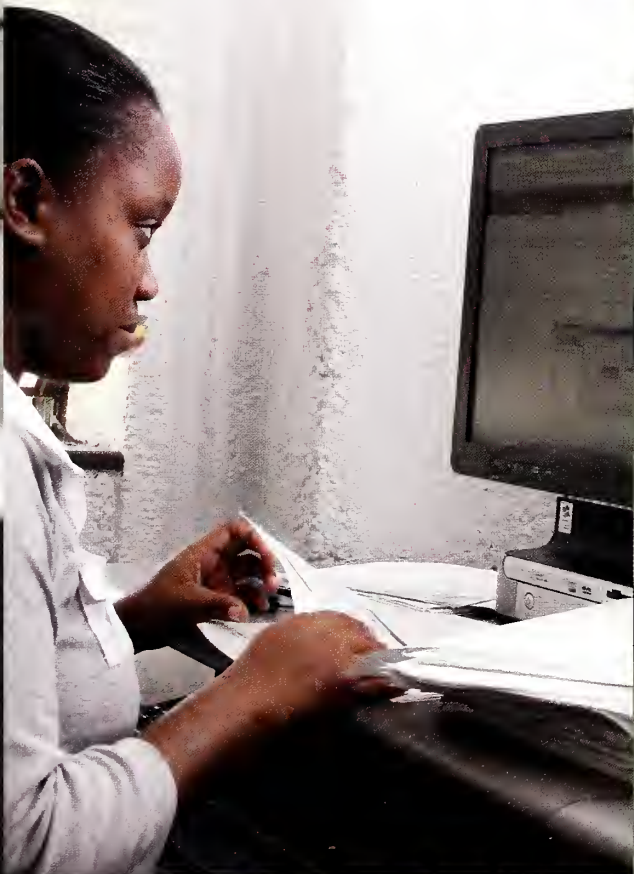
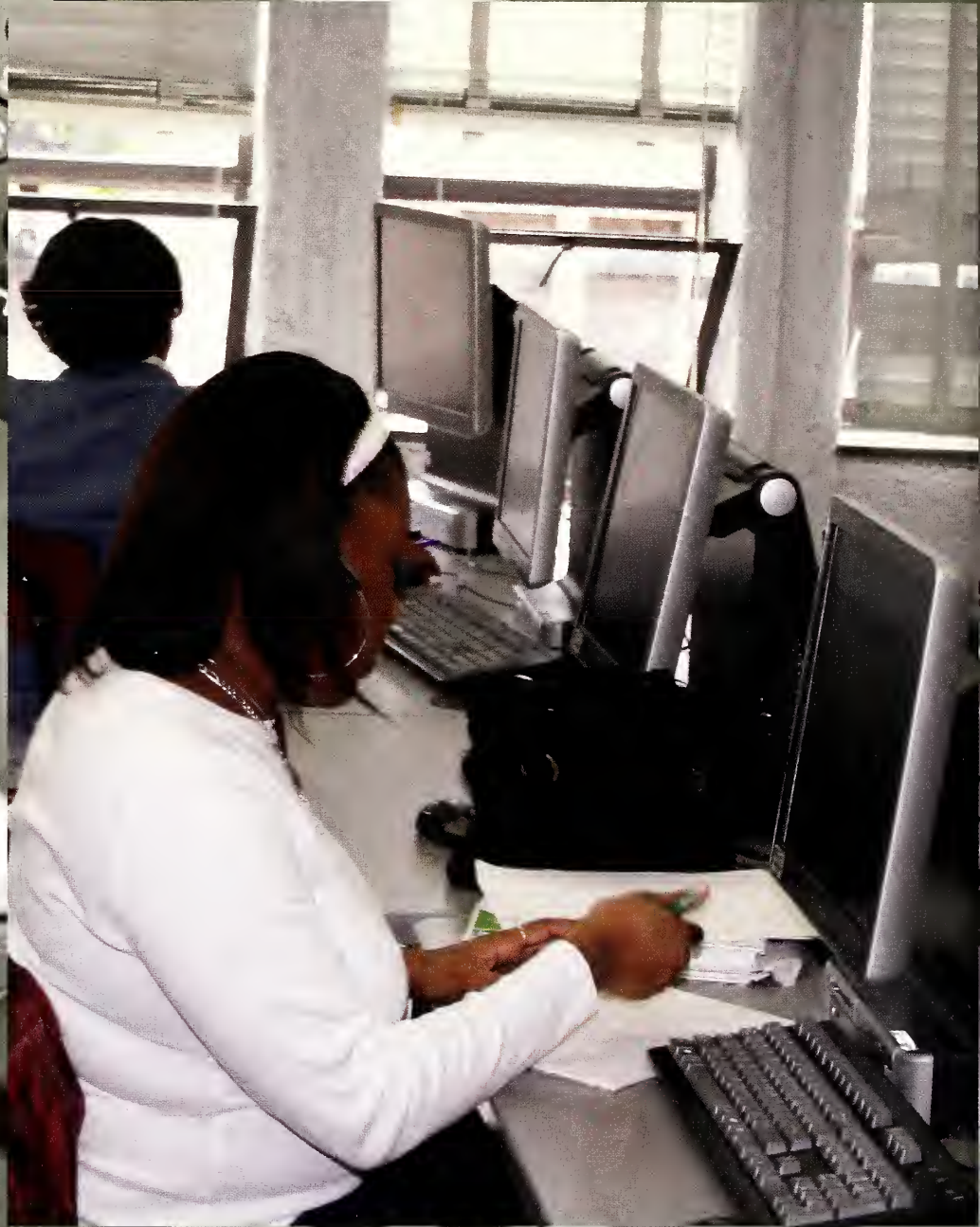




