

### About Dr. Vacik

Stephen (Steve) Vacik is the seventh President of Hinds Community College. Dr. Vacik came to Hinds Community College in 2020, and has nearly 25 years of experience working in various roles with community colleges in four states.

Previously, he served as president of Maysville Community and Technical College, a member institution of the Kentucky Community and Technical College System. During his tenure, MCTC built and relocated onto a new campus in Rowan County, secured numerous public and private grants and gifts, established new programs in high-wage, high-demand careers, and increased significantly the number of high school students enrolled in dual credit classes. MCTC enjoyed its highest annual production of student credentials twice and reduced the achievement gap between URM students and the overall student body to less than two percent during his tenure.

Dr. Vacik also served as president of Colby Community College in Colby, KS, from 2011—2015. While at CCC, he served as Secretary and Vice President of the Council of Presidents (KACCT), Vice-Chair of EduKan Online (distance learning consortium of western Kansas colleges) and as a founding member of the Kansas Articulation and Transfer Council through the KS Board of Regents.

Prior to serving as president at CCC, Vacik was chief instructional officer at East Mississippi Community College, and he spent eight years at Bevill State Community College in Alabama, where he served in a variety of roles, including faculty member, Student Support Services (TRIO) Director, college-wide career- technical administrator and as Fayette Campus CEO, and at the University of Alabama as a full- time staff member in the Gorgas Undergraduate Library. He has served on numerous local, state and national boards and committees.

Though born in North Dakota, Steve, as well as his wife Candace, grew up in Mobile, AL. They have two amazing sons and one equally amazing daughter-in-law, Walter (Sarah), a minister in Overland Park, KS, and Michael, a junior at Kentucky Wesleyan College. ### **Utica Fashion Students Work on Movie Set**

Utica Campus students were part of the Bruce Willis action thriller "A Day to Die" filmed recently in Jackson and set to hit theaters next year.

Clothing and Fashion Design Instructor Jontea Davis and three students, freshman Hannah Bonner of Canton, Ohio, and sophomores Marco White, of Jackson, and Fadiaw Dia of Senegal, Africa, received the opportunity to work one-on-one with the costume design department for two days during filming. Davis said the opportunity came up after she received a call from a former coworker.

"Nadia Bodie, with whom I had worked with on the Mississippi production of 'The Color Purple' play called and said they need assistance for the movie. I couldn't just drop everything here, so I asked if I could bring the students with me," she said.

Davis said she was in charge of costumes for main actors and extras while the students helped put on police patches for certain scenes. They also helped with alterations. Davis said the environment was very fast-paced. "One person might want a hem and another, if it's a main actor, might be a diva and they might want their jacket to be tailored in 45 minutes," Davis said.

Davis said the students were not graded for the project but were given the chance to have experience working on a movie set. But not only did they gain experience, they also have a work credit they can add to their resume and a future professional connection. "When this film opens they will have their names listed in the movie credits. Their names will go under costume design and assistants. Every time the movie plays their names will pop up. They also made a connection with the costume designer on the set," Davis said.

The group didn't get the chance to work directly with Willis, but were able to work with his stunt double.



### MIBEST program the perfect comfort zone for Utica Campus student

DeSharra Stamps has always understood the big picture, but occasionally the fine details have tripped her up. "I was in tutorial classes at Raymond High School from freshman year through senior year," she said. "I have an issue with short-term comprehension skills. Sometimes, I have to receive information several times before I can understand it."

Stamps, 25, of Edwards, received a certificate after high school but not a full diploma since she didn't pass two parts of the state test to graduate. She began pursuing her High School Equivalency at Hinds in 2014, eventually landing at the Utica Campus due to the bus transportation provided there.

"I had trouble getting into college because I didn't have my high school diploma," she said. "Then, an aunt of mine died. She had encouraged me a lot in school and was taking me to my classes at the time. It was around then that I found out about the MIBEST program and about the transportation they have at Utica. By summer 2018, my mom and I were on board with coming to Utica."

