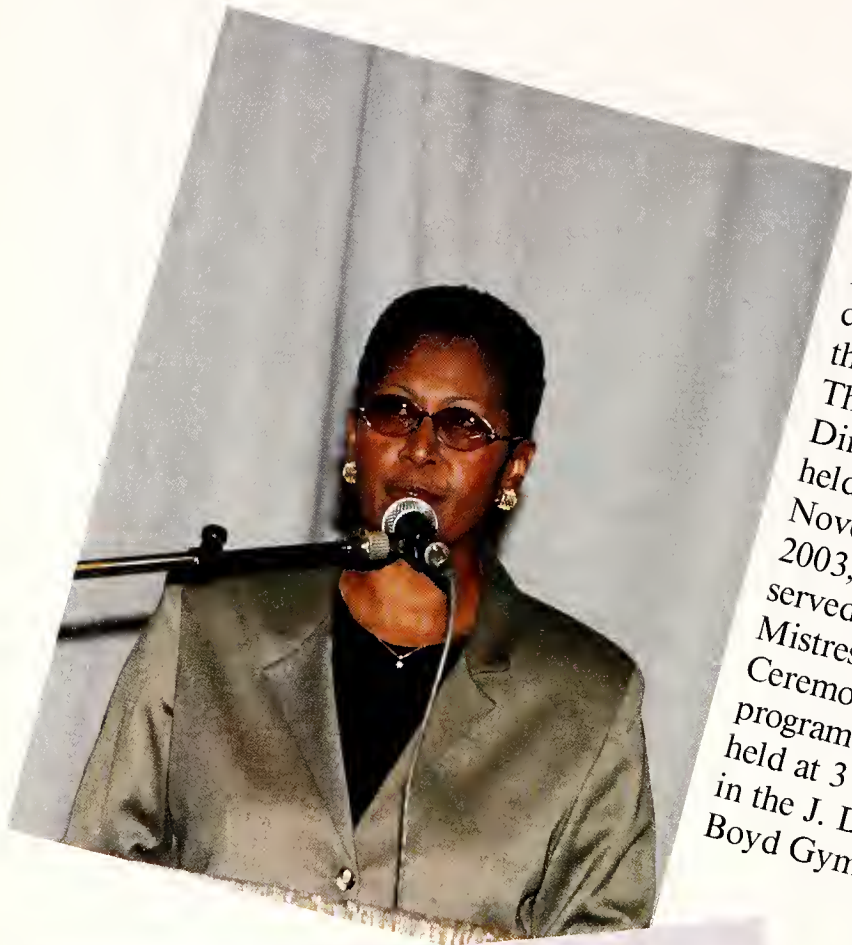

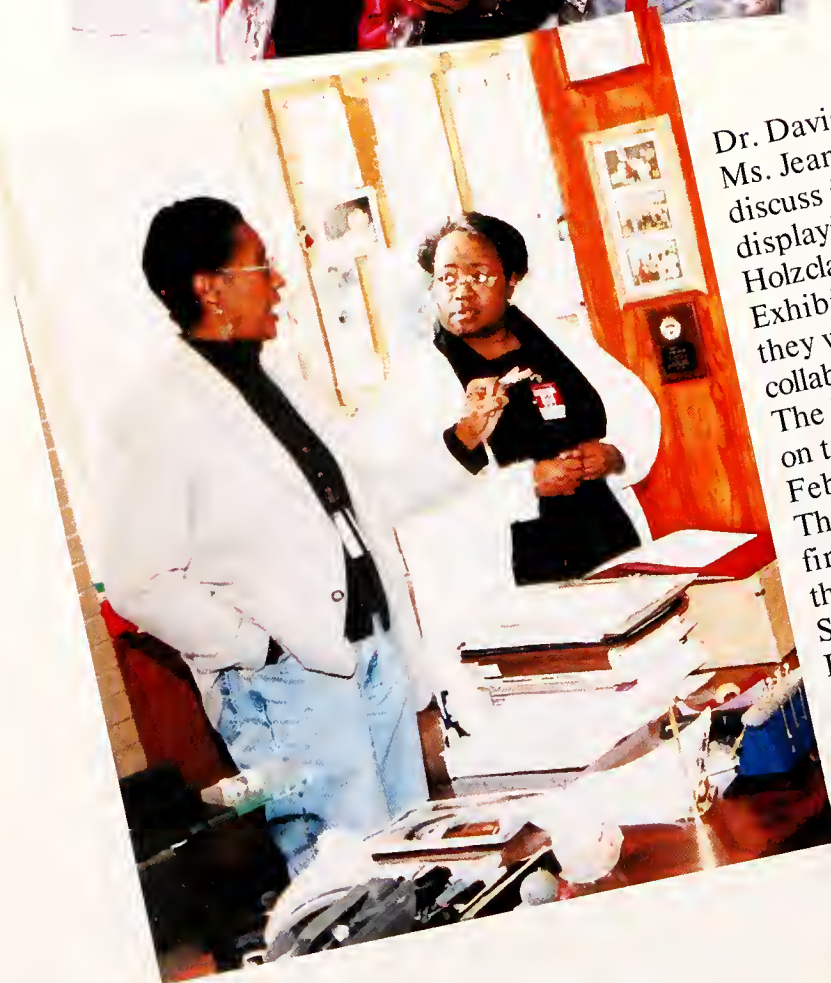

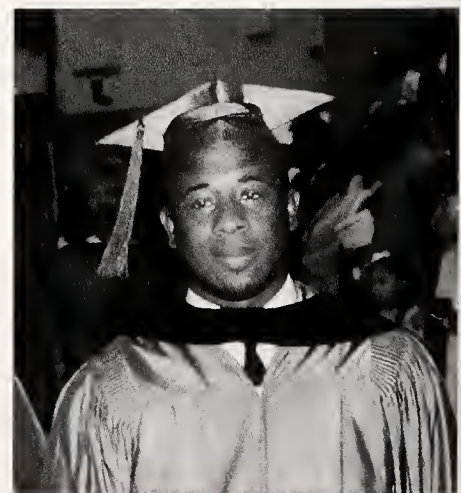

Founder's Day 2003

"Embracing the Legacy, Upholding the Promise"

The day began with a Prayer Breakfast and Memorial Service that honored the accomplishments of all previous presidents of the College. A candle was lit recognizing each of the college's nine former and present leaders. The candle lighting ceremony was performed by family members of the honorees or the honorees themselves. There were also several prayers. Those prayers included A Prayer of Thanksgiving, A Prayer for Peace, A Prayer for Unity, and A Prayer for Progress. Dr. George Barnes, Utica Campus vice president, ended the program with remarks.

Following the Prayer Breakfast and Memorial Service, the Founder's Day Program began with the Honorable Rod Paige, United States Secretary of Education, delivering the keynote address.

Over 500 guests were in attendance to hear Dr. Paige's message. Included in the guests were media from throughout central Mississippi.

The Centennial Planning Committee was recognized by the Board of Trustees for their work on the Centennial activities. Following the program, the College dedicated the Workforce Development Center, The William H. Holtzclaw Memorial Cemetery, The original site of the Utica Normal and Industrial Institute, and the Utica Campus Bell Tower in which bricks on the Tower floor were purchased and engraved as a fundraiser for the restoration of the Holtzclaw Mansion. Throughout the day, groups were visiting the Bell Tower in search of their name and to admire the restored landmark.

The day ended with a reception for the entire Campus.

