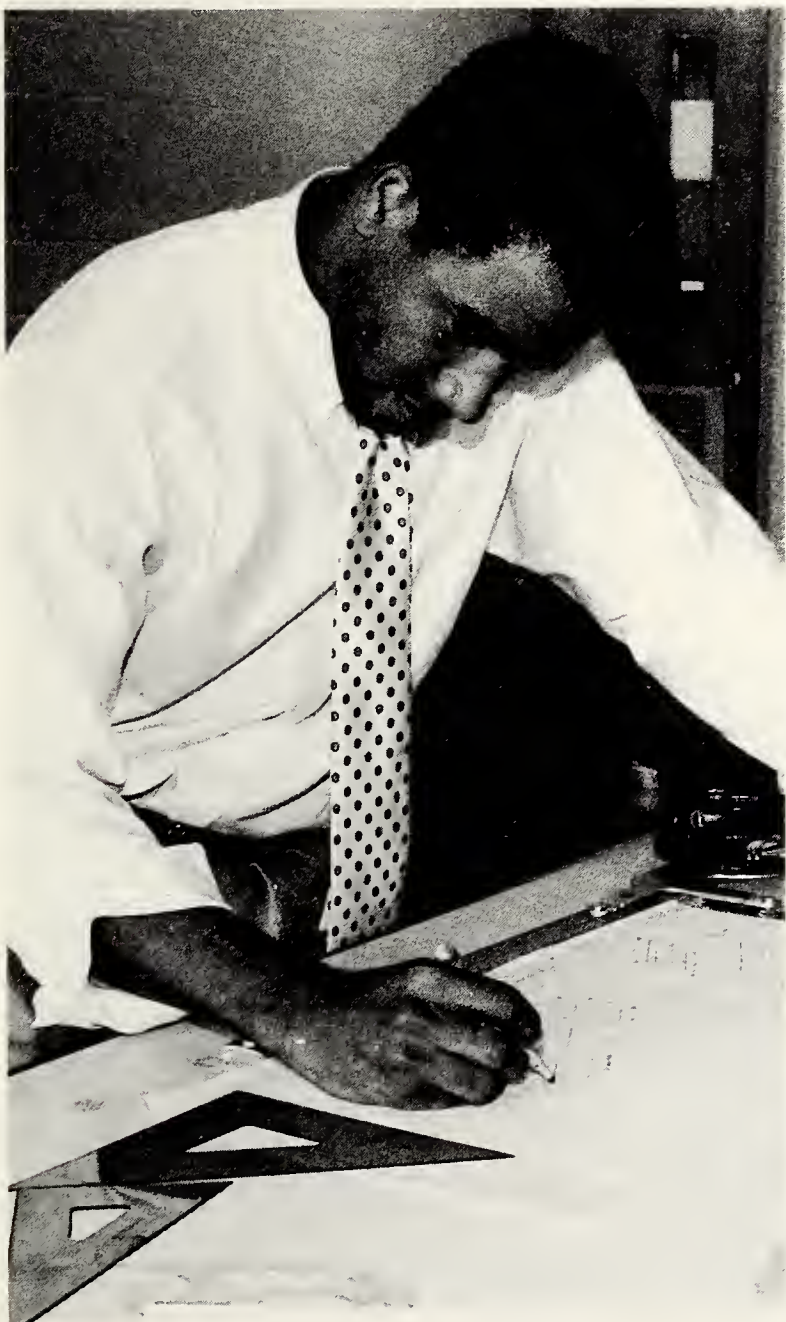

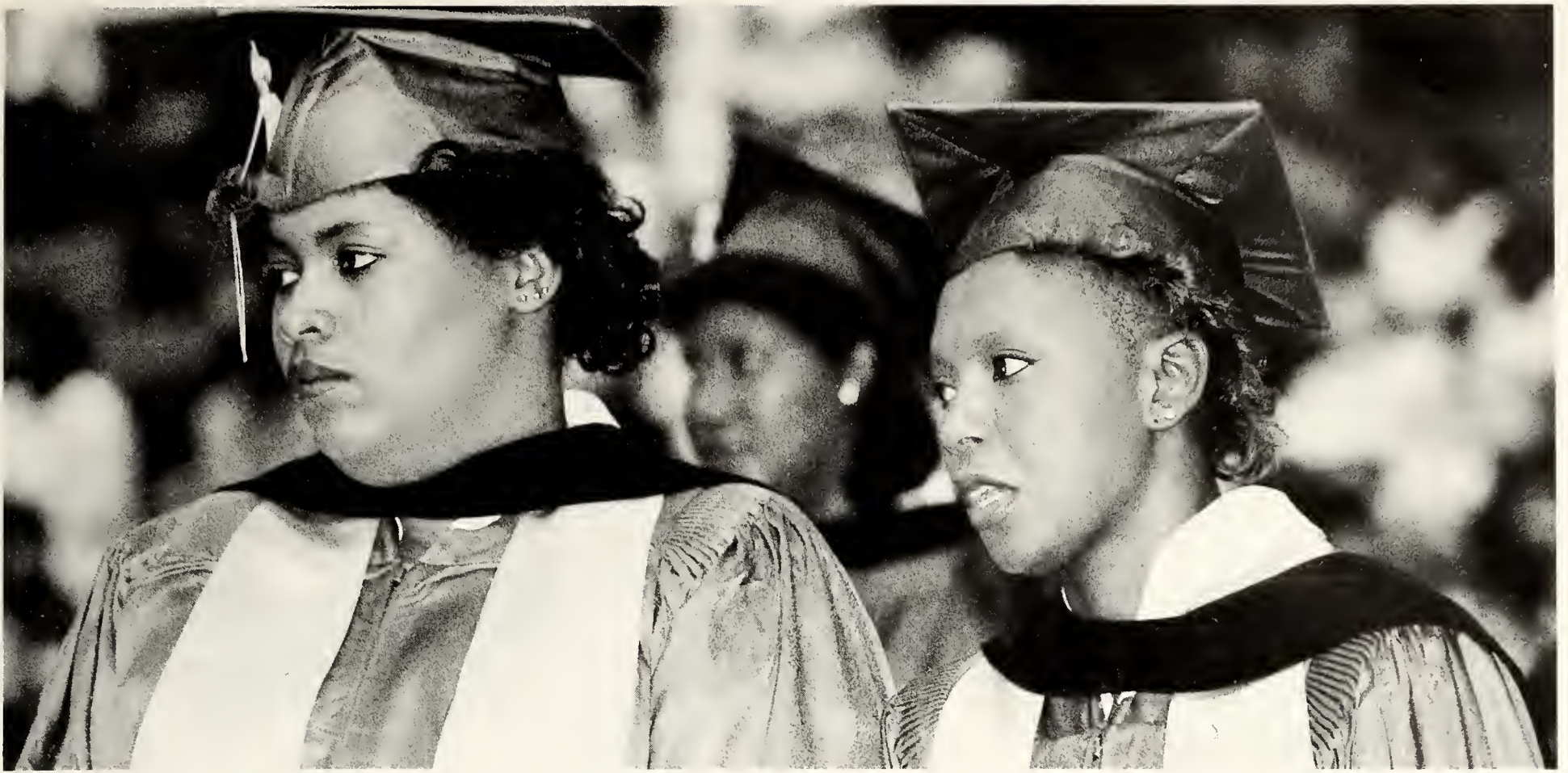

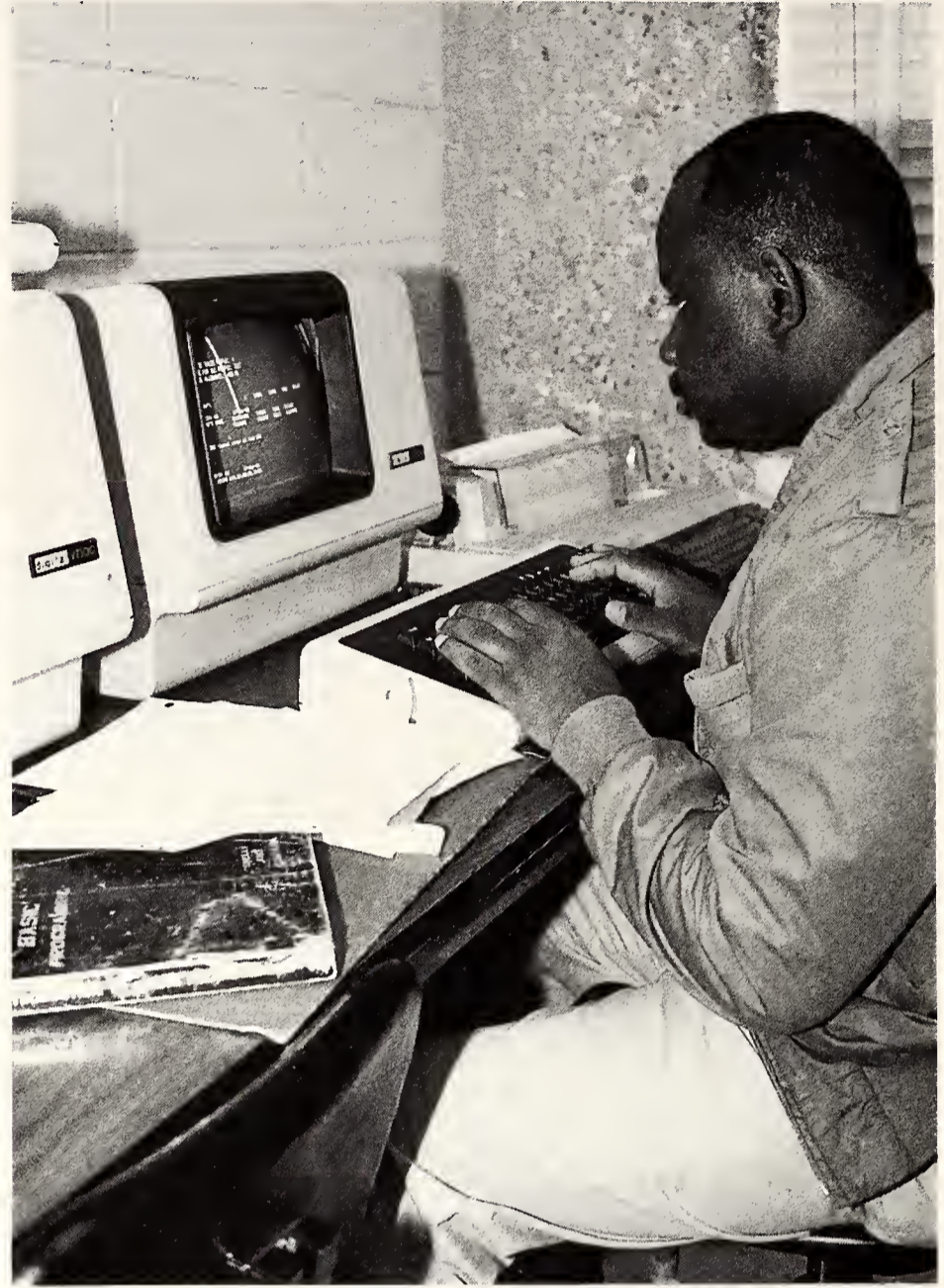

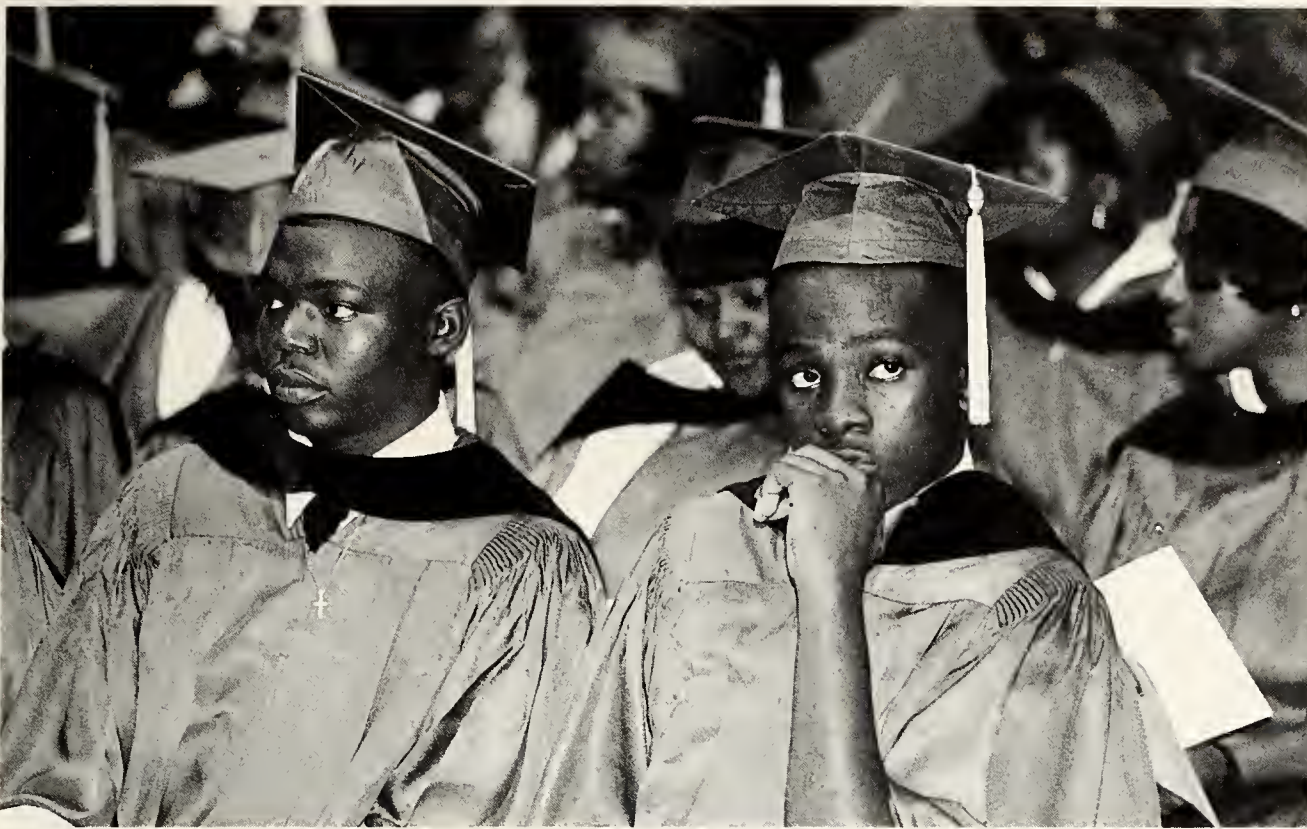