Curriculum



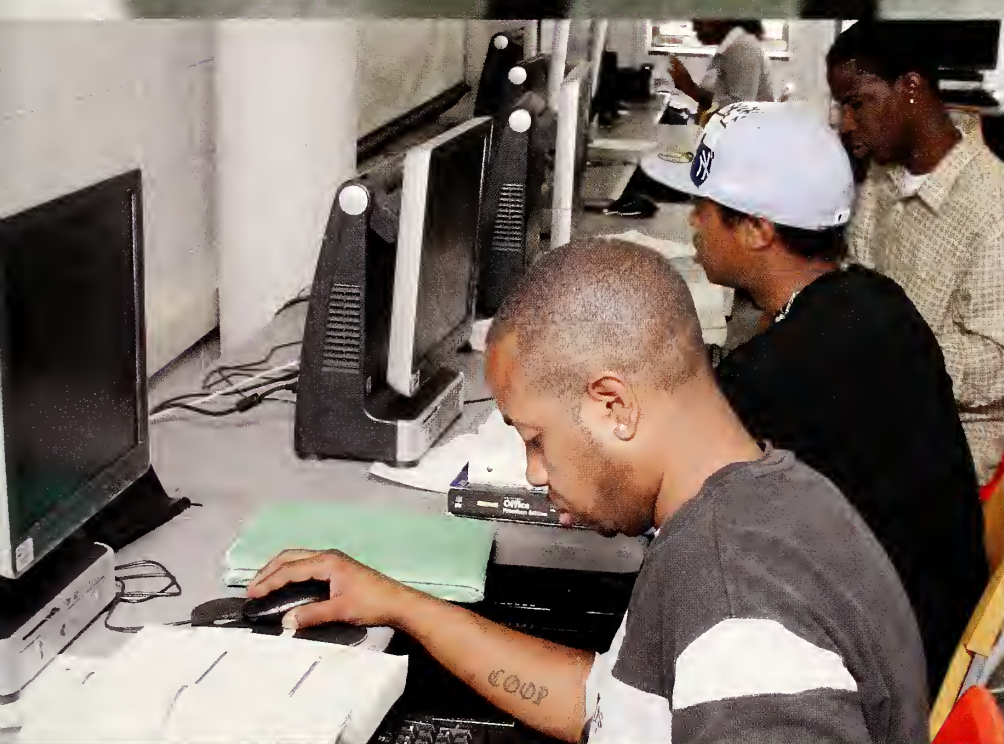
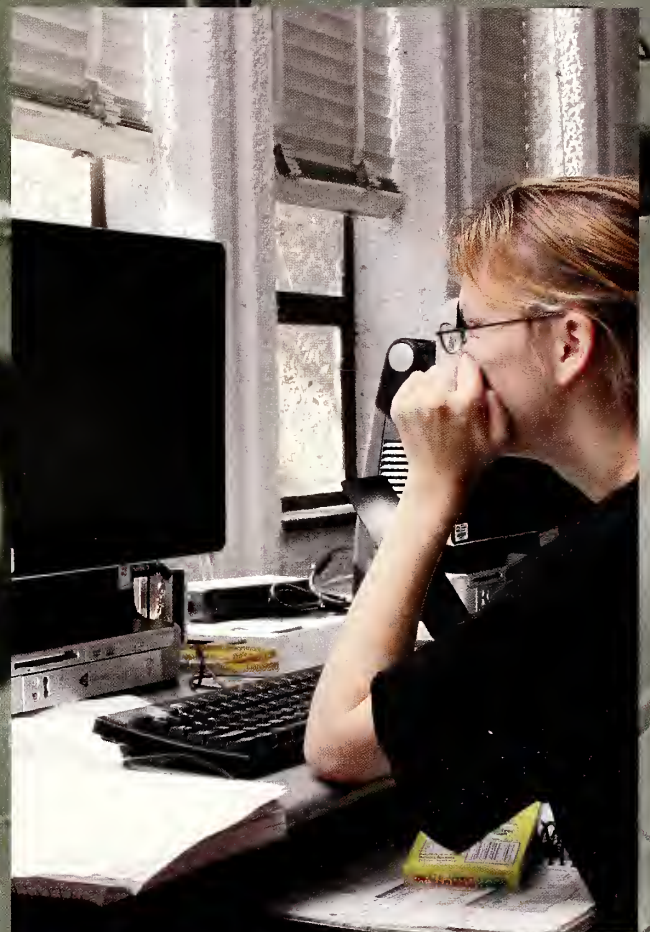
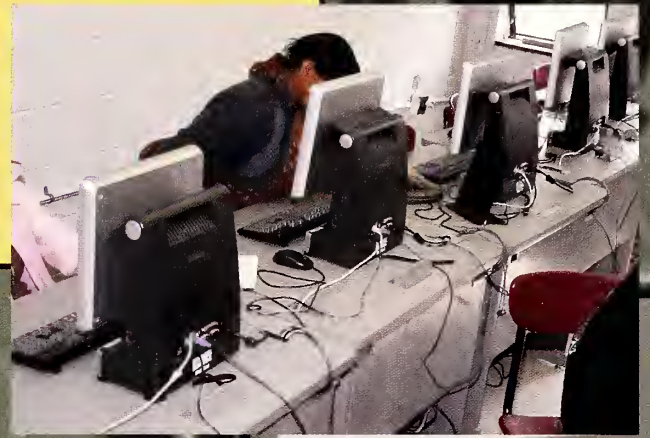
Computer Science



The introduction of the computer science course to students are introduced to concepts, applications, and theory of operation of microcomputers. Concepts are illustrated and supplemented by hands-on microcomputers used by the students. This class includes operating systems, application programs, and computer language.