William H. Holtzclaw Touring Exhibit

In its 100th year celebration, the Utica Campus presented The William H. Holtzclaw Touring Exhibit as a testament to the Holtzclaw legacy, depicting the early years and also the Utica Campus at present. This exhibit represents a magnificent demonstration that the administration, faculty, students, and community are "Embracing the Legacy, Upholding the Promise." Included in the exhibit are vintage photos of supporters, faculty, students, and organizations Holtzclaw started, buildings constructed with students and community labor, Holtzclaw's home and family, and books about Holtzclaw. To bring continuity to the exhibit, professional staff developed a video. The collage of the present campus was done by Randy Minton, art instructor,

and LaTonya Rankin, multimedia specialist. The display panel and other photos were arranged by Jean Greene, Utica Campus librarian.

After developing the programs and physical plant of the school, Holtzclaw shared the school and community's accomplishments by writing and printing at the Utica Institute, *The Black Man's Burden* by 1915, making him one of the first blacks in Mississippi to have a published work.

William Henry Holtzclaw died in August 1943, in his home on the campus which he founded 40 years earlier. The epitaph inscribed on his tomb describes the life of a great man: "He built his monument in the hearts of men."

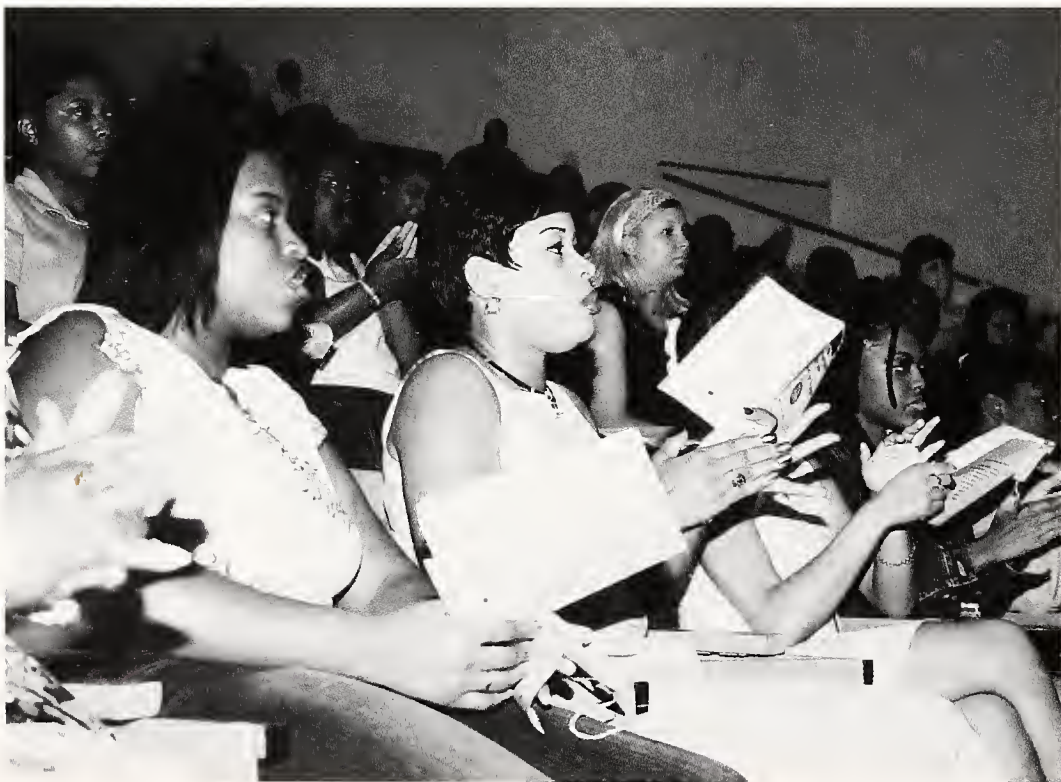


Honors and Awards Day

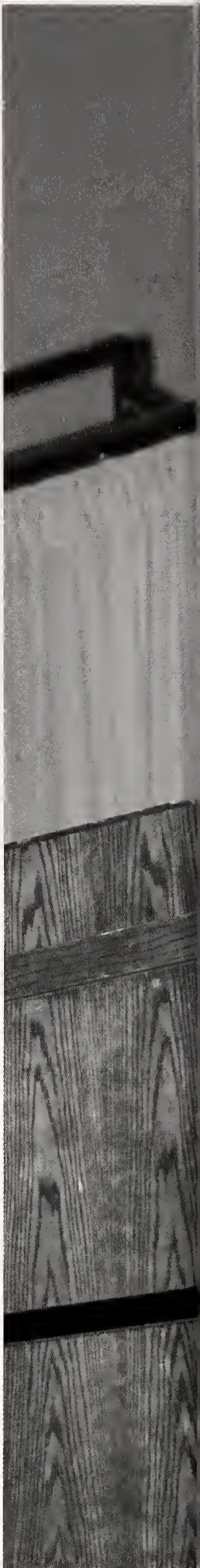
Teacher Education Conference

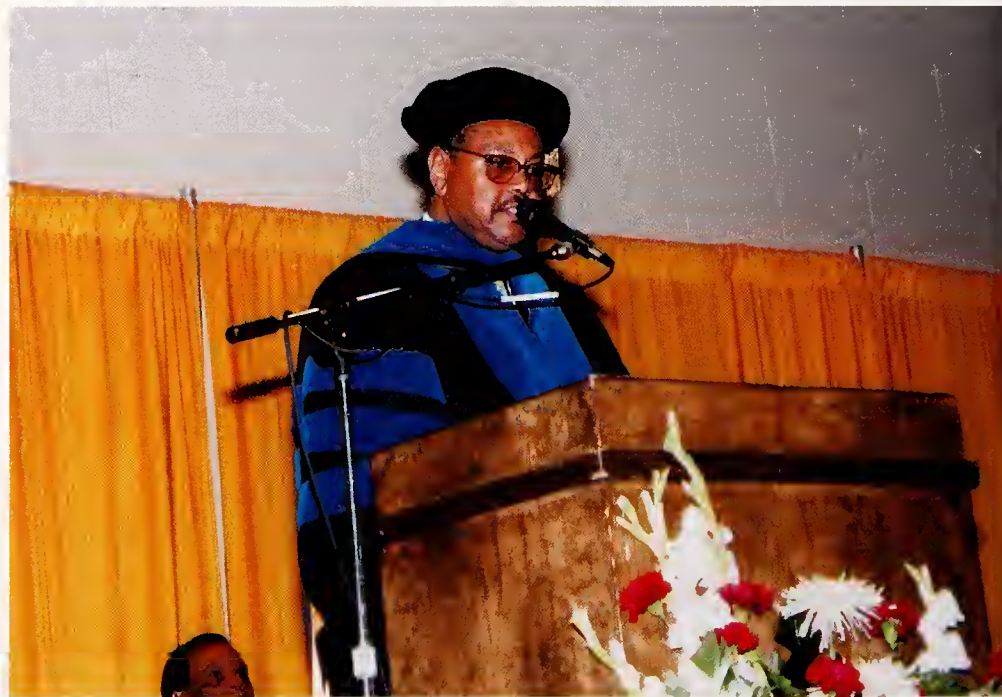

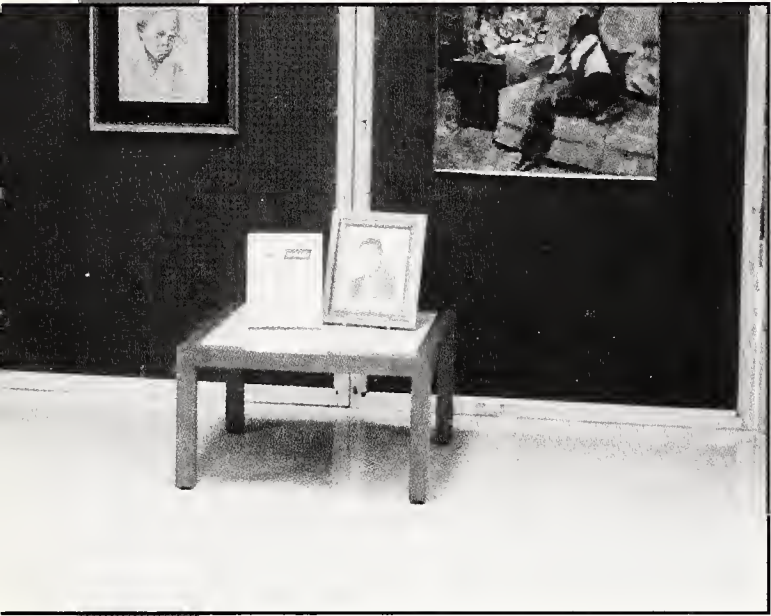

The William Holtzclaw Library displays a fine collection of Dr. Hugh Ellis Stevens' art work. Pictured right is a painting entitled, "Home."

