The social highlight for the Junior class is the Junior/Senior Prom which is held annually in the Spring.

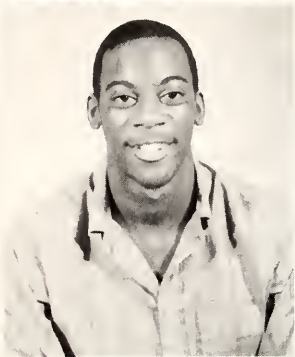
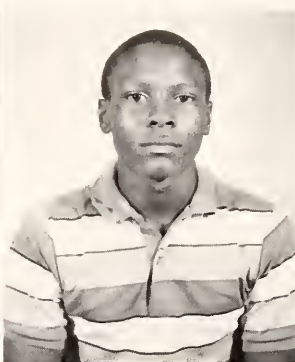

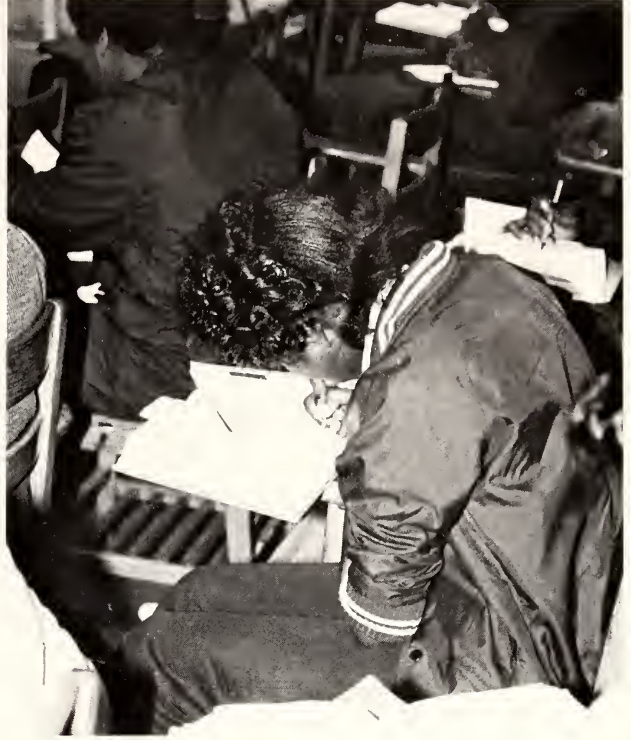

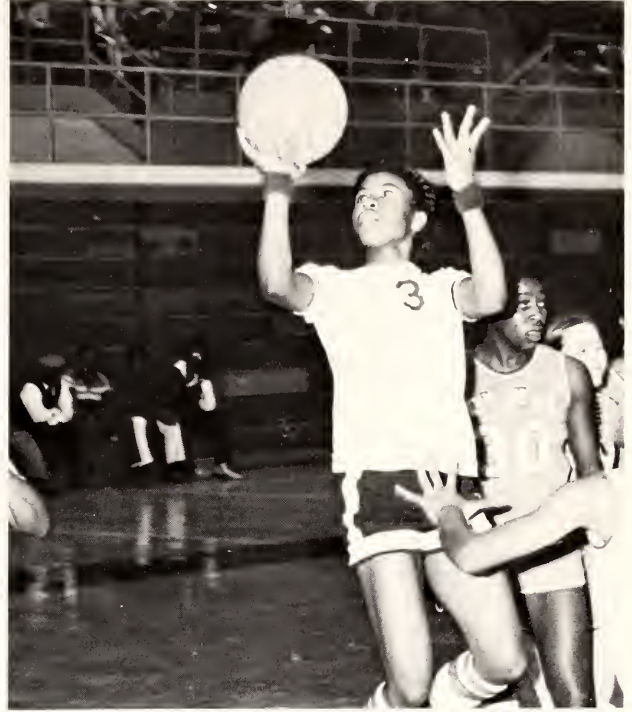