The program allows adult students to train for a job skill while earning their High School Equivalency certificate at the same time. Students are prepared to be job-ready in six months to a year, train in high-demand areas and earn national certifications.

By 2019, Stamps had earned an HSE certificate and began a journey that ends next semester when she earns an Associate of Applied Science in Business Office Technology. Along the way, she has received an Individual Training Account (ITA) scholarship, maintained a 4.0 GPA, earned membership in the Alpha Beta Xi chapter of Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society and been named a President's Scholar twice. Also, she scored well on the Career Readiness Certificate test, a key measuring stick for potential employers who choose to use it.

"My time management has been better since I've been in college," she said. "Before, I'd put things off and not really focus. I've been on top of things by coming to class on time and making sure all my work is completed before the weekend.

"I've always been a hands-on learner, so I enjoyed a class trip we took to a local restaurant and saw the behind-the-scenes look at all parts of the business. As for computers, I've enjoyed using them since my first computer class in the eighth grade. We're learning keyboarding and programs like Access and Excel."

She's made the grade in college with instruction that has made her feel comfortable but still challenged. "My teachers have been hands-on with me, but still give me the space to learn and work on my own," she said. "They're patient with me but make sure I'm understanding it."

Her instructors and advisers are equally deferential when it comes to proper credit for her success. "I knew that DeSharra was a special student from day one," said Kenneth McGriggs, her Business Office Technology instructor. "Her hard work allowed her to excel from her initial courses all the way through to her career and technical certificates. I'm most proud of her becoming a President's Scholar."

As a member of PTK, she's branched out socially by recruiting new members. "She is the first to volunteer for any task or program we are having," said faculty adviser Beverly Trimble. "She participated in the Utica Outreach Program this semester and hosted the Utica Campus table for recruiting."

Stamps sees herself as a potential jack-of-all-trades in the next phase of her life. "I'd love to work in an office, probably as an administrative assistant to start out," she said. "I want to be able to learn about all the things you need to run a business."







For Mr. Perkins, It All Adds Up Profile by Jay Bates


As you may or may not know, Mr. Willie Perkins is in the Mathematics Department and teaches College Algebra, Geometry, and other types of mathematics at the U.

### Automotive Technology driving future for Utica Campus students

UTICA – The Utica Campus Automotive Technology program has some innovative new virtual reality technology to help students learn and train for careers. zSpace is a virtual automotive shop that allows students to practice repair procedures multiple times, which will enable them to pick up new techniques quicker, said Eddie Perry, an instructor in the program.

"It allows us to do a lot of the things we do in the lab in the classroom," Perry said of the new teaching tool. "We can disassemble engines. We can assemble engines. We can take parts out of the engine on the screen in 3D form and we turn that part around to get a better view."



With zSpace, the automotive students now have the ability to run various simulations in a virtual automotive shop, allowing them to practice repair procedures multiple times. Perry believes this will allow him to teach his students new techniques quicker. "We don't have to wait on a vehicle to come to the shop. We can just open Zspace and model the repair in the classroom," he said.

Perry isn't the only one excited about the introduction of the zSpace. Freshman Wendell Griffin, 60, of Edwards, see this as an opportunity to hone his skills. Griffin has been working on cars since he was 17 and believes the zSpace can only help him better help is customers.

"You can kind of visualize what you are going to work on rather than going in there guessing," Griffin said. "It just lays everything out and you can practice visually. That's amazing, because a lot of the time when I tear an engine down, I'm just guessing and you can damage stuff when you do that, plus it's time-consuming."

Fellow freshman Cortavious Ross, of Vicksburg, says he enjoys using zSpace but still likes the chance to work on actual vehicles.

Jonathan Townes, dean of Career and Technical Education, believes the zSpace will help current students and future students. "As students continue to grow, technology is increasing and one thing we wanted to do was increase technology infrastructure. This will allow us the ability to satisfy the needs of tech-savvy future students who are more aware of virtual instruction," Townes said.