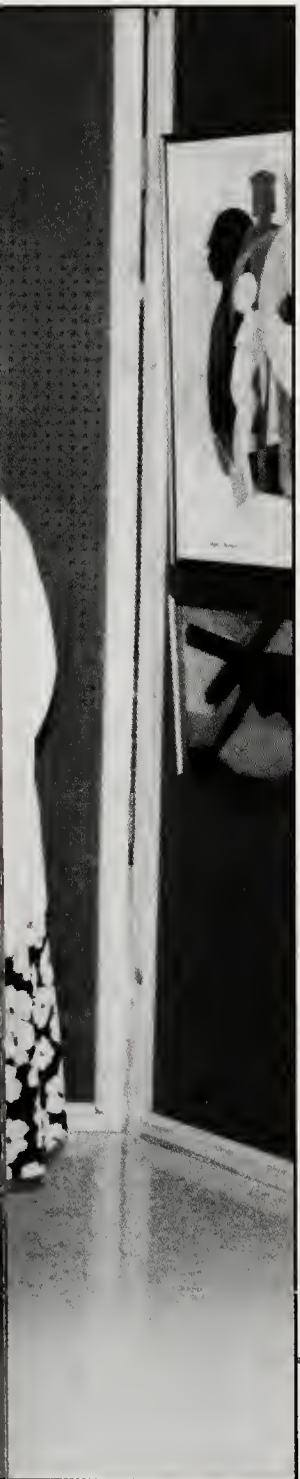


Art Exhibit

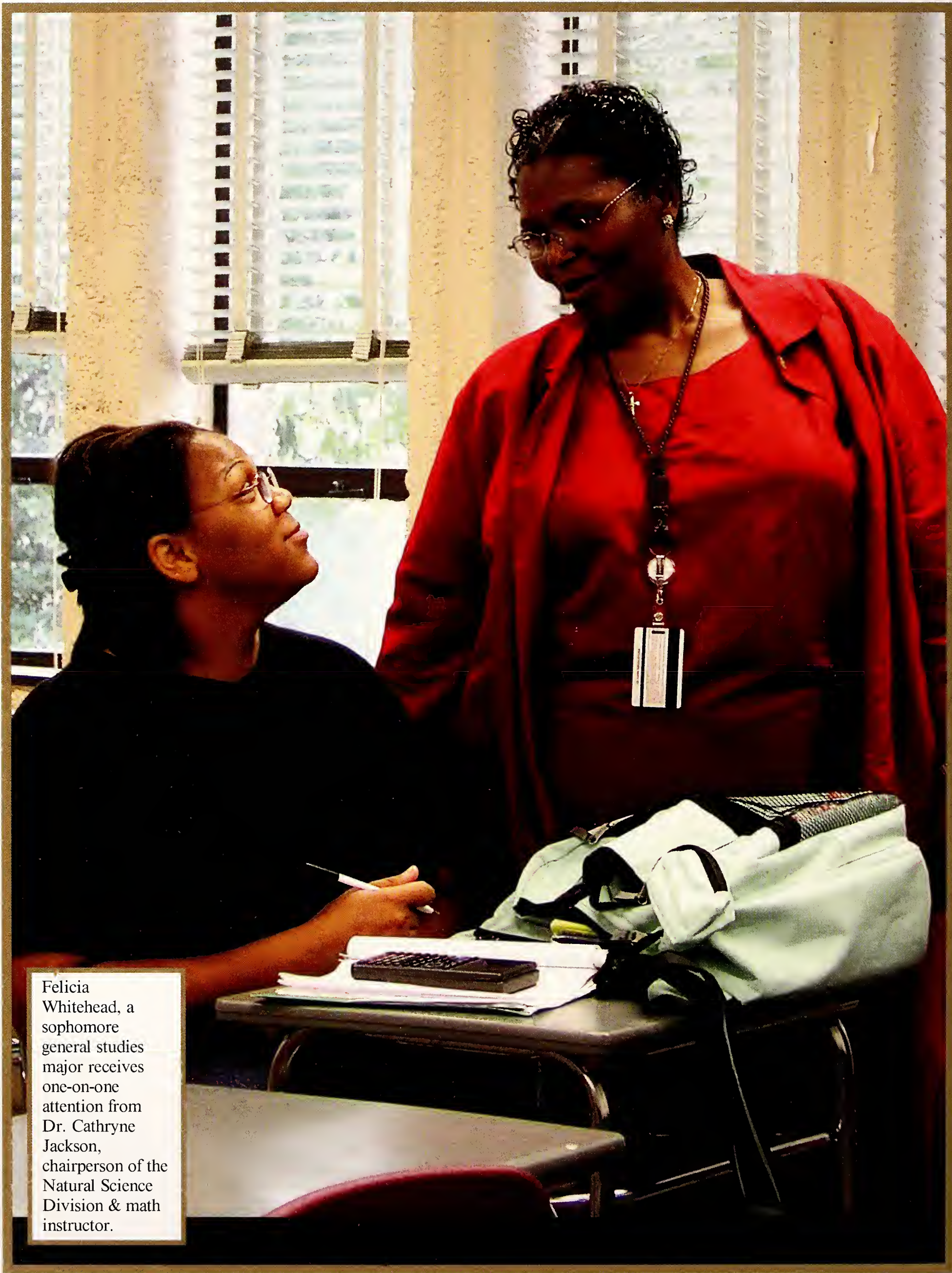

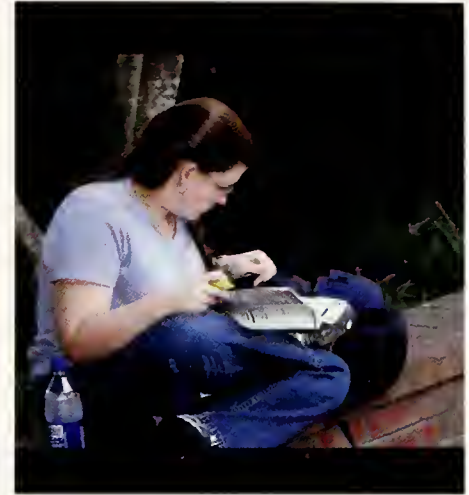

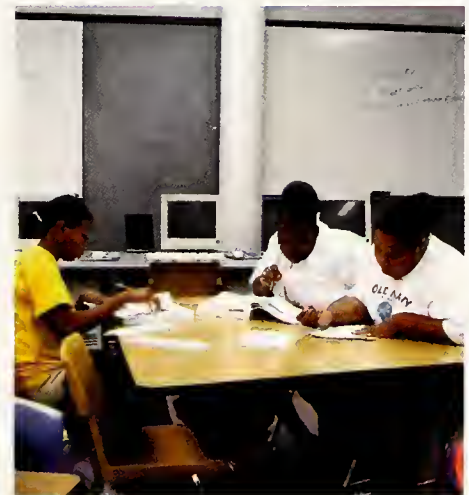
Students from building construction demonstrate their skills by framing a storage house.