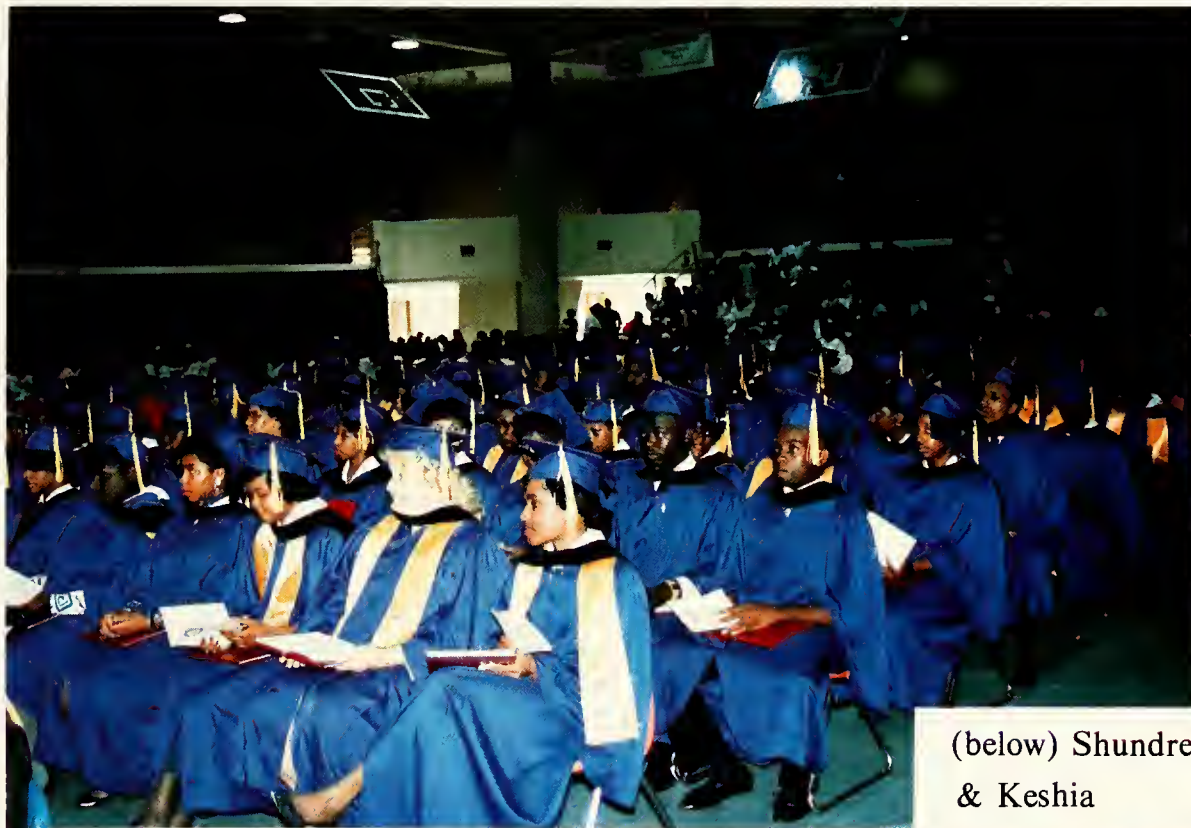

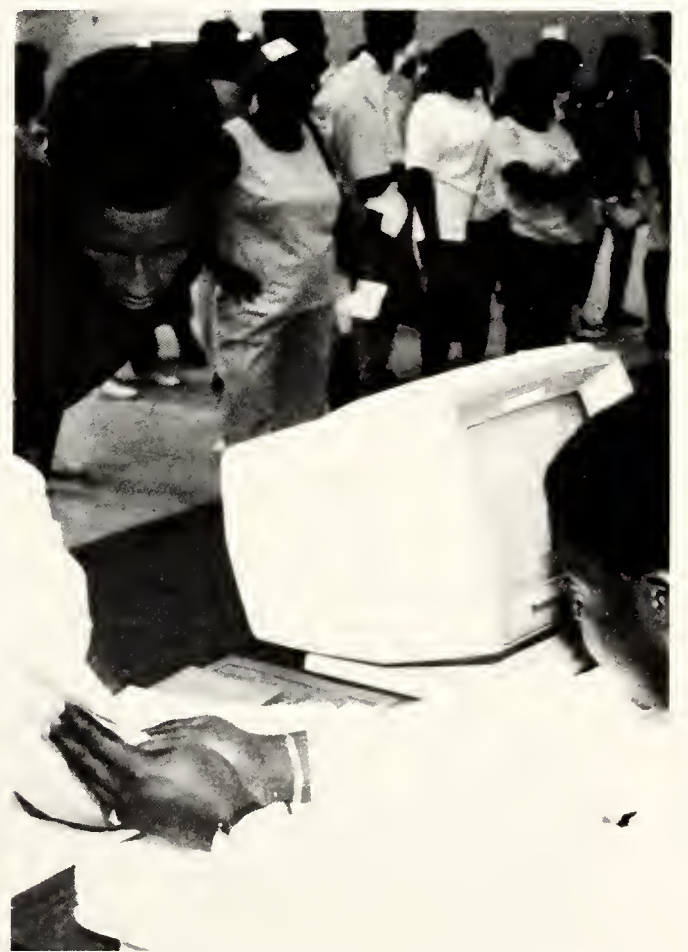

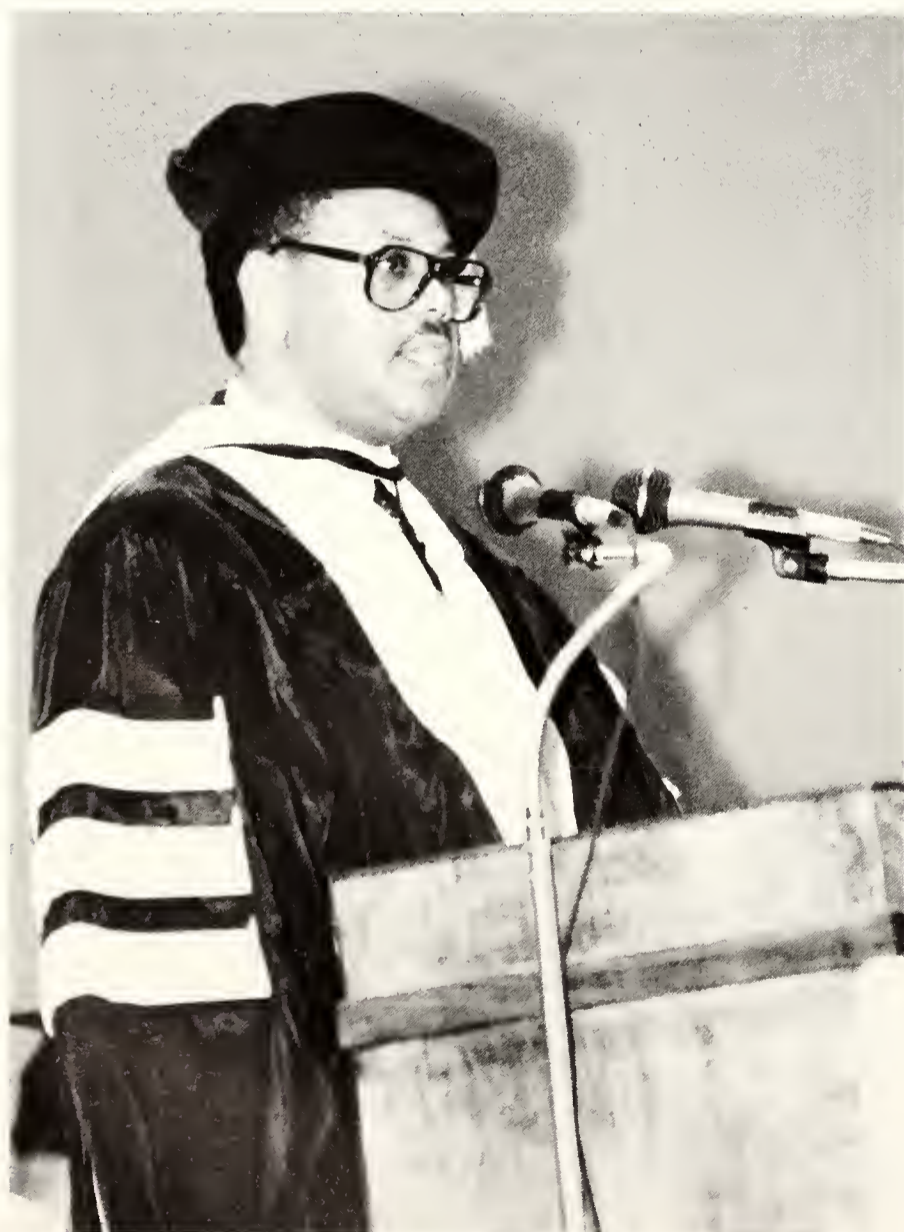

BLACK HISTORY MONTH



On February 16, 1989, in honor of Black History