The new concept of auto shop should also better prepare students for post-college life. "I'm always trying to do whatever is needed to get them into the industry and get them jobs as quick as possible," Perry said. "This will make them more prepared for the industry. With the zSpace, you can see and experience what the problems are and do it. But, it's not as hands-on."

The zSpace was funded by a \$24,000 allocation from federal CARES Act. The department was able to purchase the zSpace license on a large CPU and six student laptops.

Led by Mr. Kelsey Dotson, the Collision Repair Technology program is designed to provide students with specialized skills for entry level jobs in the collision repair and refinishing trade. Our students receive the best training and instruction in repair and refinish work beginning with basic applications and progressing to heavy collision repairs requiring major body and frame alignment and panel replacement. In just one year, students may complete a Career Certificate and be ready for employment. Students also have the option to pursue a Technical Certificate and Associates of Applied Science Degree.

### Carpentry students spend summer working hands-on project

Hinds Community College Utica Campus carpentry students spent part of their summer getting hands-on experience.

Edmond Christian, Leslie Hill and Morris Evans, all carpentry students from Port Gibson, joined their instructor, James McGee, on a construction project at Raymond High School. For more than three months, they helped with construction on the new Performing Arts and Athletics Center.

The partnership began when McGee reached out to his brother-in-law, Al Hunter, of First Construction.

"I have over 20 plus years of doing commercial foundation work and, through the job that I have in Utica, thought it would be a great opportunity to involve my students in a project like this," Hunter said. "I called my brother-in-law and asked him if I could bring my students along. Opportunities like this don't come along every day."

Each of the young men were taught a variety of skills, from learning how to set anchor boats and tie steel to mechanical and electrical work. Hunter said he felt it was important to give them the chance to learn the total side of the construction business. "Sustainability comes in not just one craft," he said. "Sustainability is when you learn the total construction concept and you will be able to do everything," said Hunter.

All three sophomores were excited to hop on board the project and hope to gain as much experience as possible to help them further their careers.

Evans said he was looking for a hands-on experience before actually working. "I feel like if I came out here before I got a job I would know more when I actually started working," he said.

Christian saw this opportunity to live out a lifelong dream. "I wanted to be a carpenter growing up so I wanted to get the experience," he said.

Hill is hoping this will lead to greater and even more lucrative opportunities. "I plan on making more money in this field," he said.

Jonathan Townes, associate dean for Career and Technical Education at the Utica Campus, hopes this will showcase the type of talent that comes out of the Hinds family. "This could be a spark for others to not only desire to continue their education, but to also chose Hinds because they know the faculty will help put them in the position to grow outside and inside of the classroom to grow," Townes said.

Hunter said he plans to ask all three to come back to help complete the project.








#### **ELECTRONICS TECHNOLOGY**

### LEGISLATIVE BLACK CAUCUS VISITS UTICA











#### **Legislative tour touts HBCU roots of Hinds CC Utica Campus** BY: DANNY BARRETT JR.

UTICA – Eleven members of the Legislative Black Caucus toured Hinds Community College's Utica Campus in March to get a better sense of the strengths and challenges of Hinds' HBCU campus.

"We came down for the February Black History program, and we were so impressed with the history that we wanted to bring more legislative members to learn about the history of the campus," said Rep. Charles Young of Meridian, a member of the Legislative Black Caucus and the House Universities and Colleges Committee. "We wanted to come meet the president, and we also wanted to come talk about the needs for Hinds and Utica," said Young, who attended Meridian Community College.

Among those who toured the campus on March 24 were Sen. Albert Butler of Port Gibson and Reps. Oscar Denton of Vicksburg, John Faulkner of Holly Springs, Stephanie Foster of Jackson, Kabir Karriem of Columbus, Carl Mickens of Brooksville, De'Keither Stamps of Jackson, Zakiya Summers of Jackson, Cheikh Taylor of Starkville and Rickey Thompson of Shannon. Also on the tour were Utica Mayor Kenneth Broome and college President Dr. Stephen Vacik.