Computer science is a two-year academic program that prepares students to continue their education at a four-year university. Upon completion, graduates are awarded the Associate of Arts degree.



Students are taught the fundamentals of basic programming, programming language, programming statements, functions and array, software, and debugging and testing of large programs.

Barbering Program

The barbering program prepares individuals to cut, shampoo, and style hair. Special attention is given to hygiene, safety, skin, scalp diseases, and equipment sterilization. Included is the study of sales, business management, law, and customer relationship. Instruction qualifies students for the State Barber Board Certification Examination. To be admitted to this program, a person must have a high school diploma or GED equivalent, and/or must have demonstrated "Ability to Benefit" based on making the following minimum scores on the ACT Compass Test: Reading, 70; Pre-Algebra, 36; and Writing and Language, 43.

Students are required to complete 1500 clock hours prior to taking the State Barber Board Barbering Exam.



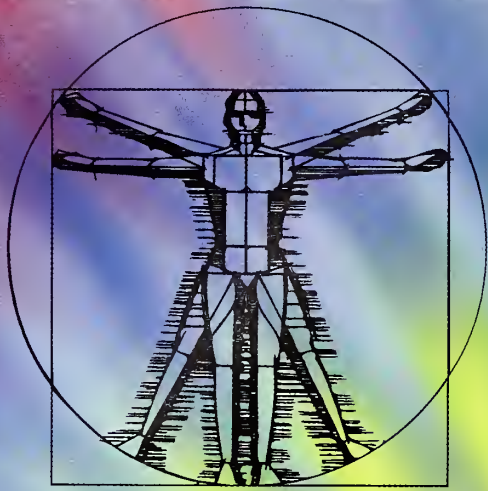

A part of the State Board Exam is doing a tapered cut, a layered cut, and using a razor, as well as passing the written part of the exam. Some students use mannequins to demonstrate a rod set while others work on layering and styling. Ms. Jacqueline Sullivan is barbering instructor.





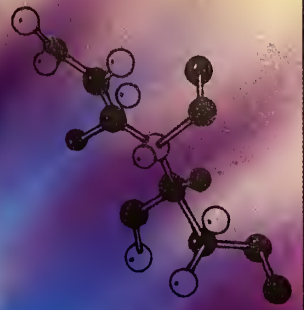
Prior to using the microscope, students are taught its use and function. Identifying matter that is unrecognizable with the naked eye can be exciting, especially when it moves.



Mrs. White's class is given a recap of the last classroom instruction before beginning the day's lab activities. The class will be graded on their ability to identify various tissues, their functions and location. The exam will also include identifying skeletal parts.



Each biology lecture class must be accompanied by a corresponding laboratory class unless student has previously earned credit in the laboratory, either at Hinds or at a different college. Any student who withdraws from a lecture or laboratory must withdraw from both at the same time except during the last week of the withdrawal period.

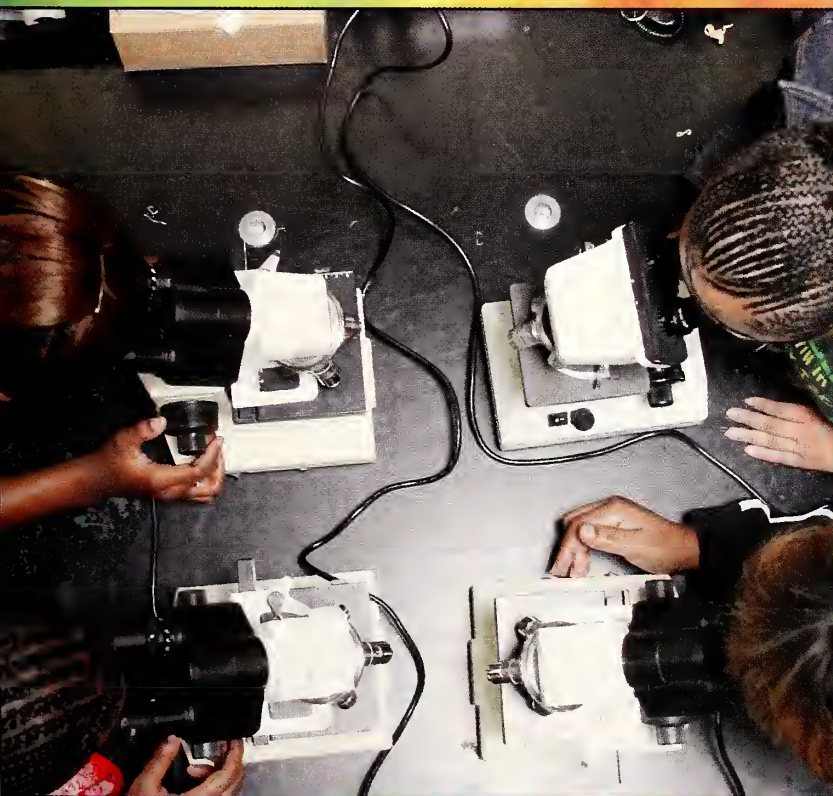

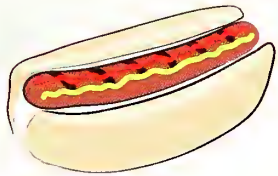
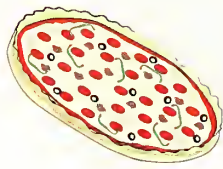


Students are engaged in identifying tissue types, identifying the location of the various tissues in the body, and learning the function of each. This process is also done when it comes to identifying cells.