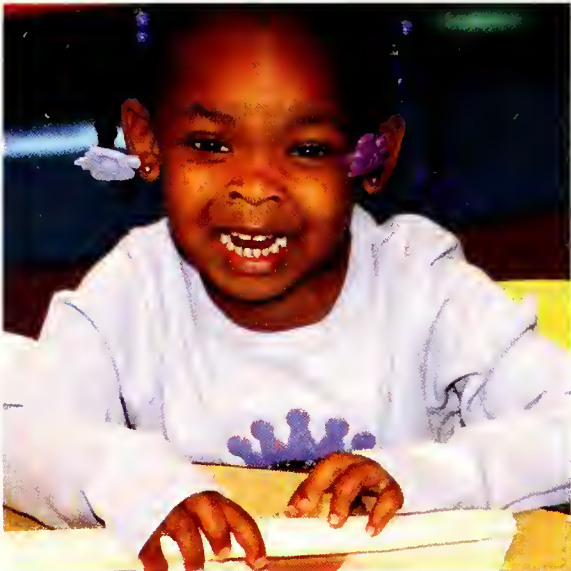

Child Care Lab Extends Its Services

The Child Development Technology Program has 69 students enrolled with two instructors. The Utica Campus Child Development Technology Program was the first junior/community college in the State to receive national accreditation, which was awarded in December 1993. That accreditation is from the National Association of the Education of Young Children. Every three years the Program is evaluated by personnel from the national office for re-certification purposes. This academic year, 2003-2004, the program is scheduled for its third evaluation.

The Child Development Technology Program sponsors a Child Care Conference each year where national child care professionals serve as speakers and or performers. State and local child care professionals also conduct various workshops during the conference which is usually held in April during the National Week of the Young Child. The Utica Campus conference carries the national theme, "Children's Opportunities - Our Responsibilities."

The Child Development Technology Program is a two year Technical Program. The instructors are Mrs. Marilyn Davis and Mrs. Laketha Berry.

Welding and Cutting

Welding is a one-year Career Program. Upon graduation, students are skilled to enter the workforce.

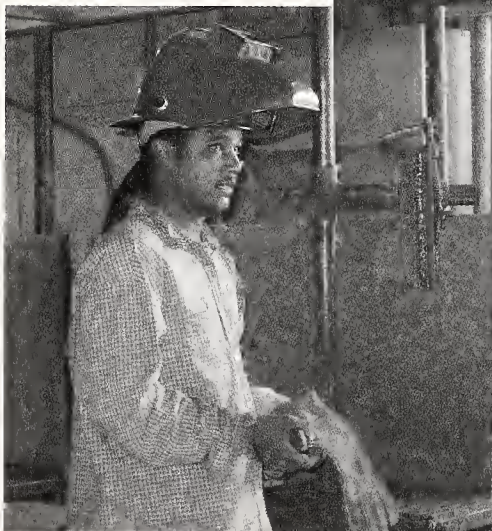
The instructor is Mr. Freddie Edwards.

The Welding and Cutting Program includes Shielded Metal Arc Welding, Flux Cored Arc Welding, Gas Metal Arc Welding, Pipe Welding, Plasma Arc Welding, Carbon Arc Welding, Oxyfuel Cutting, Gas Metal Arc Aluminum Welding, and Gas Tungston Arc Welding.

Students learn to clean their tools and equipment before and after each project.

Protective gear is needed when performing any kind of welding. The correct clothing, hand wear, foot wear and eye wear are all a part of being an effective welder.

Students are behind a protective covering when welding which keeps any flying objects or debris from traveling outside of the welding area.



Career Education Programs

Residential Carpentry Technology



Students are taught the safe and correct way to use the saw, one of the most used instruments in Carpentry and Construction.

The Residential Carpentry Program is a one-year Career Program designed to prepare students to enter the workforce upon completion. Graduates receive a certificate of completion.

Auto Body and Collision Repair Technology

Auto Body and Collision Repair Technology is an instructional program designed to prepare students for entry-level jobs in the collision repair and refinishing trade. Upon completion of this program, students are prepared for entry-level positions as body frame and refinish technicians. Students are provided theory, practical repair, and refinish work beginning with basic applications and progressing on to heavy collision repairs requiring major body and frame alignment and panel replacement. The instruction includes all phases necessary to teach collision repair including glass replacement, trim replacement, and cosmetic and structural repairs.

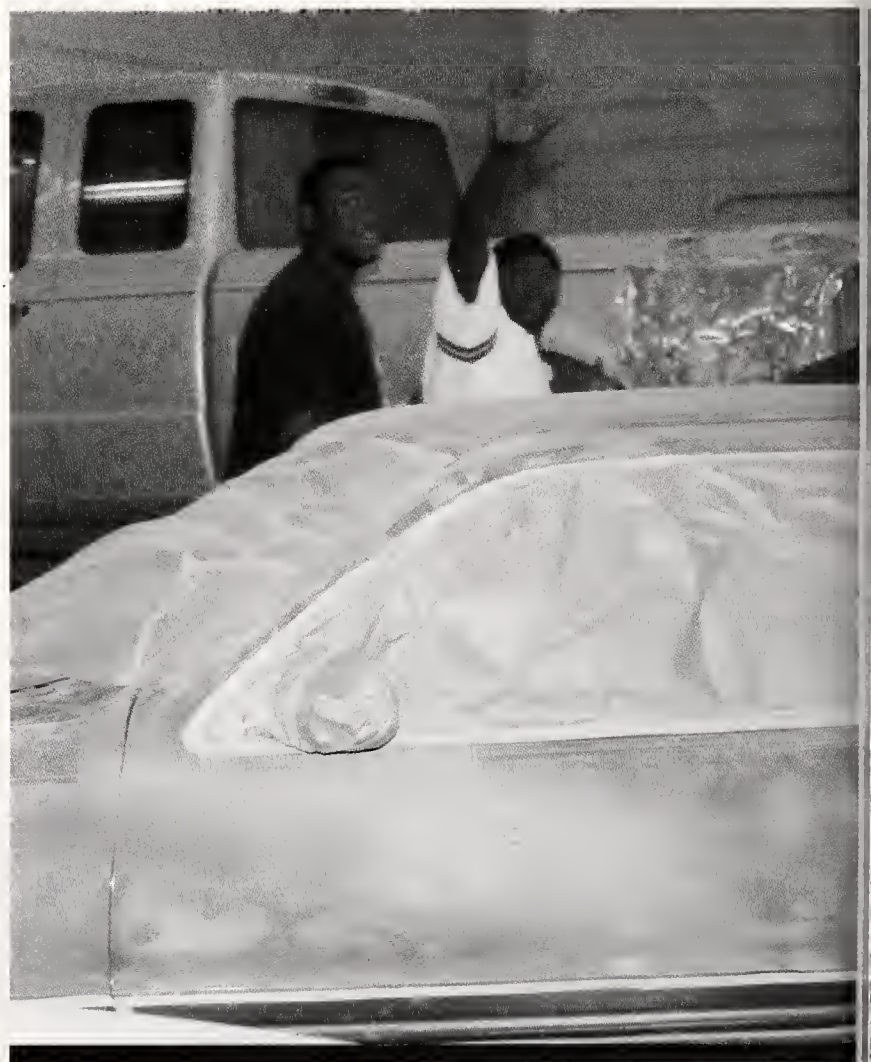
The Auto Body and Collision Repair Technology program is under the leadership of Mr. Robert Jacobs.

