There is a lot expected of you, you know. Just when you think it is time to slow down — take it easy, it's really time to go.

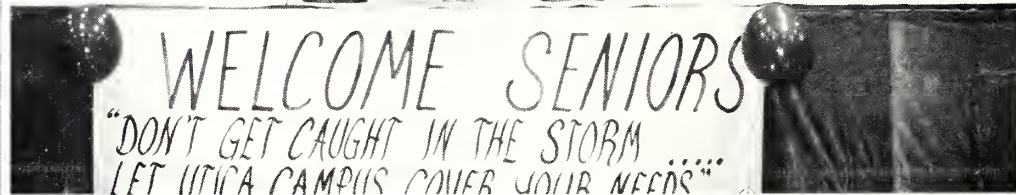
You are expected to achieve, nothing less for me. There are no excuses for failure, it is not acceptable in your vocabulary.

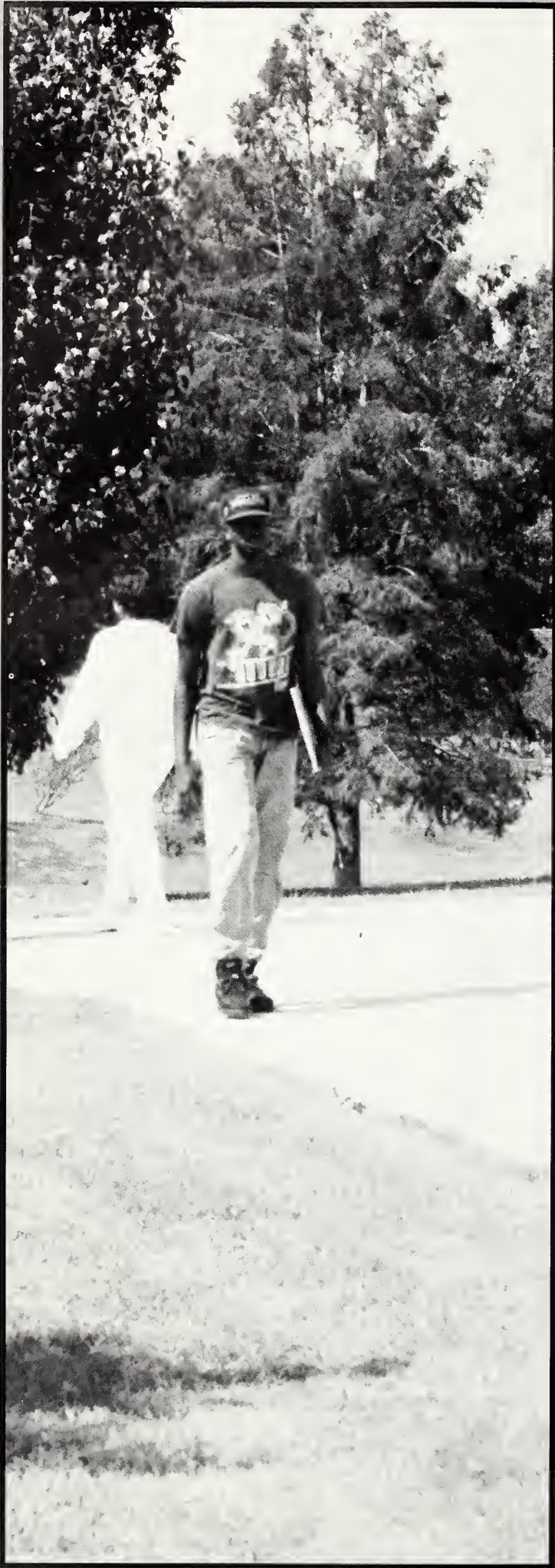

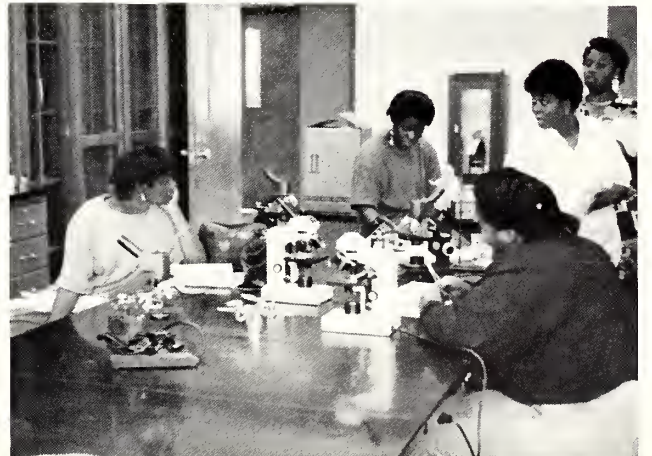

The patrons of these classes include students, faculty, staff, administration, and many members from the community.