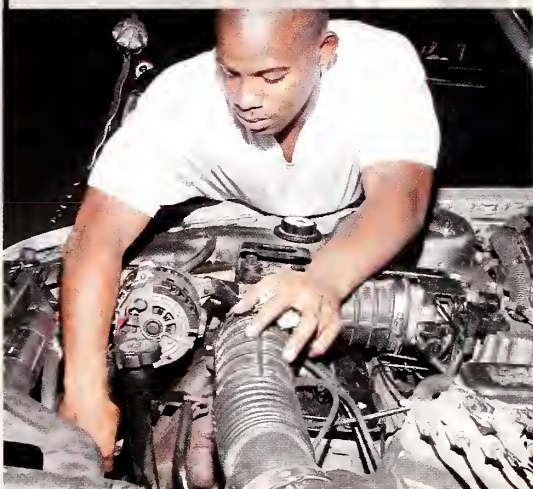
Food Production



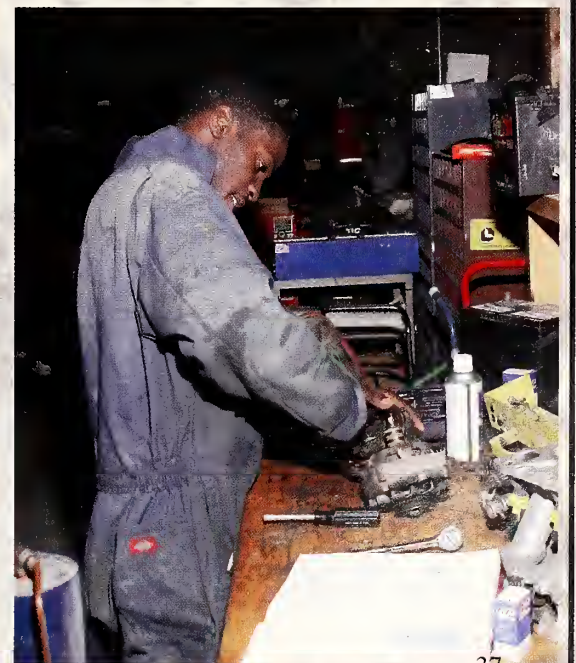
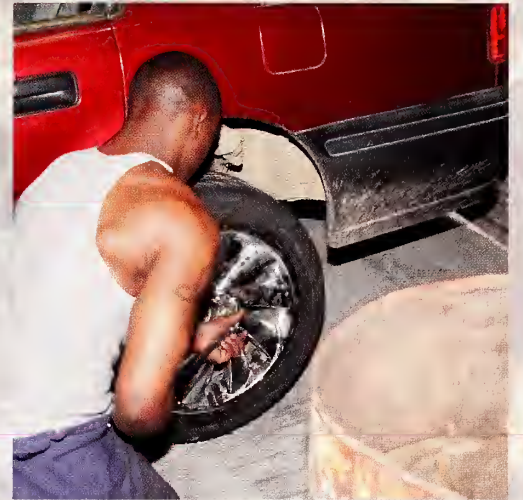
The Food Production Management Technology program offers training in areas of food production, management, fast-food operations, quantity food operations, and catering. Emphasis is placed on technical skills in preparing students for entry-level job opportunities in production and management in both commercial and institutional food service settings. Students may receive a Career Certificate or an Associate in Applied Science degree after completing the prescribed courses in the respective curriculums.



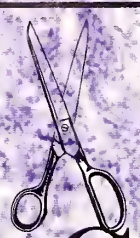
Auto Mechanics



The Auto Mechanics program is an instructional program that prepares individuals to engage in the servicing and maintenance of all types of automobiles. Instruction include the diagnosis of malfunctions and repair of engines, fuel, electrical, cooling, brake, drive train and suspension systems. Instruction is also provided in the adjustment and repair of individual components such as transmissions and carburetors.

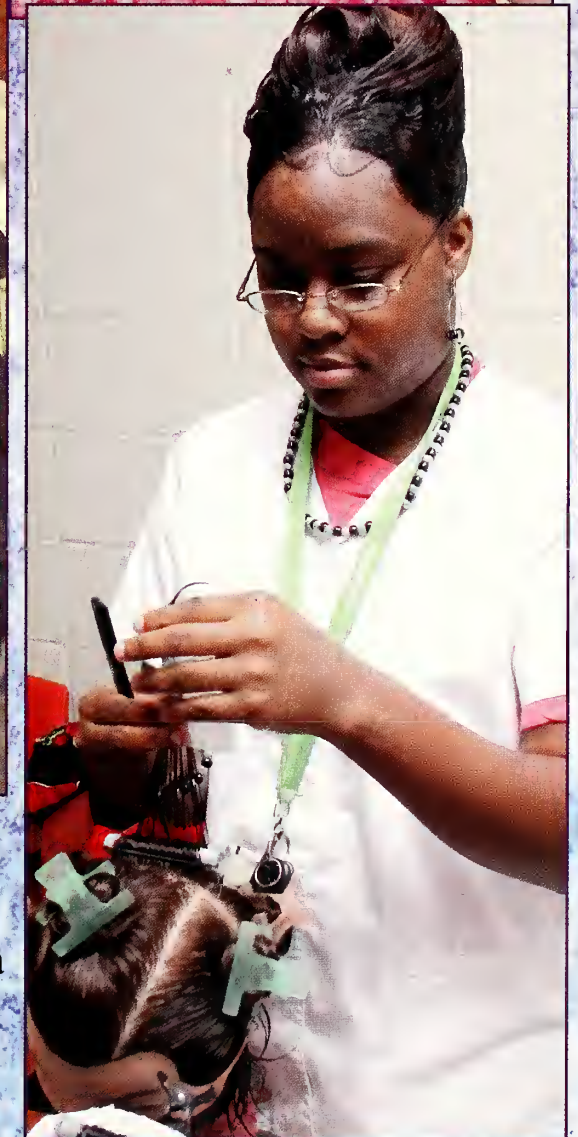

The Cosmetology program is designed to prepare students for employment as cosmetologists. Emphasis is placed on theory and practice involving hair styling, tinting, bleaching, anatomy, physiology, hygiene, bacteriology, sterilization, sanitation, shampooing, perm, personality, haircutting, scalp treatment, beauty, salon management, and wigology.