Month, the Utica Campus was inspired by the words of Martin Luther King, III, son of slain civil rights leader, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Mr. King reminded the audience that mistreatment, abuse and confusion are reasons why Afro-Americans are behind today. 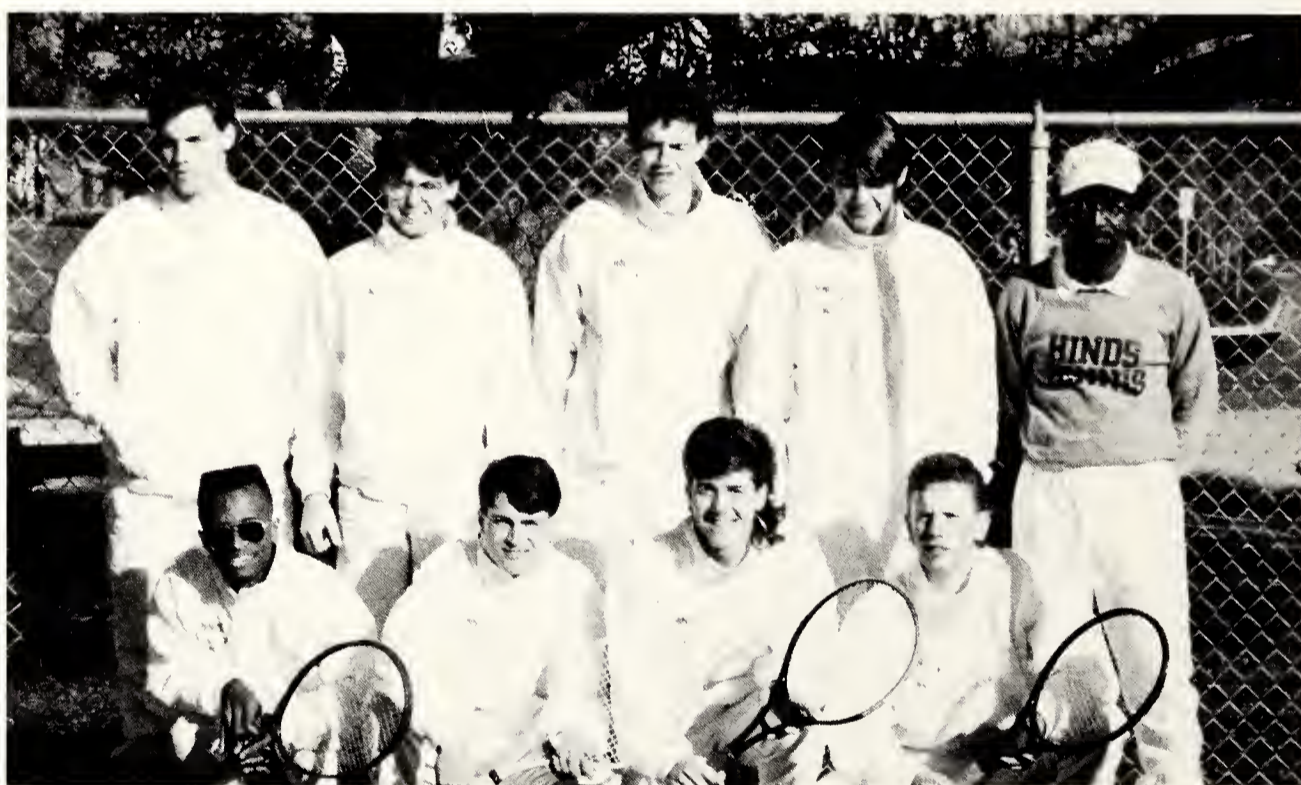

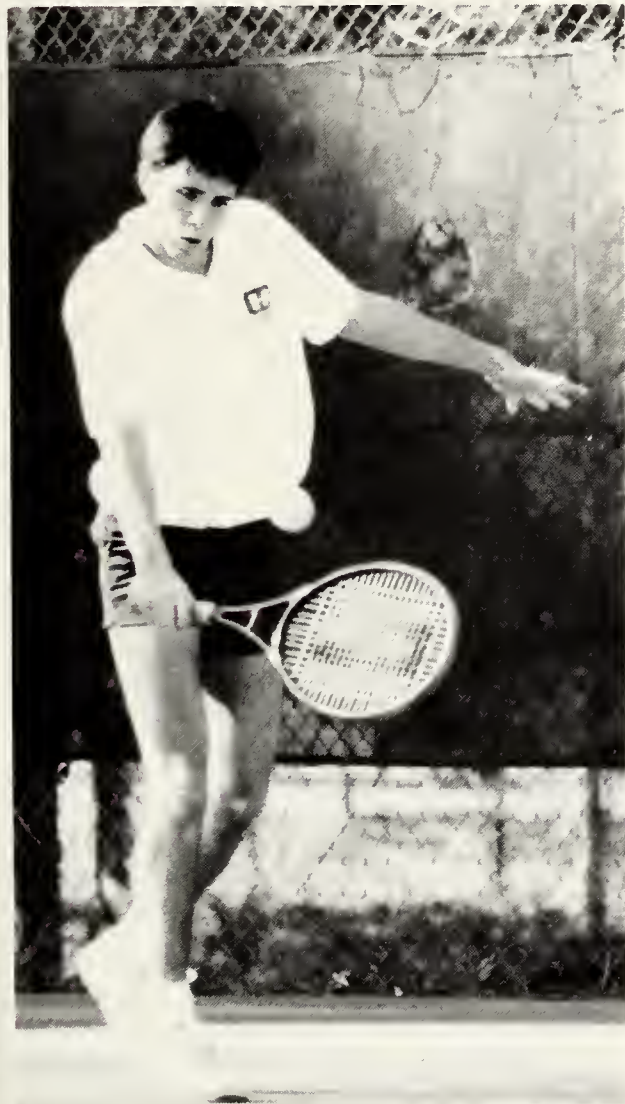

In 1989, Hinds baseball set a Mississippi community and junior college precedent when it became the first Mississippi baseball team to participate in the NJCAA JUCO World Series.