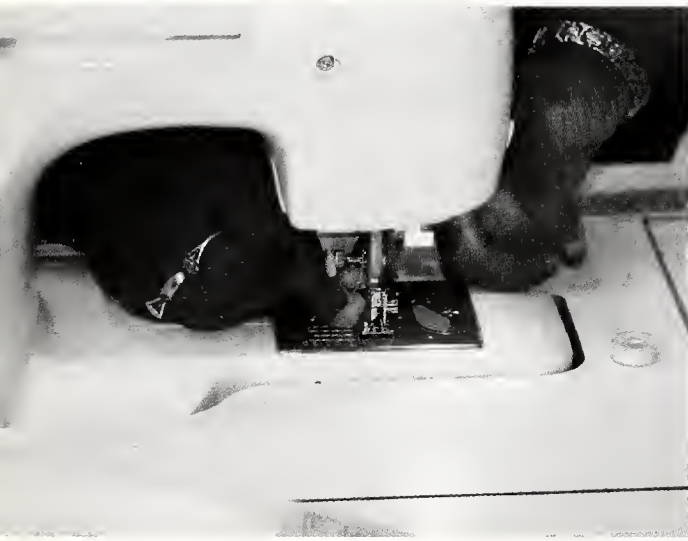

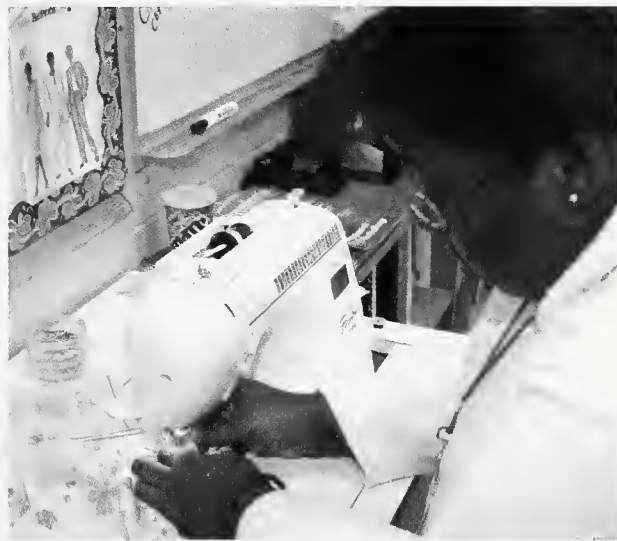
Clothing and Textile

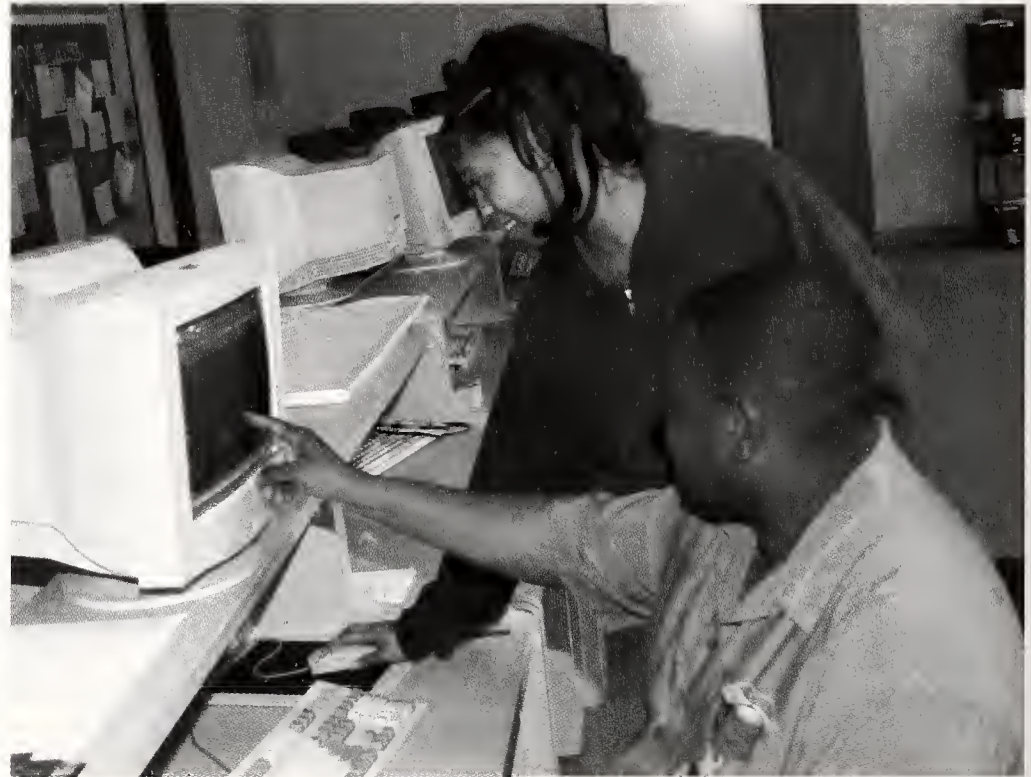

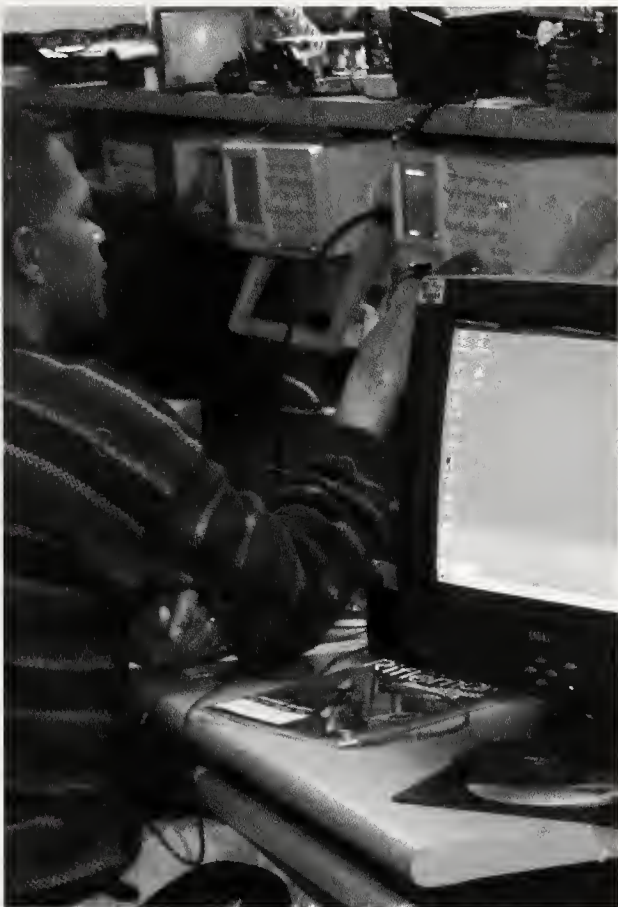

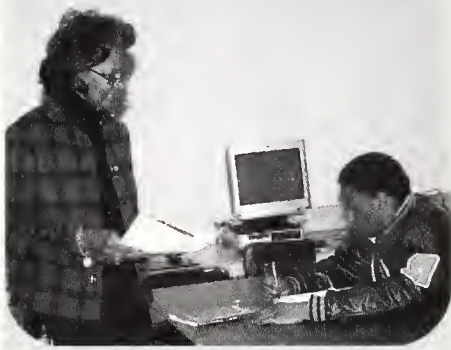

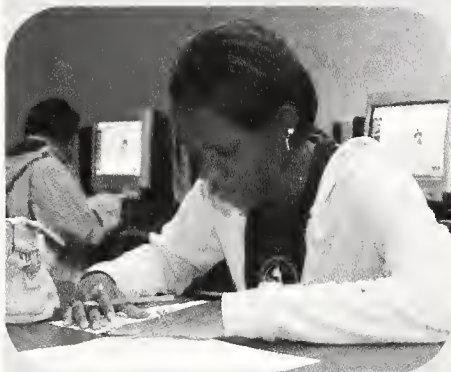

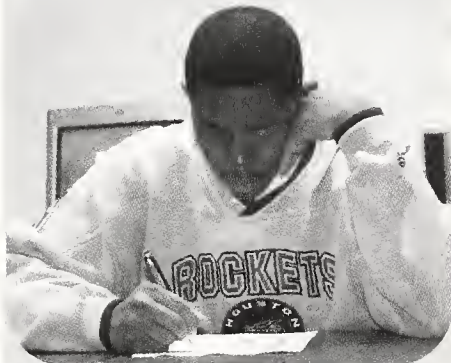