To be admitted to the Cosmetology program, a person must have a high school diploma or GED equivalent.

Students in the Residential Carpentry program gain experience in blueprint reading, cost estimating, framing, interior finishing, roofing, exterior finishing, cabinetmaking, flooring, installation, repairing, and remodeling structures. This field of study consists of students who are interested in working with their hands. Precision is a must in this area. Before graduating, each student must demonstrate mastery in each aspect of the profession. The instructor is Mr. Leonard Knight.



Learning to use the various cutting tools is essential in construction. Framing is second only to the foundation in building.



RESIDENTIAL CARPENTRY

The Residential Carpentry program is designed to prepare a student with the basic skills and technical knowledge of the carpentry trade. Instruction includes both theory and practical application. Upon completion of this program, a student should be able to function on the level of an advanced apprentice in the carpentry field.



The Welding program is designed to prepare the students for entry-level employment in the field of welding. The curriculum includes shielded metal welding, gas metal arc welding, flux cored arc welding, pipe welding, plasma arc welding, carbon arc welding, oxyfuel cutting, gas metal arc, aluminum welding, and gas tungsten arc welding.



At the end of the welding program, each student has to complete a welding project of his or her own, demonstrating the different types of welding and cutting. A grade is given for the project that must meet the standards that signify a qualified welder. Each student must also pass a written exit exam as a part of successfully completing the program.

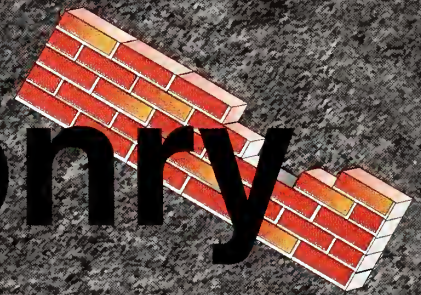


Welding



The Brickmasonry Technology program is a one-year program designed to prepare students to lay bricks and/or blocks. Instruction includes laying out and spacing bonds; determining vertical and horizontal alignment in course using gauges, plumb-bobs, and levels; and cutting, notching, and shaping blocks, bricks, and stones to construct or repair walls, partitions, arches and fireplaces.

The Brick, Block, and Stonemasonry Technology curriculum includes the following courses: masonry math, estimating and blueprint reading, tools, equipment, safety, advanced block laying, bricklaying, steps, arches, and supervised work experience in masonry.

Clothing and Textiles

The Clothing and Textiles program prepares students for entry-level occupations dealing with clothing and textiles services, including, but not limited to, construction; fabric; fabric design and fabric care; pattern design; principles of clothing construction and selection; fitting and alterations of ready-to-wear garments; custom tailoring; clothing maintenance; home furnishings; and textile testing.

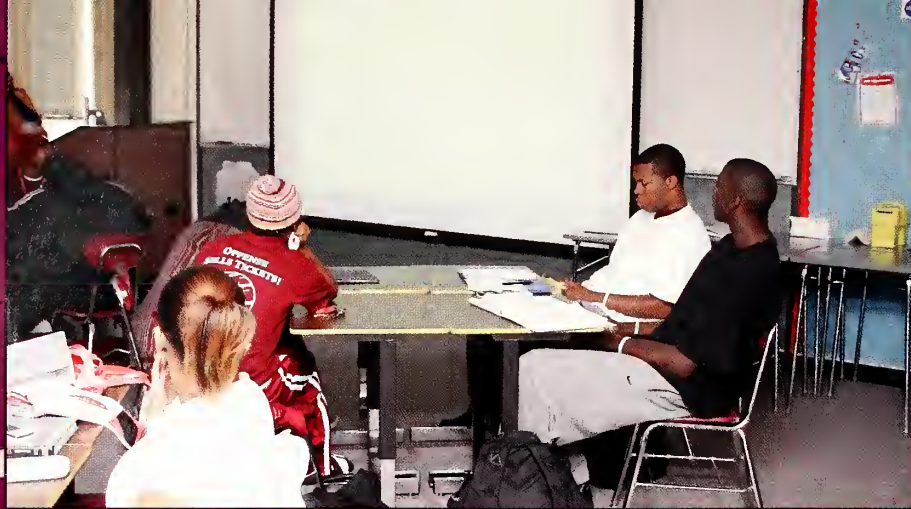

Mathematics majors and other students for whom algebra and trigonometry provide difficulties are encouraged to take proficiency tests in these areas to determine whether or not they can begin their college mathematics with the calculus sequence. Graduates of the mathematics program will receive the Associate of Arts degree and may transfer to a four-year institution. All students who plan to transfer to a four-year institution after completing the mathematics program are required to meet all requirements associated with the HCC mathematics curriculum. Radio, Television & Broadcasting Technology



