



















IN CELEBRATION OF A KING

Four years ago, 1986, then president, Ronald Reagan declared Dr. Martin Luther King's birthday a public legal holiday. Many schools and businesses throughout Mississippi and the United States closed shop in recognition of Dr. King's birthday on January 15. The Hinds Community College District, however, remained opened. This year the MS NAACP called for a boycott of schools and businesses that refused to close on Dr. King's birthday. As a result, many students stayed home.

Operating under the Hinds Community College District umbrella, the Utica Campus, however, planned a general assembly honoring the slain civil rights leader. Dr. Ora Stanton, a member of the HCC Board of Trustees, delivered the keynote address. Her topic was, "The Life and Times of Dr. Martin Lu-

In 1989, Hinds baseball set a Mississippi community and junior college precedent when it became the first Mississippi baseball team to participate in the NJCAA JUCO

World Series. Finishing the season with a 40-14 overall record, Hinds made its way to the national tournament by winning the 1989 State Championship and then capturing the Region 23 title as well. The Region 23 victory put the Eagles on the road to the Eastern District Tournament in South Carolina. 














Whitley gets an assist as Robins powers up for two points.
