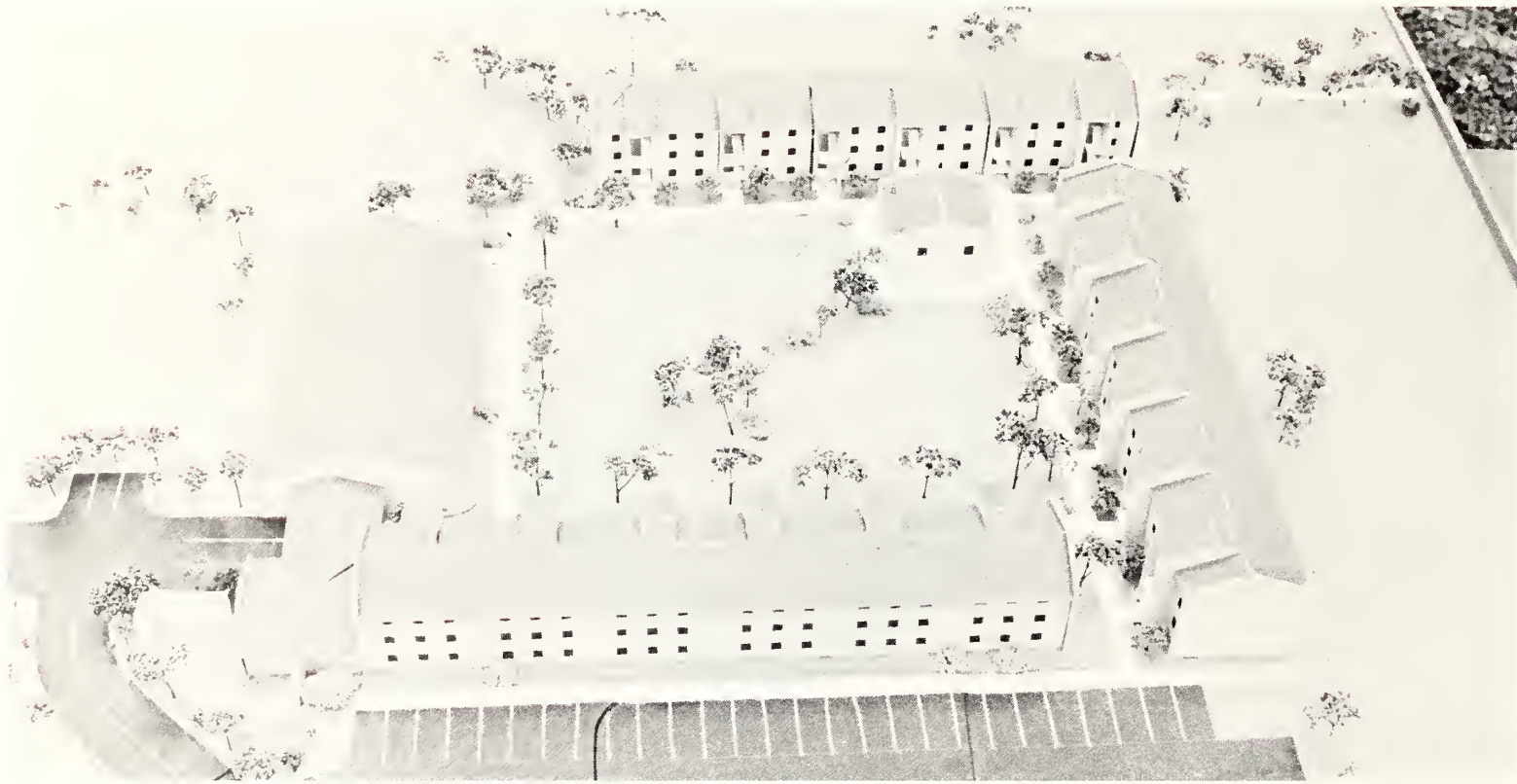
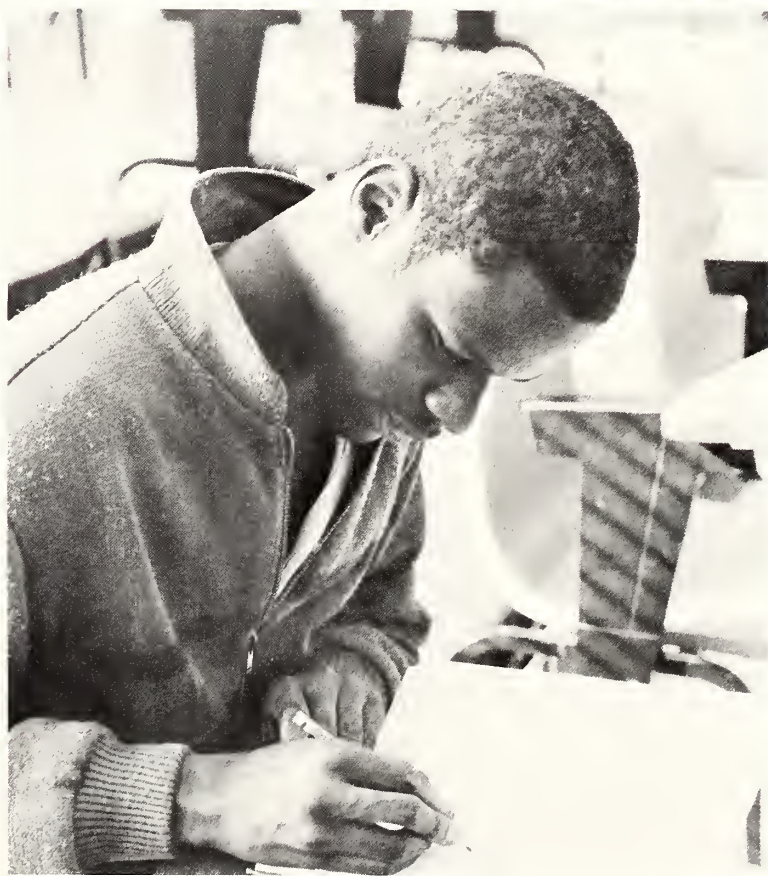