Radio and television production and broadcasting technology is a program that teaches students the basic principles of broadcast writing to include scripts for television and radio news, commercials, and programs. 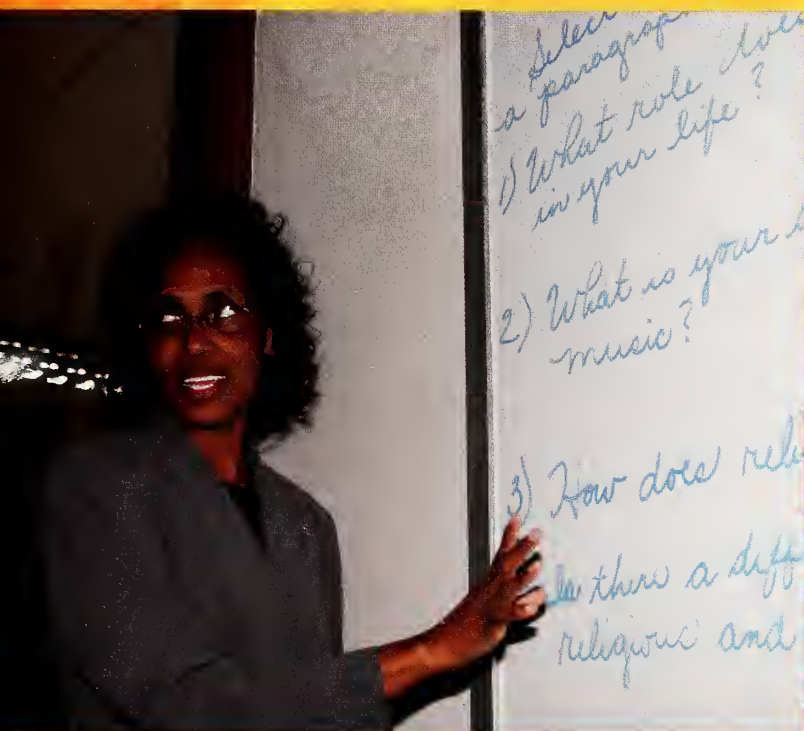
English

The Hinds baseball team lost their first game 4-3 against Co-Lin Community College, but rebounded in the second game to win 7-2 and salvage a split with the Wolves.