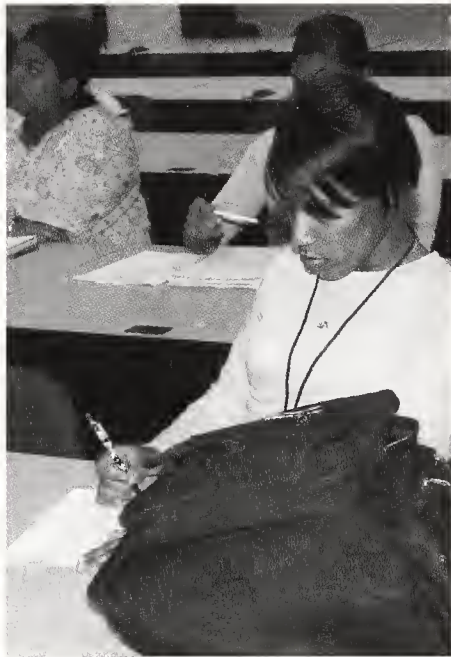

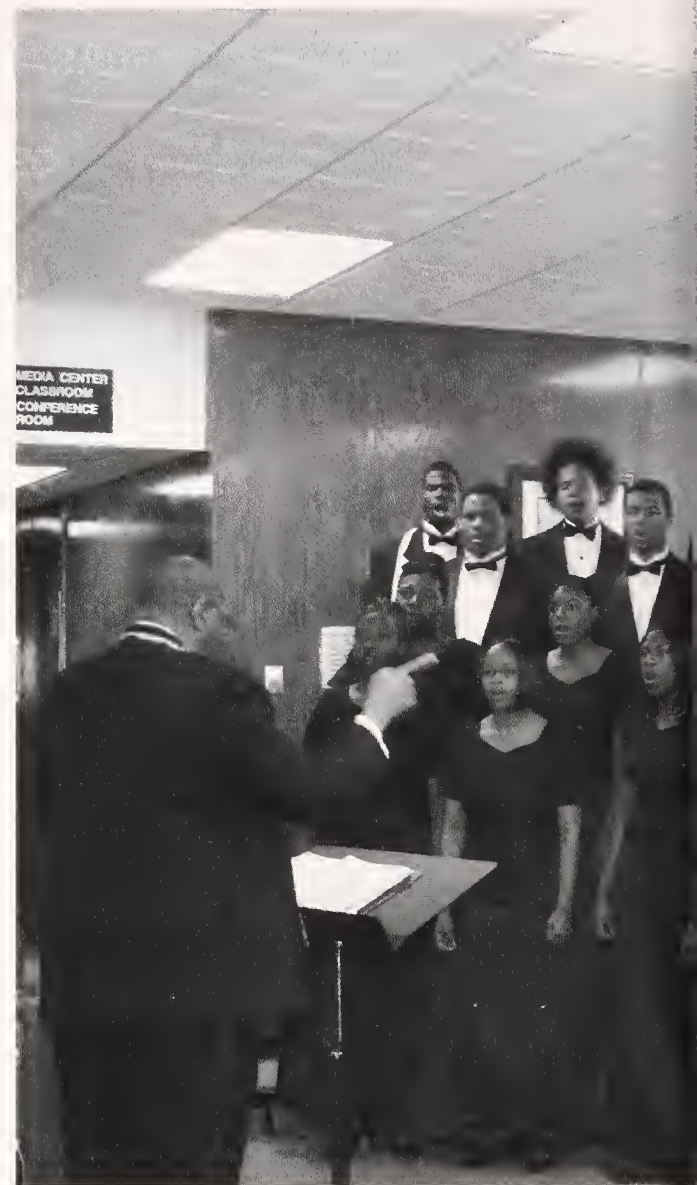


Christmas Choir Concert

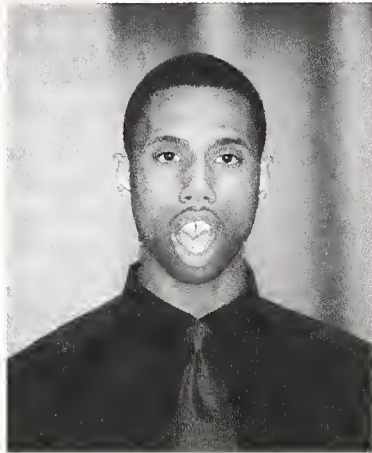

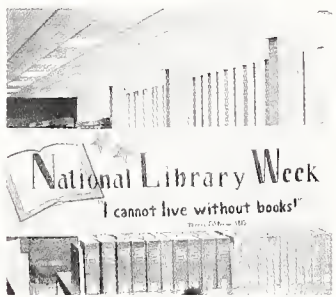

The faculty and students of Hinds AHS and the Utica Campus welcomed the Bridgewater College students and staff and shared educational experiences.



