## A JOURNEY INTO DARKNESS



In the AFRICAN SEQUENCE, music and movement are used to show some of the cultural developments of our African heritage The scene goes from the joys of ceremonial dance to the confusion of captivity. The scene ends with the symbolic crossing of the Atlantic through the MIDDLE PASSAGE

In the SLAVERY SEQUENCE, the cast does an innovative turn in that the capacity to
laugh, under oppressive conditions, is brought forth. Humor in the midst of difficulty was and is the basis of survival and historic creativity.




Humor is displayed during a Saturday Night Frolic, a time for relaxing after a week of work. Fun and friendship depict a warm side of Black life style. However, the lights fade after the fun frolic of Saturday, and when the stage is seen again (in the next instance) the same good time Saturday nighters go to church with pomp, piety and prayer. But beneath the sobriety of Black RELIGIOUS EXPERIENCE, the humor, ego and the urge to "be somebody"-even if only once a week, prevails. Finally, "after Sunday comes Monday," the audience is reminded that life goes on seven days a week.

The cast forms a solid line of unity and the performance ends with an appeal for Black Americans to take PRIDE IN THEIR PAST: plus a challenge to the White Americans to understand the BLACK EXPERIENCE AS A POSITIVE FACTOR in our national life.
Because in the final analysis, people cannot love others until they learn to love themselves, under God.