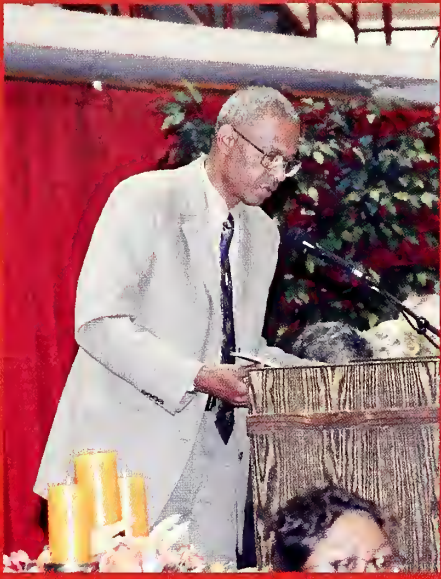

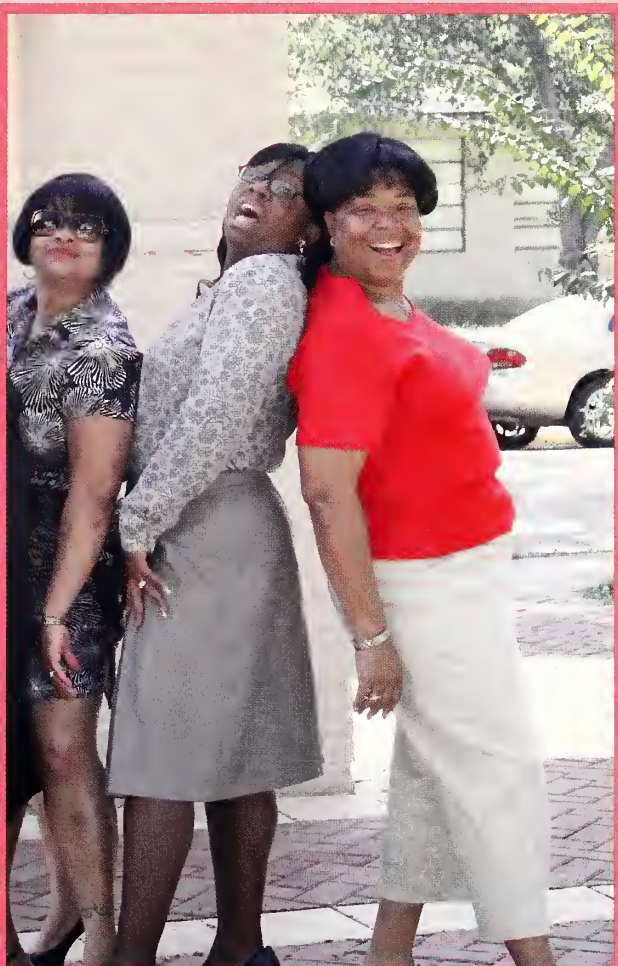

Commencement Convocation 2007



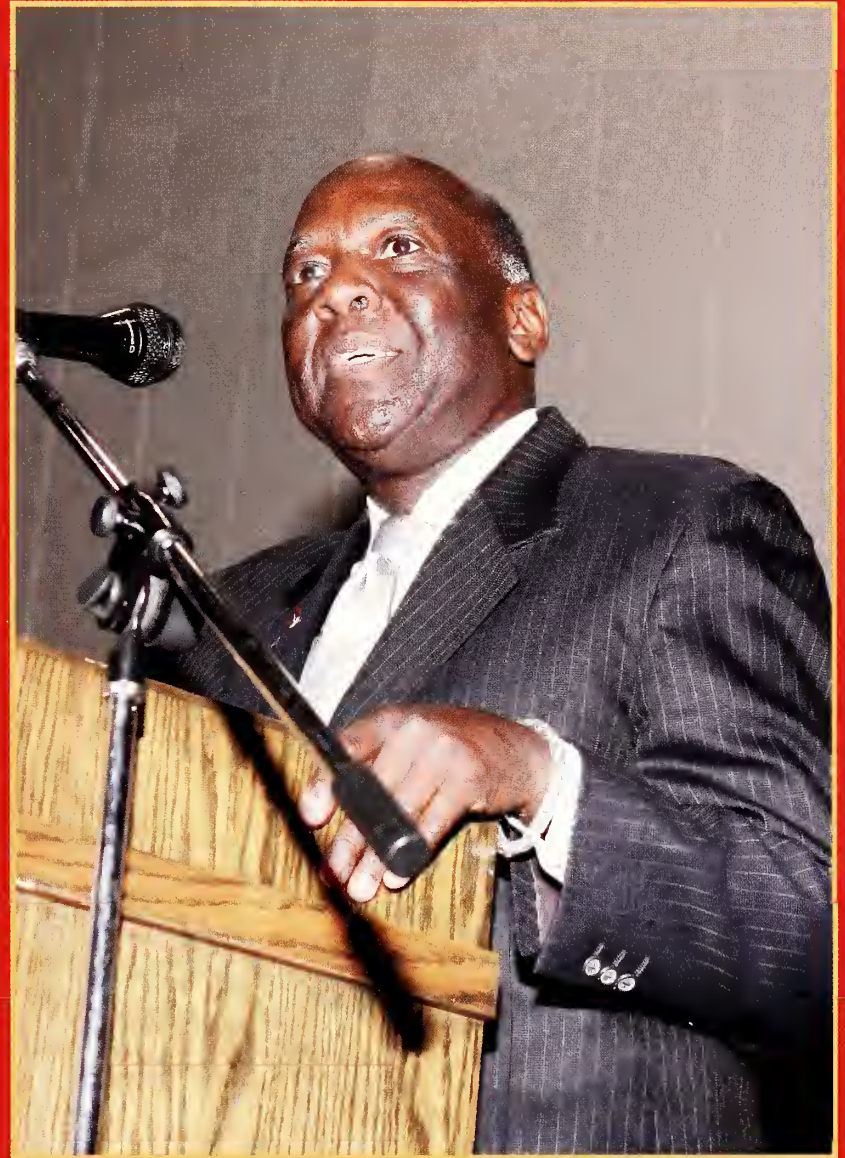

The project began as a way to collect the oral histories of individuals who had been involved in the Emmett Till trial set in Sumner, Mississippi, in 1955. Through a grant by the Mississippi Humanities Council and the National Endowment for the Humanities, Dr. Outlaw collected oral histories and other material. Thus, the Emmett Till Traveling Exhibit was born.

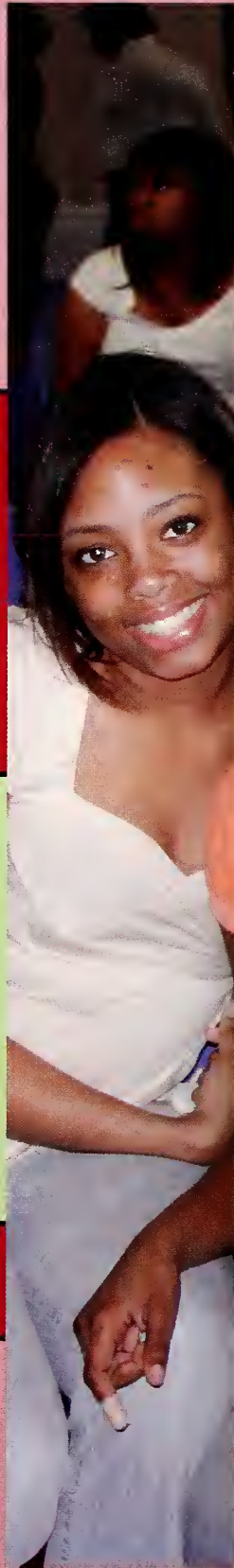
The day was not all filled with business. Fun, food, and entertainment were yet another aspect that the students enjoyed.

Lunch was provided for the students along with snacks throughout the day.