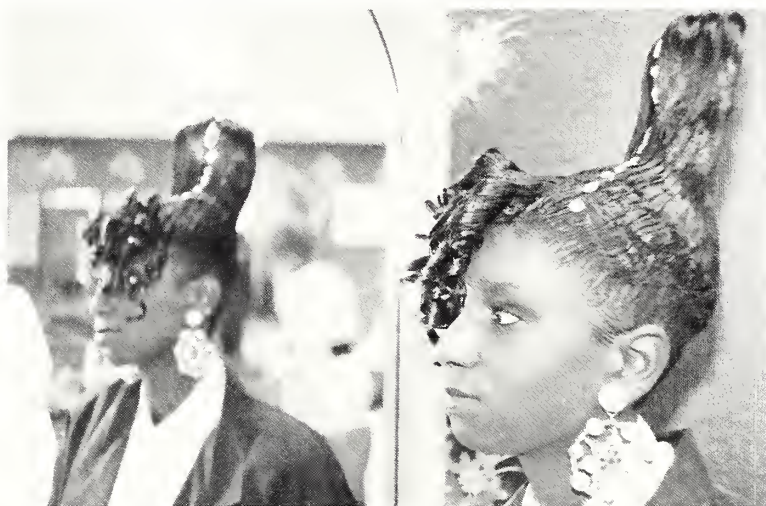

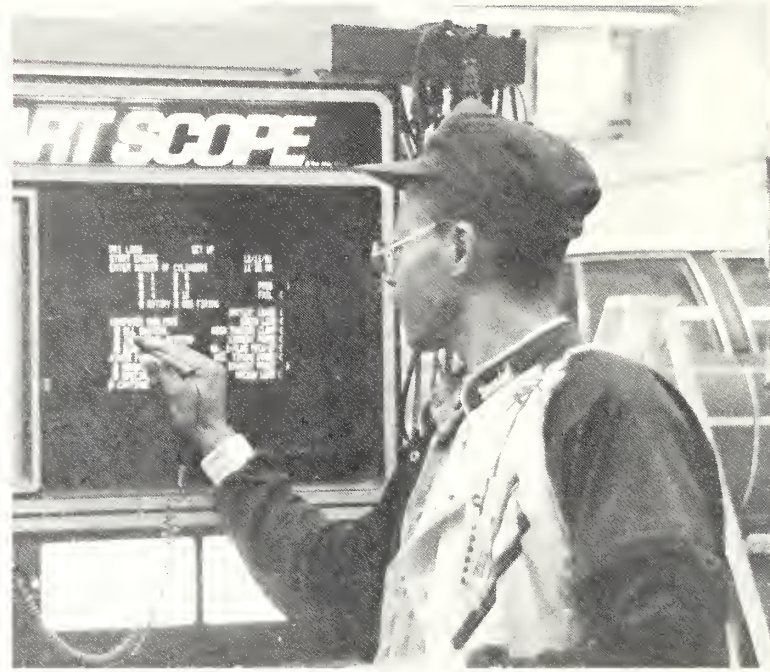

# WHO'S WHO AMONG STUDENTS IN AMERICAN COLLEGES

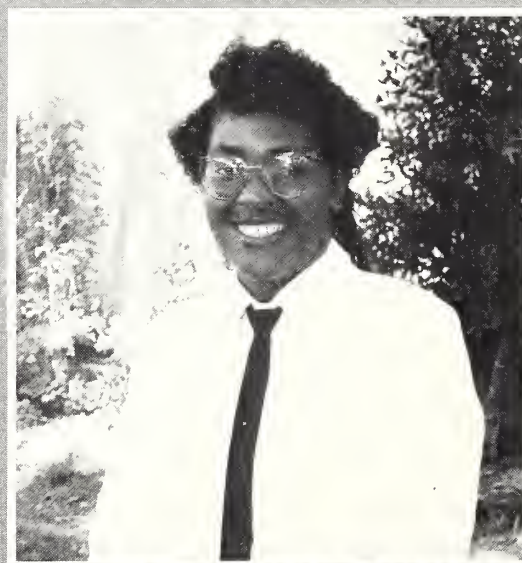

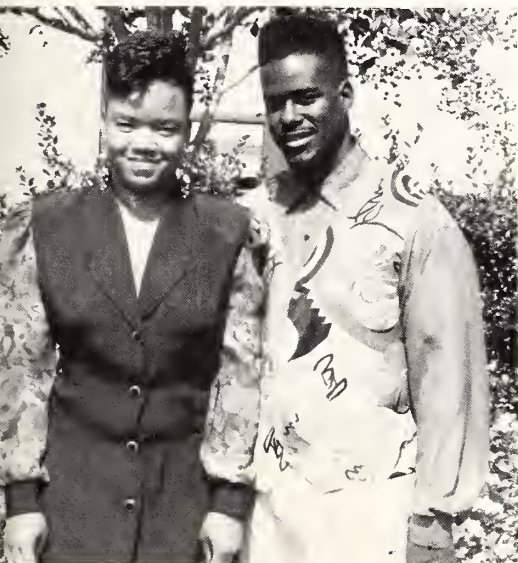

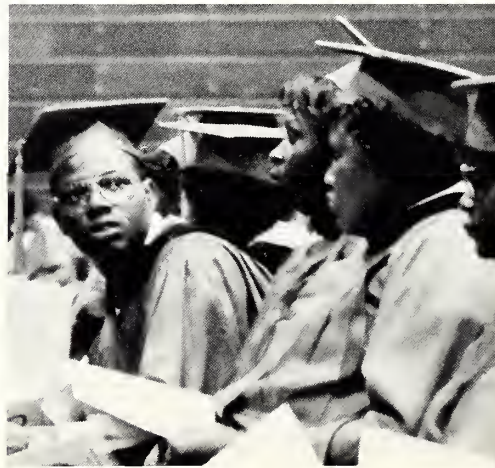
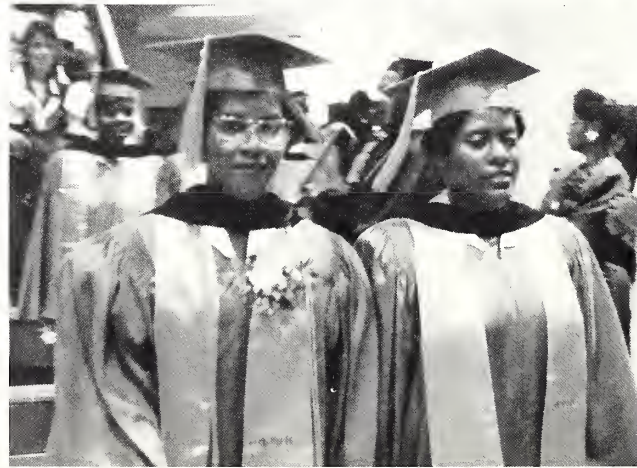
# Graduation 1992