WORD PROCESSING

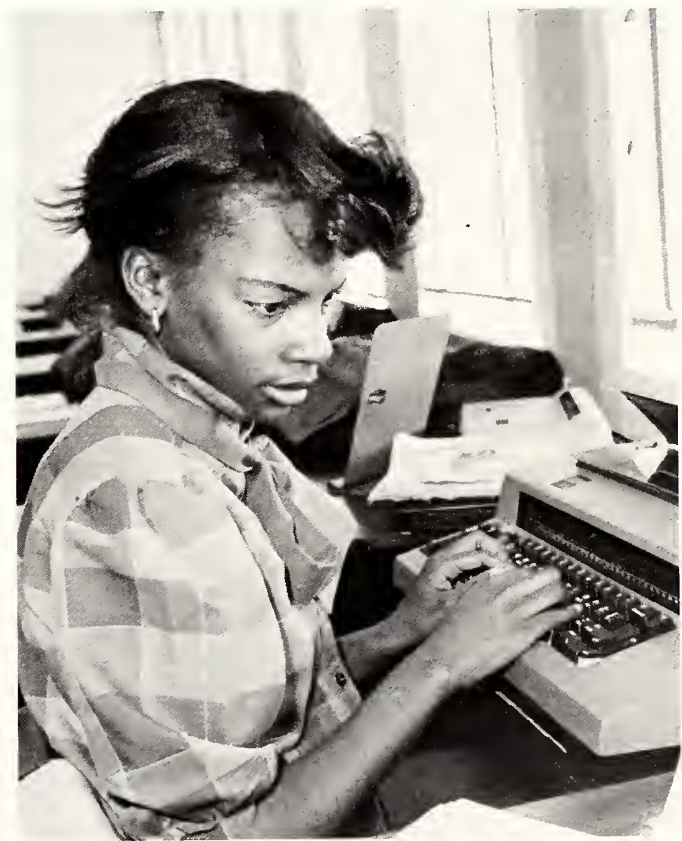


Using the IBM personal computer, Mary achieves mass productions of business documents through a systematic approach.