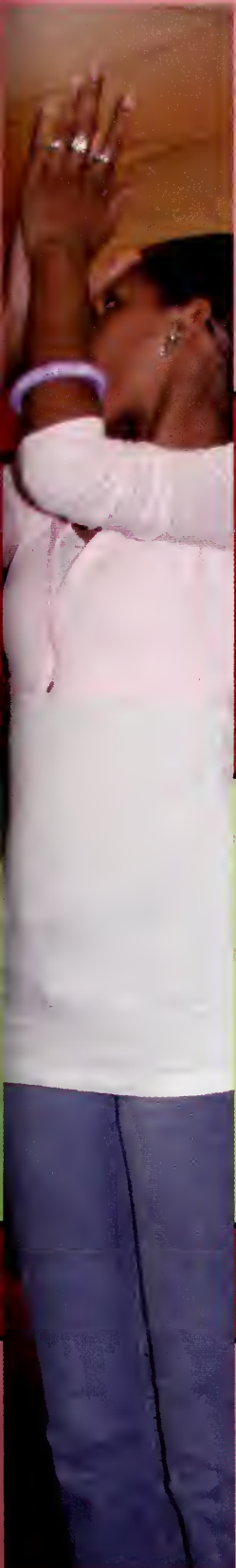

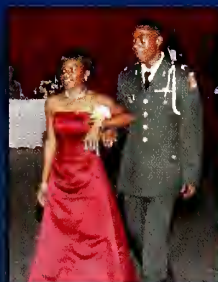

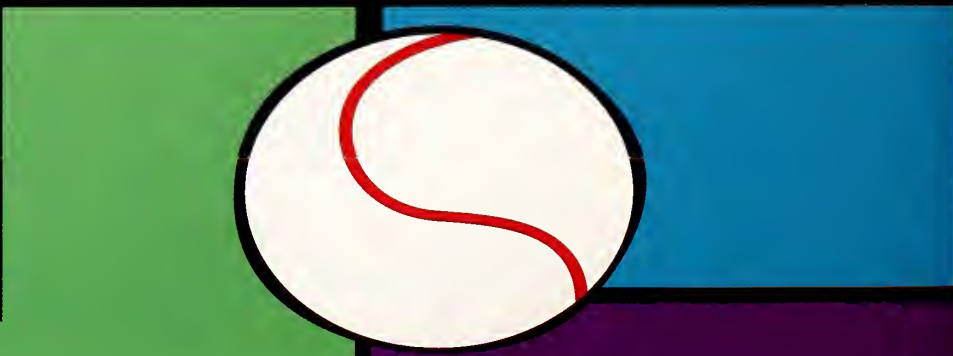
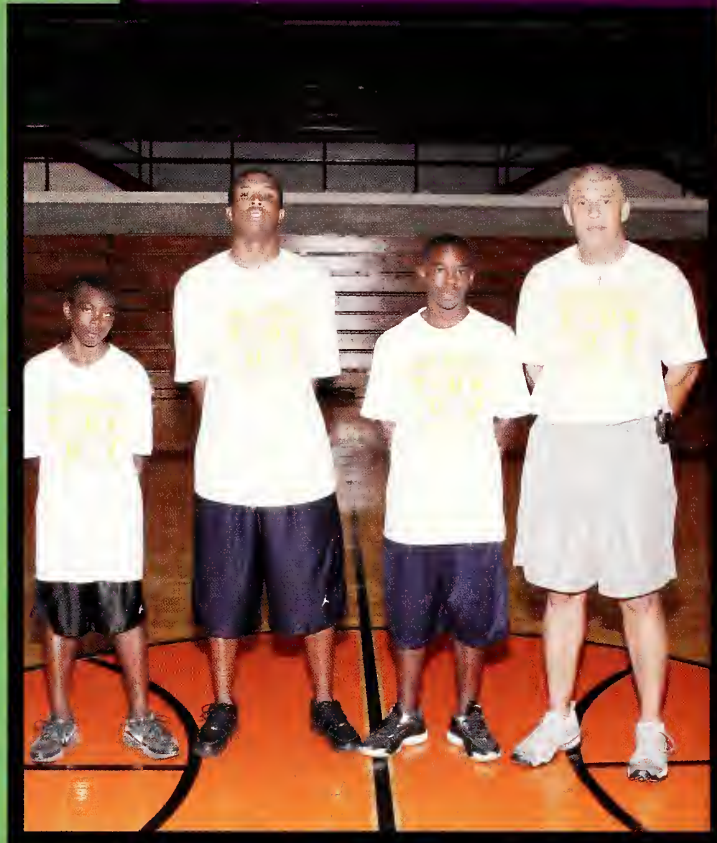




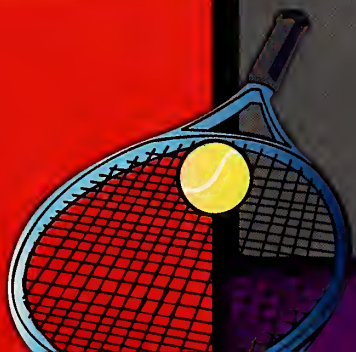
Summer Programs

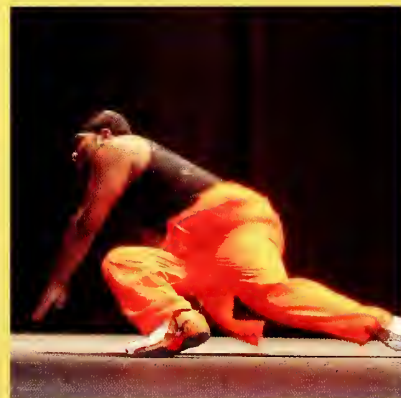

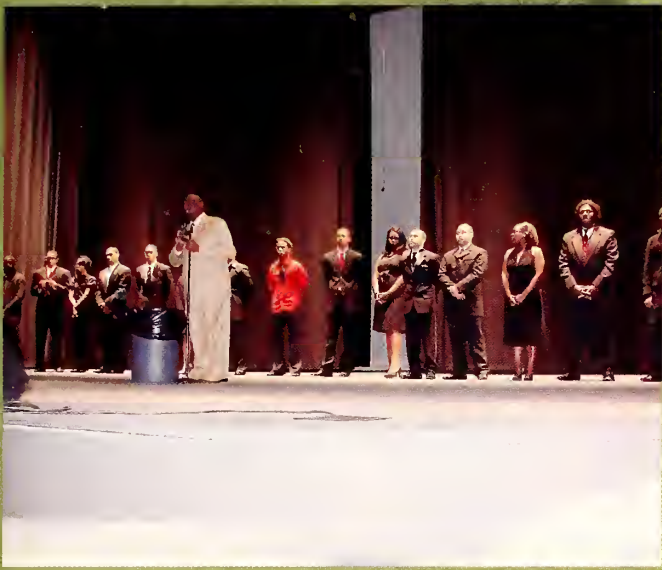


spring performing arts

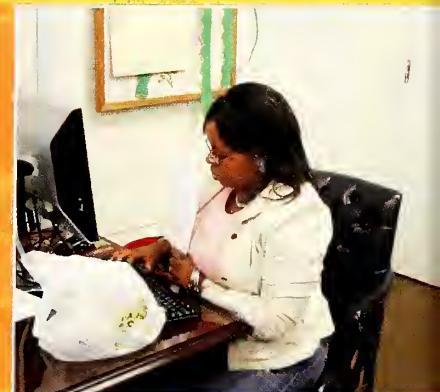