The Utica Campus was founded as the Utica Normal and Industrial Institute by Dr. William Holtzclaw in 1903, which makes it the oldest of the six college campuses. "Dr. Holtzclaw's vision was really to create a place, an opportunity for people of color to have a way to find a better life," Dr. Vacik said. "We want to offer an experience that is unique, to allow someone who is maybe from an underrepresented minority to come and have a place where they can come in and feel 'I get to be a leader here. I don't have to fight for that opportunity. I have an opportunity to be a leader here."

The Utica Campus offers students a small, personalized education experience with residence halls, food service and a number of organizations, including the Student Government Association and Phi Theta Kappa, that give students an opportunity to rise to leadership positions. It also offers an emphasis on STEM-related courses and programs.

At an HBCU, minority students embrace the culture of attending an institution that was founded to provide them a quality educational experience focused on them. Many of the scholarship programs and additional services for students at the Utica Campus are grant funded, Vice President Sherry Franklin said.

Franklin told legislators that the Utica Campus has "a sense of belonging in the atmosphere. It's a small, personal environment for those who are not ready to go to a university but they still want that experience of an HBCU," she said. "On the Utica Campus, we give you a little taste of HBCU at a community college."

As part of the opening program before the tour, the caucus heard from Jhada Carmel, who was selected to receive the Foundation for Education & Economic Development Scholarship, which is sponsored by the Foundation for Education & Economic Development, Inc., with support of some members of the Mississippi Legislature's Black Caucus.

Carmel, of Madison, is a second semester freshman who is active in a number of organizations and is maintaining a 4.0 GPA. She graduated from Madison Central High School, where she said she was in a "big school just being a little nobody. ... I felt out of place. I was a minority.

"As I was doing research for colleges, I was looking for a quality education but also affordable fees because college debt would not do any good in my family right now," said Carmel, who also said she felt she would benefit from the HBCU experience.

Highlights of the tour included the recently renovated Student Union Building and gymnasium. Legislators also saw the residence halls, which have small rooms, low ceilings and shared bathrooms. "They were built in a style that's no longer popular. That's not something that sells very well in today's environment," Dr. Vacik told them. "You can see for yourself this is an area that needs work."

Along with some other student-focused spaces, renovations or replacement of the residence halls will be one of our top priorities in which the college needs financial support to achieve, he said.

A combination of bench points and steady play from starters keyed a second-half comeback win for the Hinds Community College Bulldogs men's basketball team in the third round of the Region 23 playoffs.

Down by 13 at the half to Southwest Mississippi Community College, the Bulldogs came alive in the second half for an 81-78 win. Freshmen Caleb McCarty, of Biloxi, and Kyle Hayman, of Monroe, La., poured in 15 and 10 points respectively in a scintillating second half of action on the Bulldogs' home floor.

"I've been a part of all types of games -- NCAA tourney, state championships and more -- but this is probably one of the greatest comebacks in my career," head coach Yusef Fitzgerald said. "Down 16 at one point, these young men never quit, and were able to fight back to beat a very tough Southwest team. D-Wash (Damerius Wash) was tremendous and Jordan Johnson was as well and as usual. Caleb McCarty and Kyle Hayman provided scoring and defense that turned the tide in the second half for us. To be in the final four of this league is tremendous and we've got a tough task ahead of us. We will prepare for our opponent and pray we can keep moving on."

Johnson, of Memphis, led the way in scoring for the Bulldogs with 24 points to go along with six assists and four steals. Wash, of Canton, had another double-double, with 22 points and 10 rebounds, plus four steals. McCarty added three rebounds and four blocked shots. Hayman was a rebound away from a double-double of his own, with nine boards on the night.
