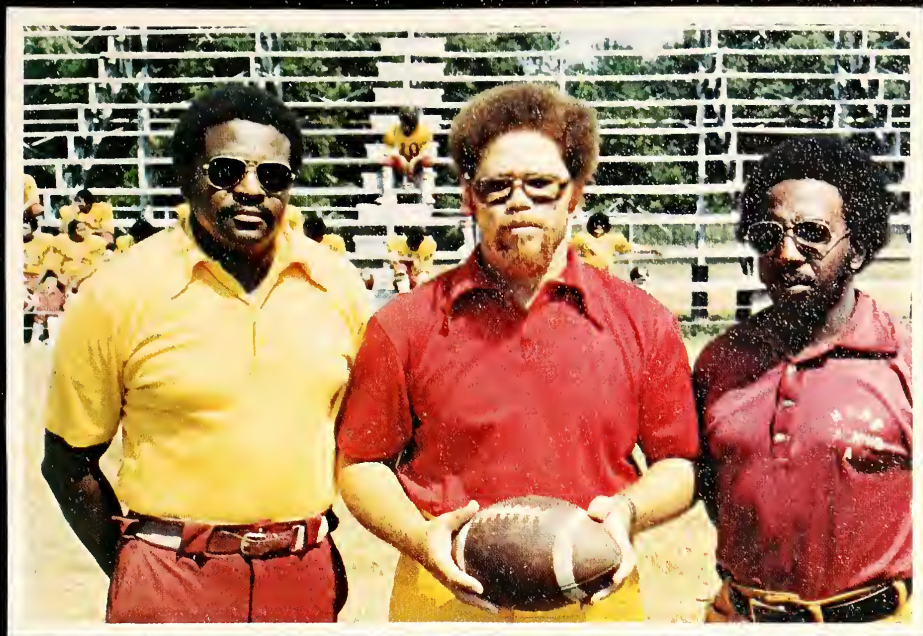

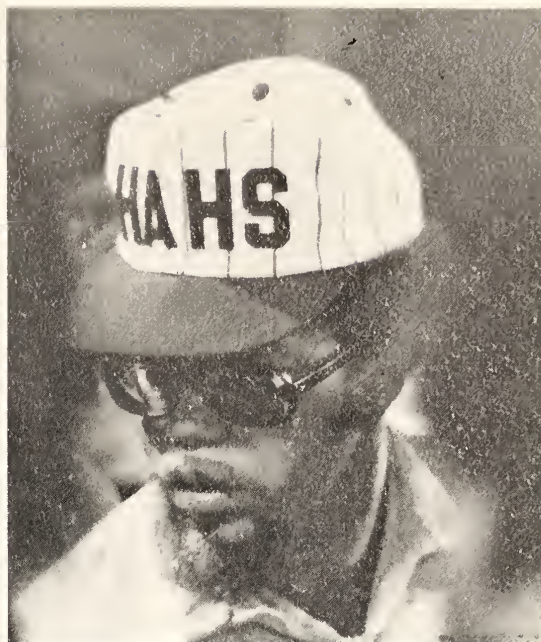

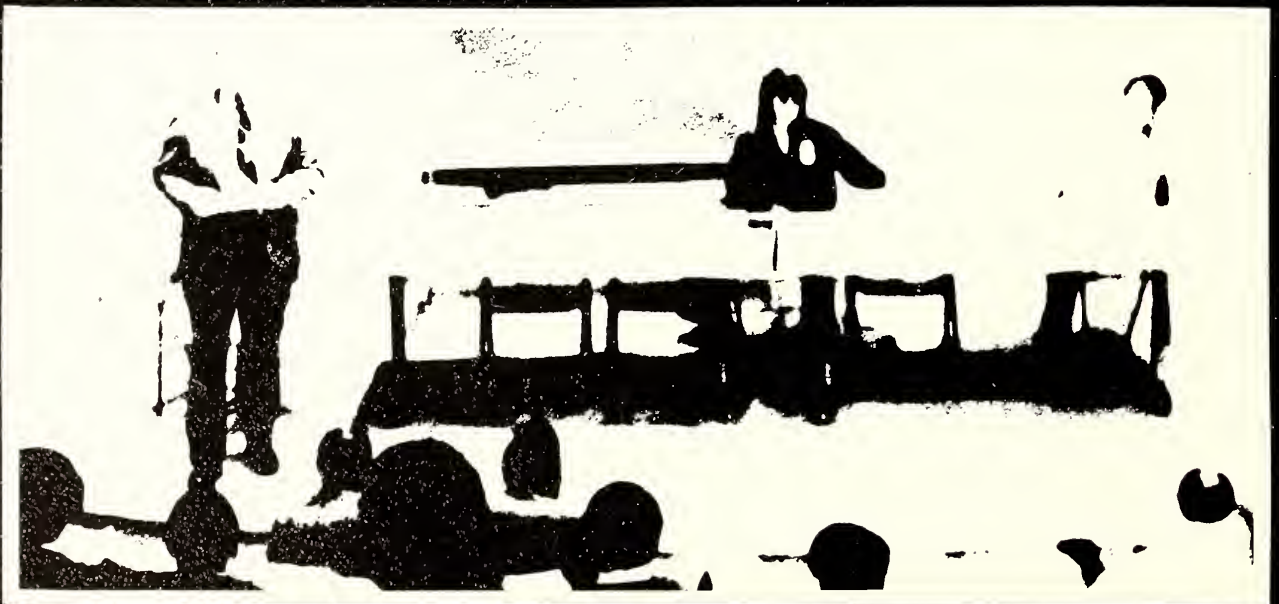
