









BAND

Clifton Brown, a senior from Raymond, was elected President of the Mississippi Association of National Honor Society at a state meeting in Greenwood, MS last spring.


He has played an active role in the state and local chapters of this organization. We, the Bullpups, were exceedingly proud of Clifton.






Learning mechanical and trade skills helped these students to set their life's mission.