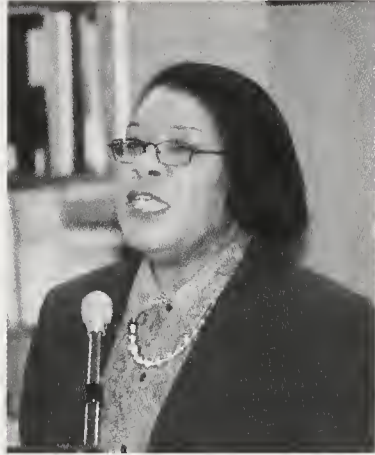

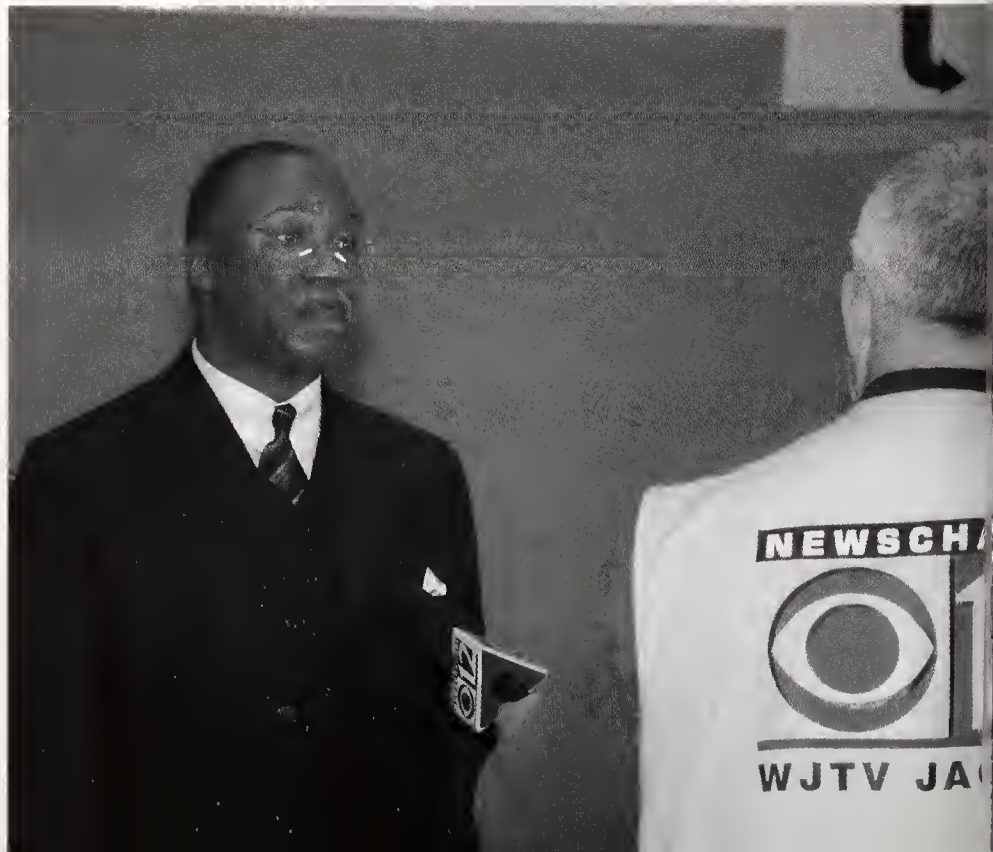

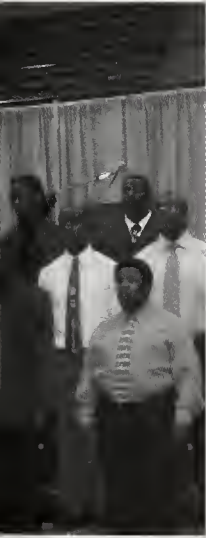
"Before Brown, Beyond Boundaries: 50th anniversary of Brown vs Topeka Board of Education"

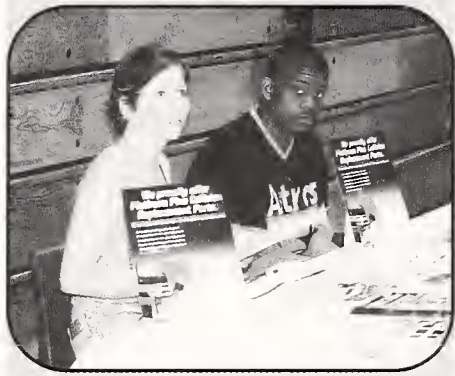

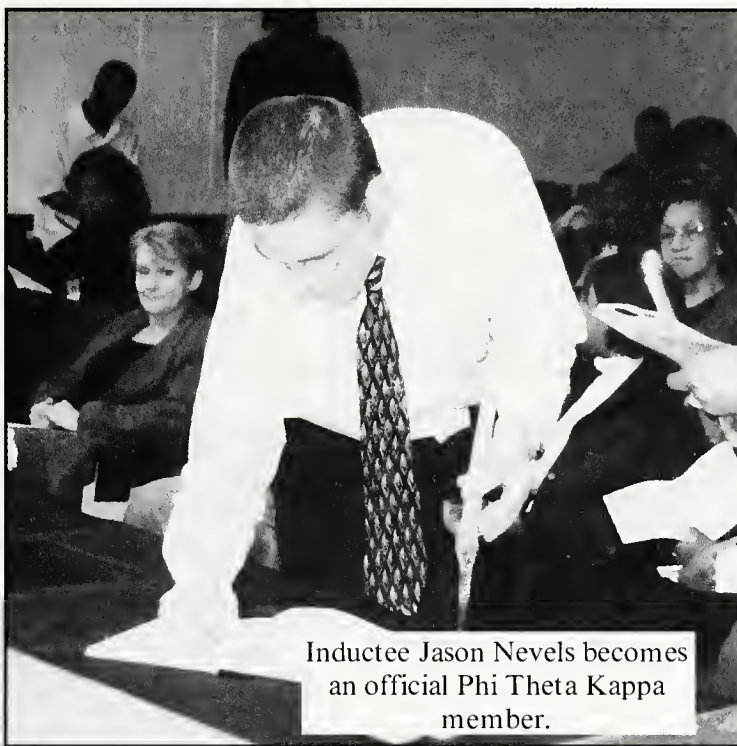

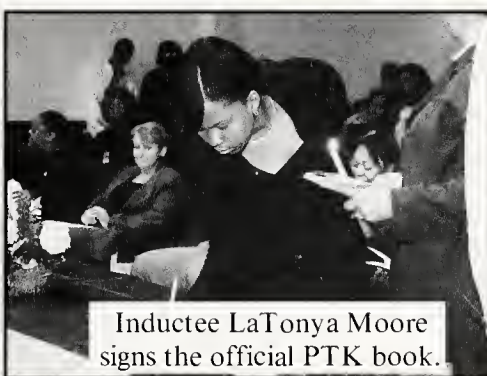

Kimble Travels to South Africa

A select group of people from Oprah Winfrey's Book Club will accompany her to South Africa after reading the novel, Cry the Beloved Africa.

Hello Ms. Winfrey,

My name is Sharon Kimble. I am a 36 year old wife and mother of two boys' ages 18 and 8. Recently, I began teaching History at a small historically black community college in Utica, Mississippi. Previously, I taught in the public school system in Jackson, Mississippi, where we often took history building trips across the United States. It has always been my goal to expose students to as much as I possibly can. Students in rural Mississippi often time have not traveled outside of their communities. I occasionally talk with my family and my students about someday being able to sponsor a trip to Africa. That's a little easier to do with college age students. I would be able to better respond to my students if I could first see a little bit of the country myself. I was elated when I heard the title of your most recent book club pick.

The novel, Cry the Beloved Country, has been one of my favorite classroom assignments since I first discovered the movie a few years ago. I immediately realized that it could be the ideal teaching tool to connect the two movements, Apartheid and the Civil Rights Movement. That's when I located and read the book. After reading the book and viewing the video along with a classroom discussion, the students are asked to look a little deeper into the Civil Rights Movement in the U.S. and Apartheid in South Africa in order to complete the research paper. Students are asked to pay special attention to the judicial system, the gold mines versus cotton plantations, views of Christianity, and the bus boycotts. This has proven to be an eye opening experience for my students. Students who are too young to have experienced these things often go home and talk with

their parents and grandparents about the movement. Not only are they learning about a defining moment in history, but now there is a dialogue between parents and children about their own family history and culture. **This is why I teach!**

In closing, if I am chosen as one of those blessed viewers to travel to South Africa with you, it would be a dream come true. It is one thing to teach civil rights and apartheid to my students, but to be able to travel to South Africa and to tour the country can be one of the defining moments in any teacher's life. This will especially be an outstanding experience for one whose life's work is to help students to connect with the past in a way that will encourage them to focus on not allowing this history to repeat itself.

Thank you for the opportunity and I look forward to hearing from you.