Finishing the season with a 40-14 overall record, Hinds made its way to the national tournament by winning the 1989 State Championship and then capturing the Region 23 title as well. The Region 23 victory put the Eagles on the road to the Eastern District Tournament in South Carolina. Snagging that title, the team headed for Grand Junction, Colorado where they shared the national JUCO baseball spotlight.

Coach Rick Clarke was named the 1989 State and Region 23 Coach of the Year and also holds the distinction of Eastern District Coach of the Year. The Baseball Eagles have been South Division champs since 1986 and were State champions in 1987, in addition to the team's current titles.

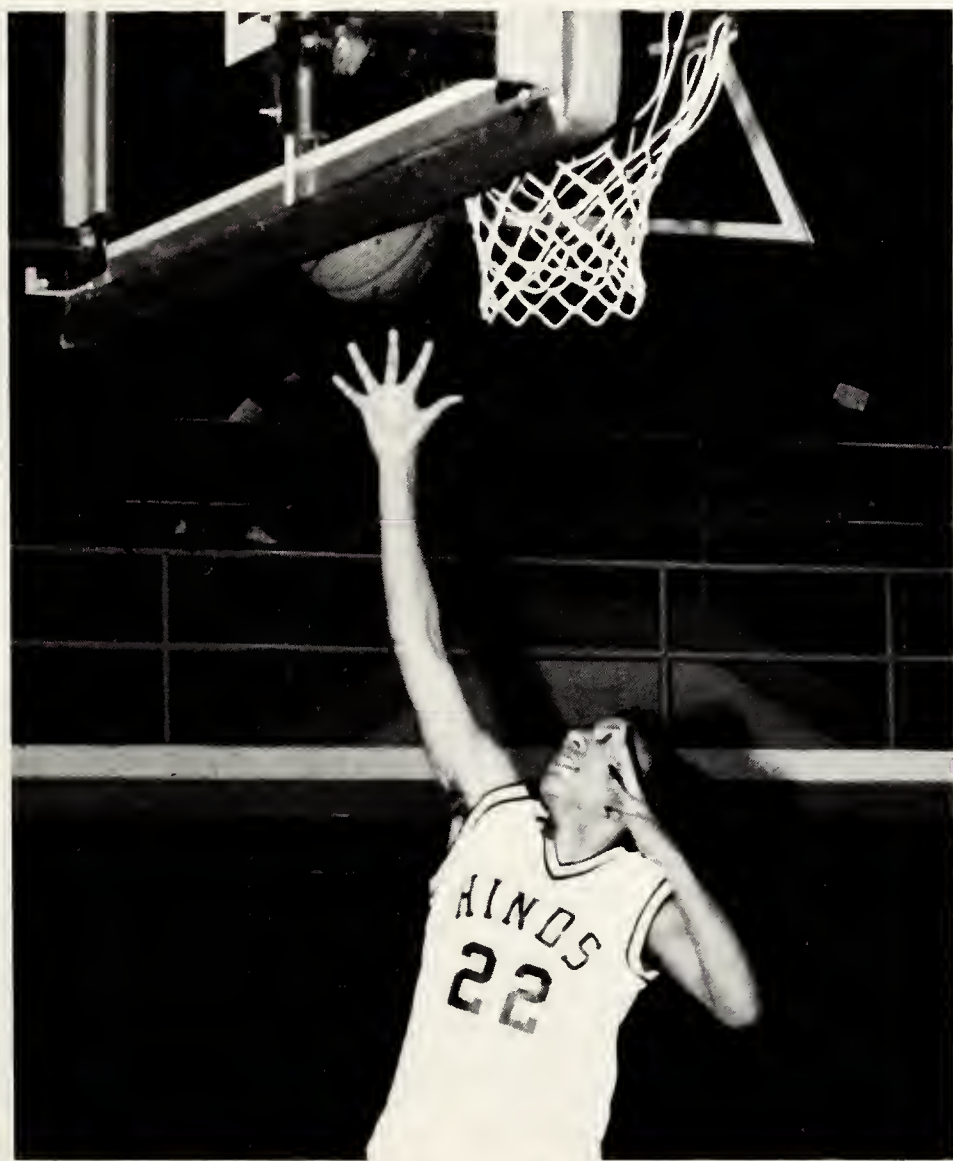

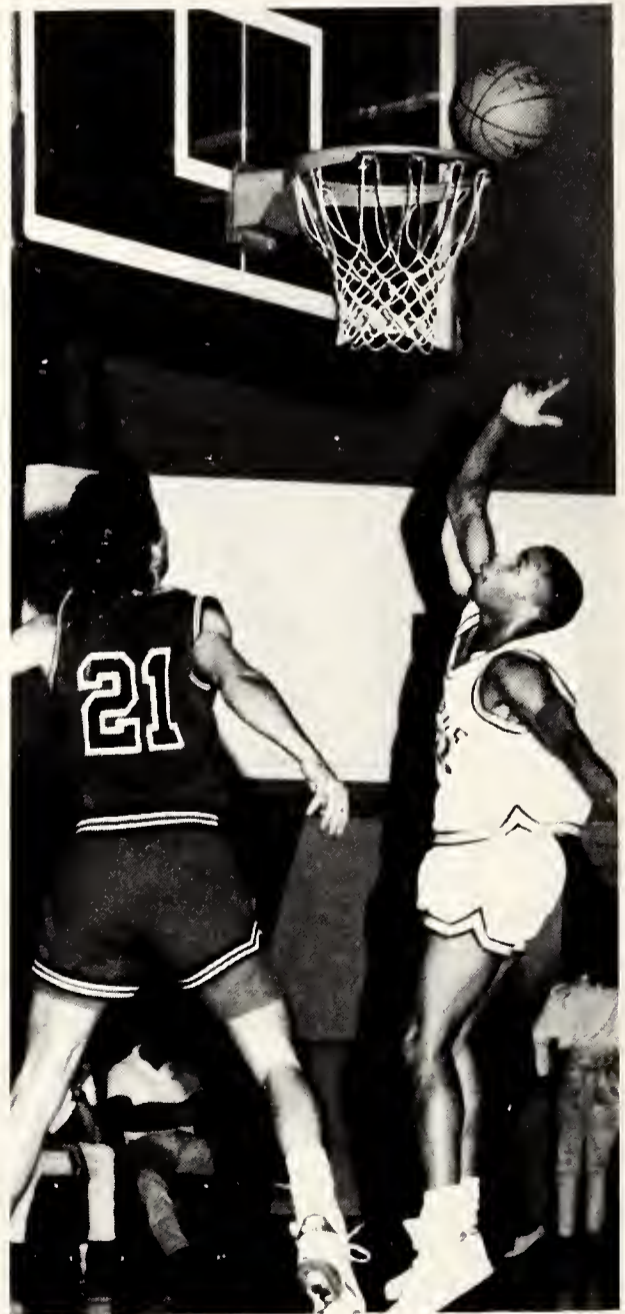

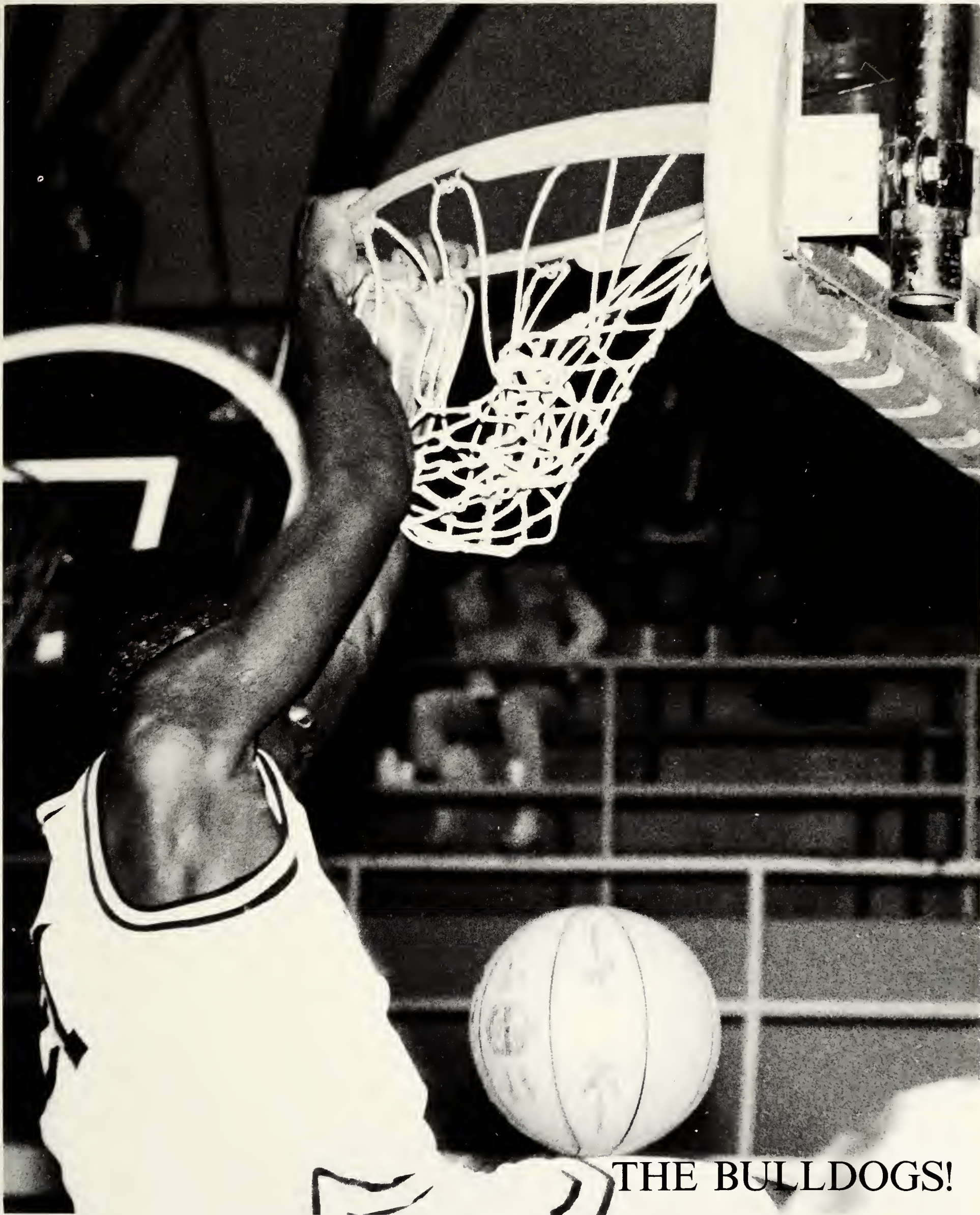

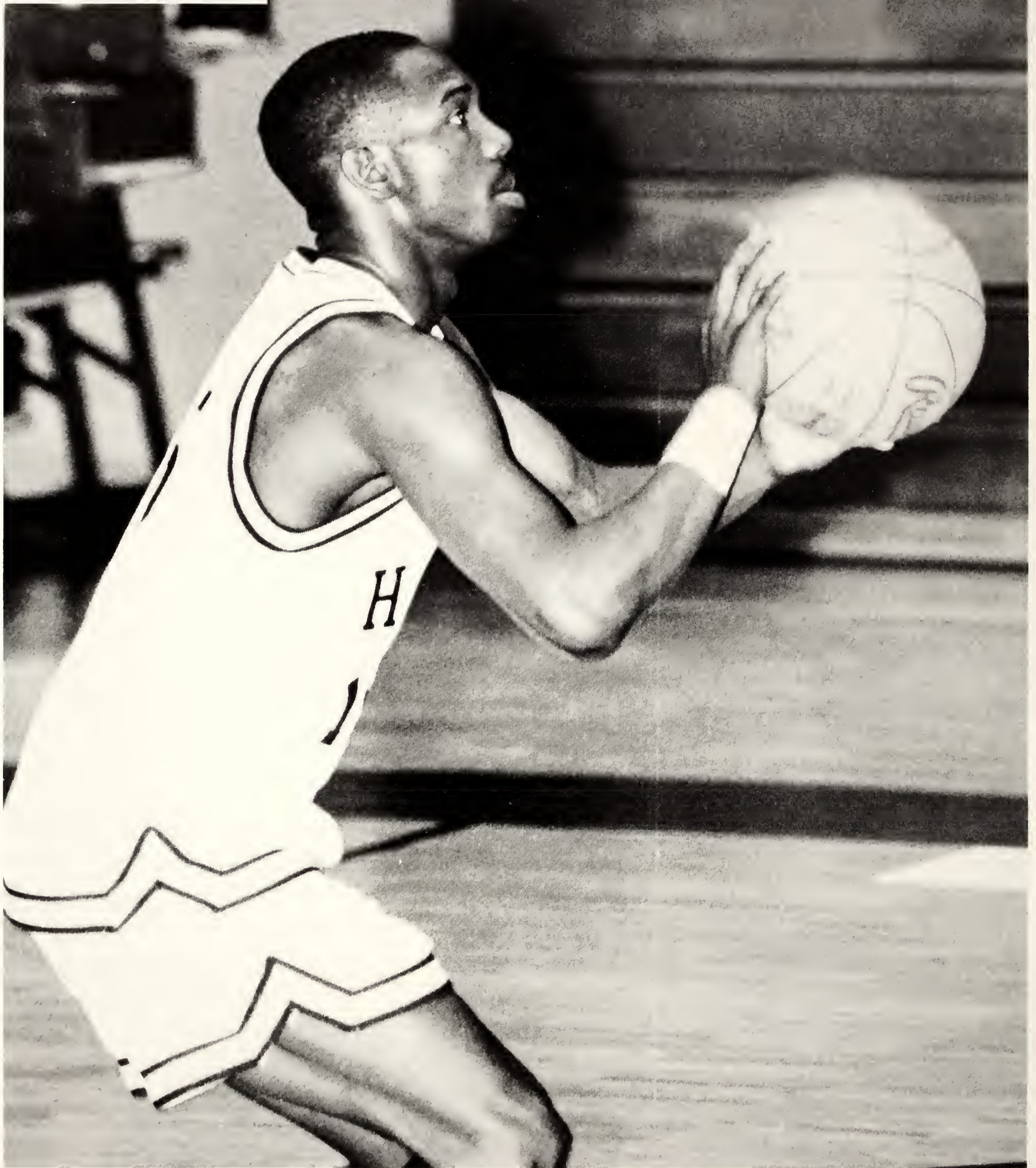

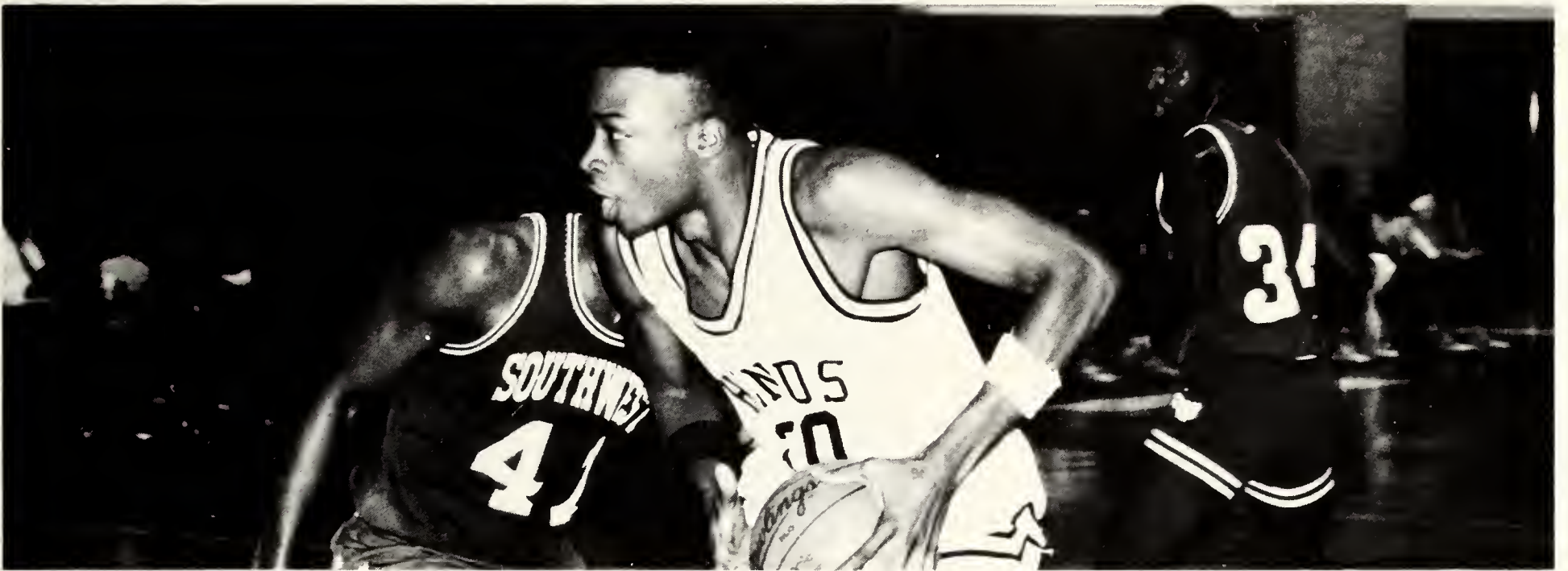