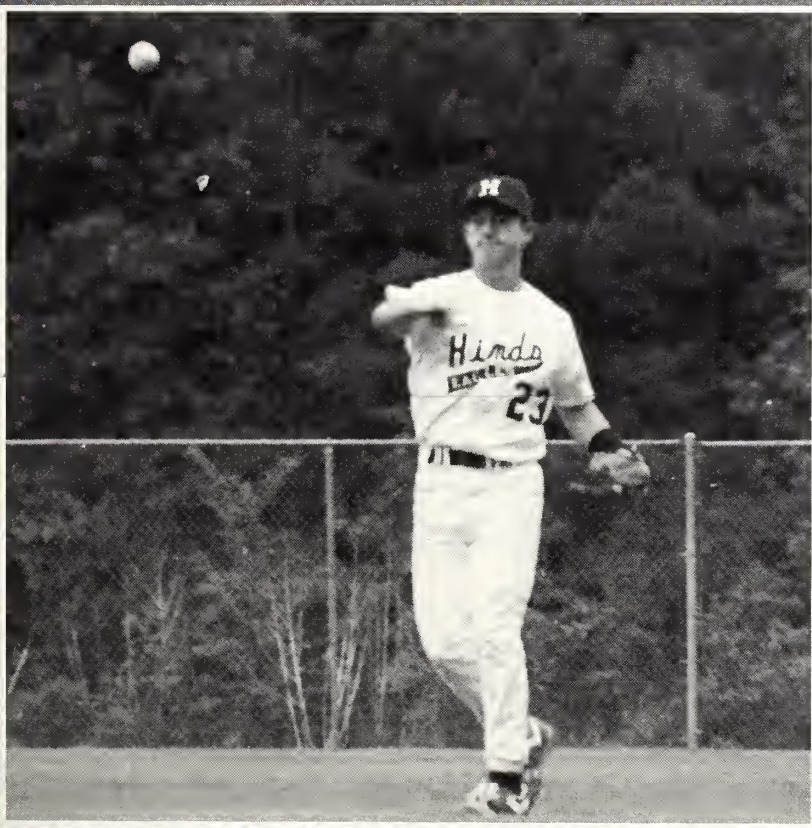

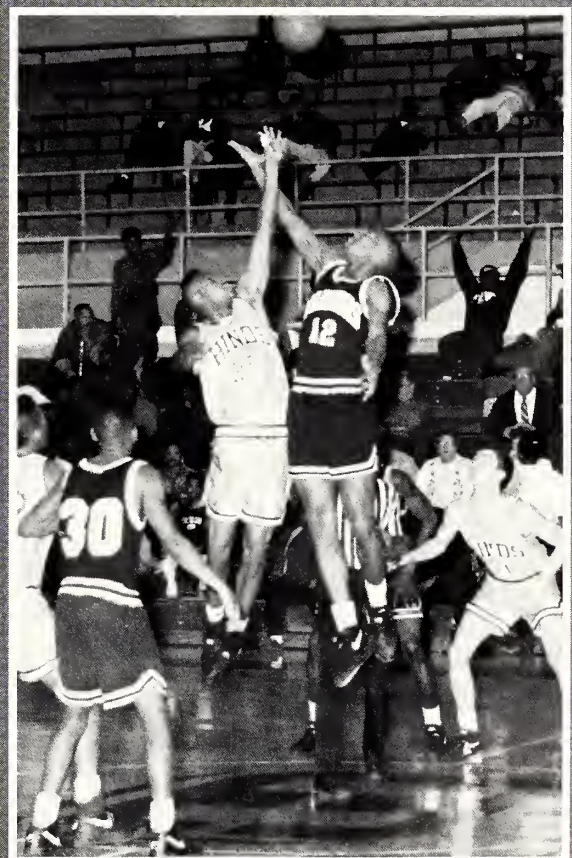

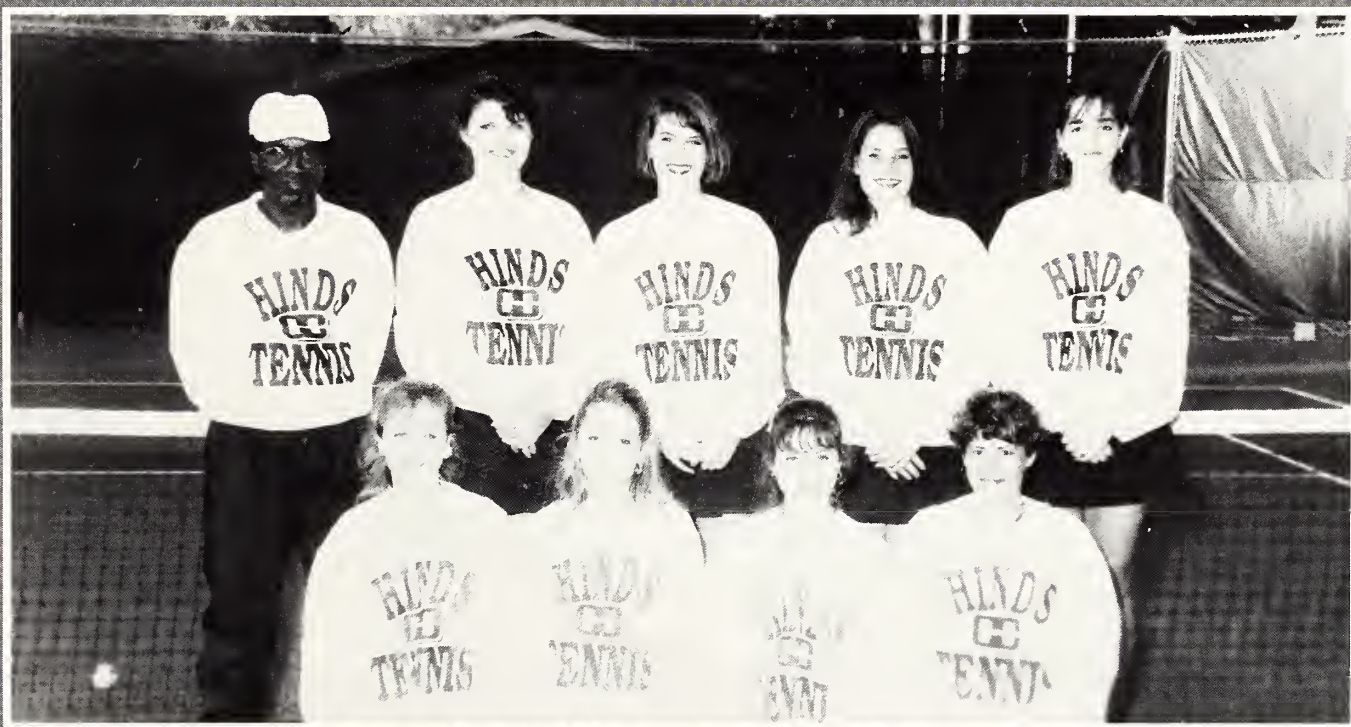
The Hinds Community College men's and women's tennis teams captured the State and Region 23 Community Junior College Tennis Championships that were held in Gulfport.