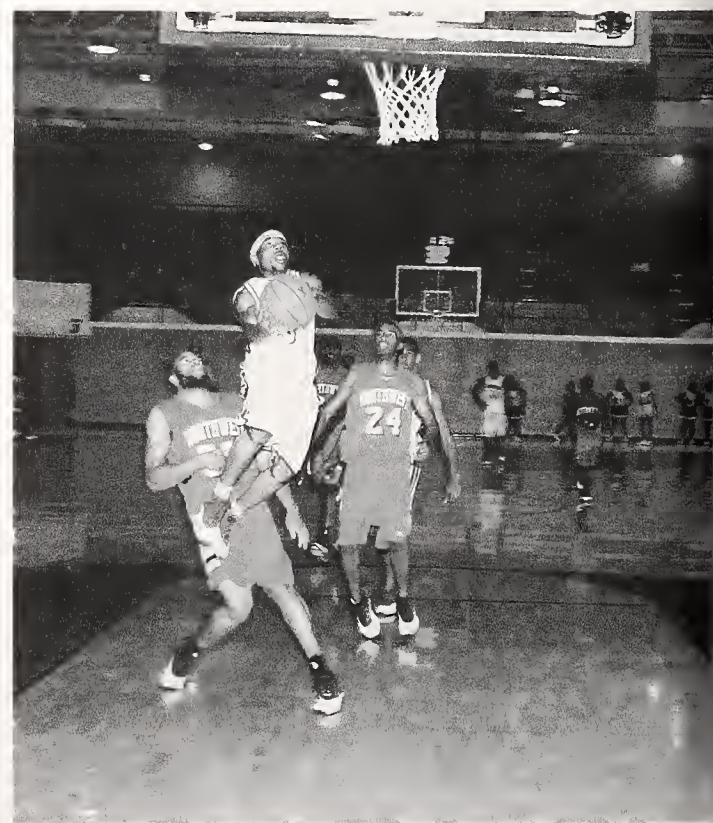

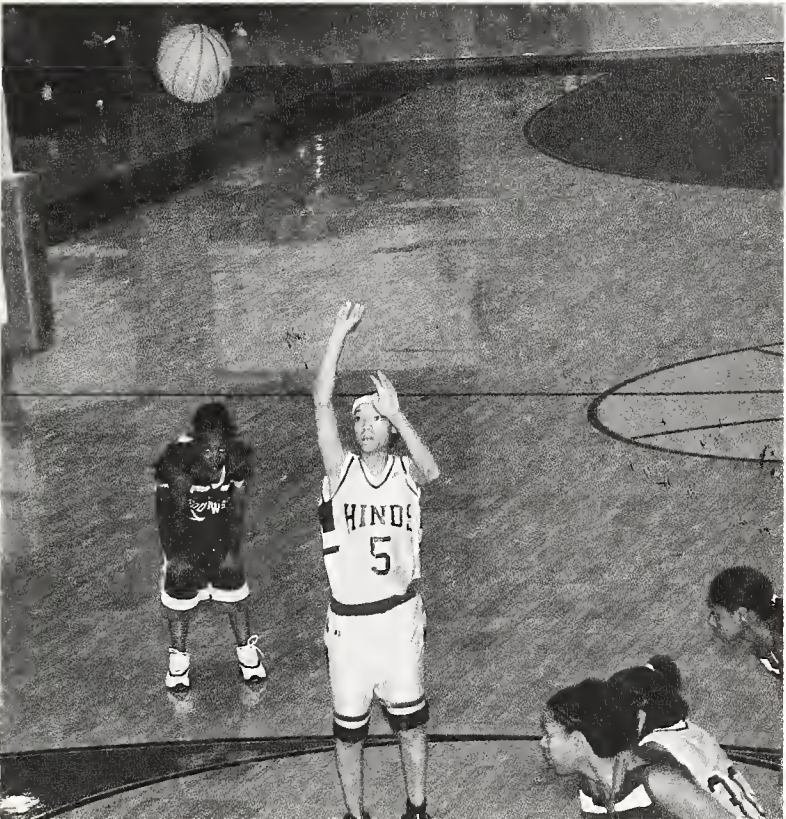

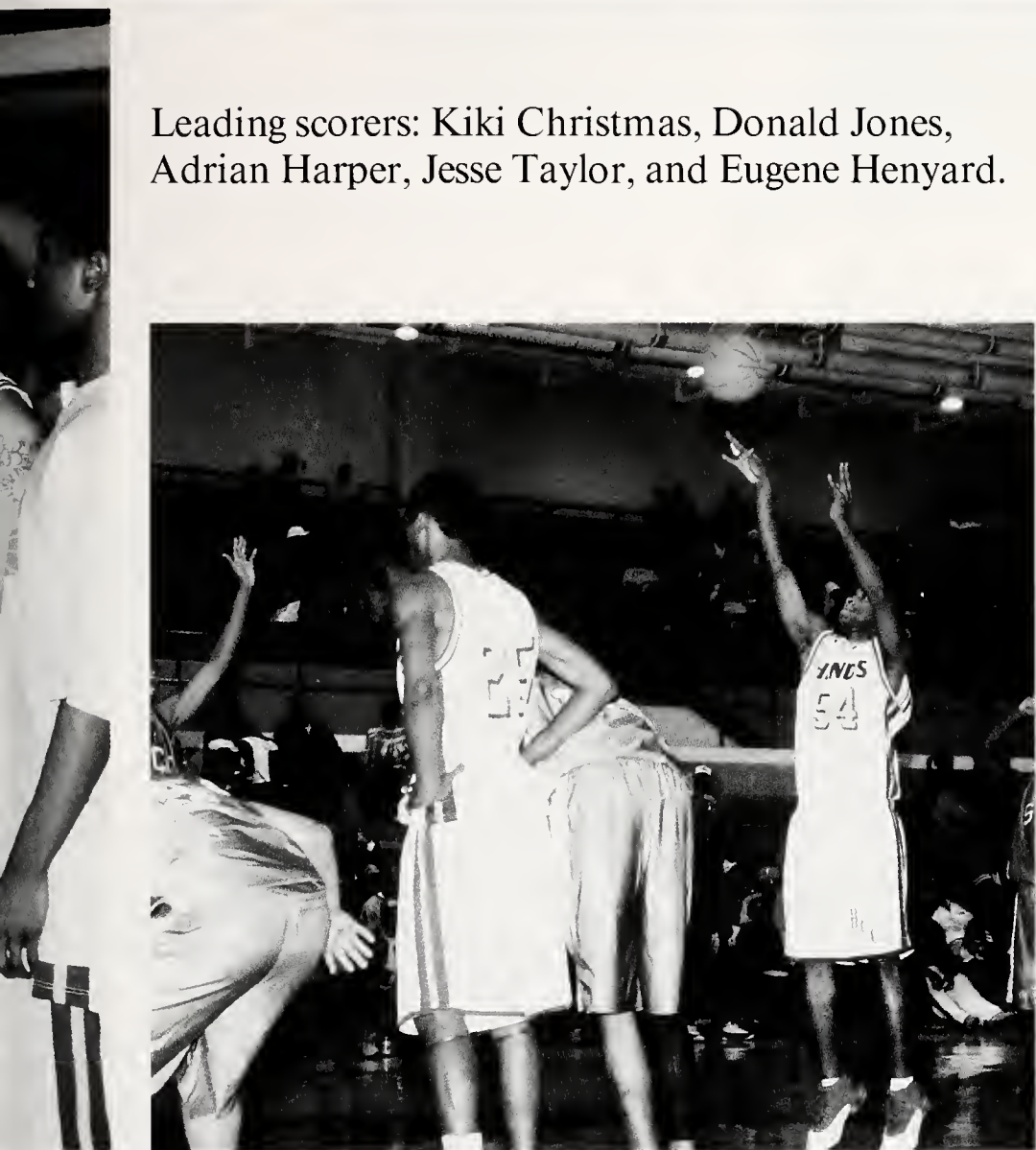