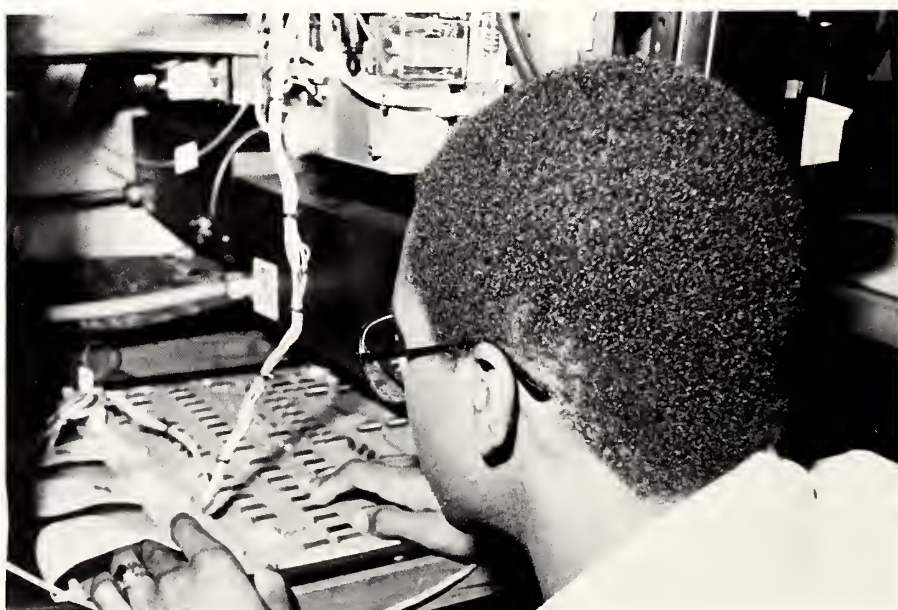

MACHINE SHOP

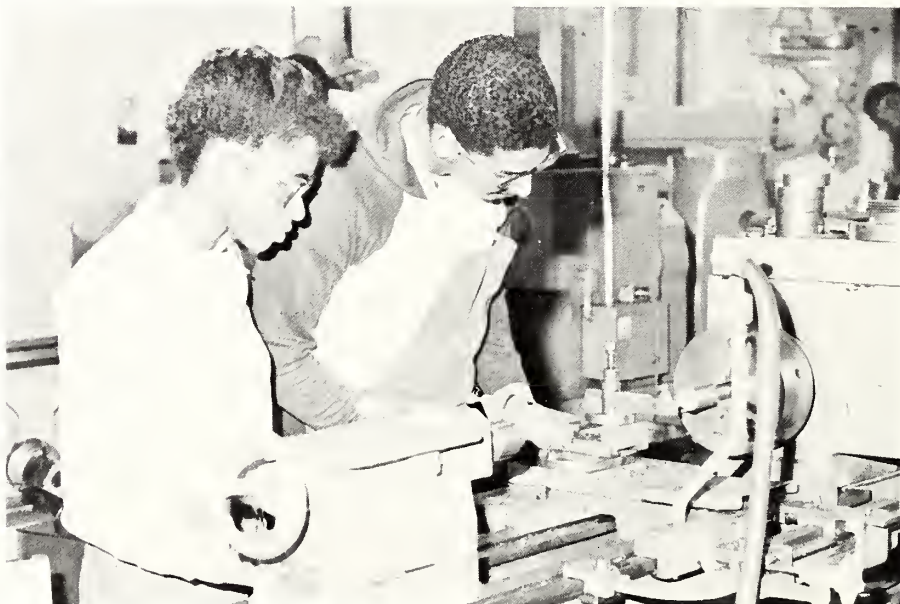

This program prepares students for the above mentioned jobs through theory and practice in tape control, metal working, surface grinding, lathes, end mill, and welding. A tool kit is required.

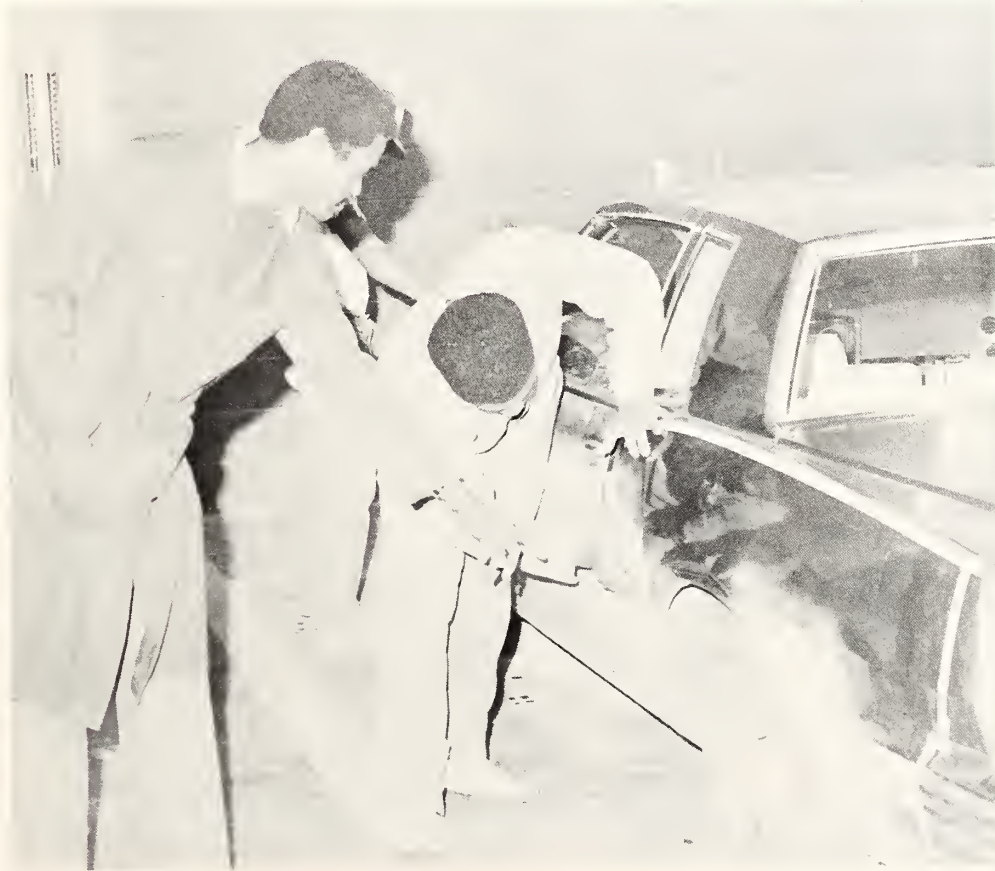

ART SHOW



THE ART

A painting is not necessarily an imitation of nature. Art is an outward expression of an artist's perceived reality and is, in a sense, an abstraction of the reality of Nature.

Pablo Picasso arranged different views of a three-dimensional world in a simultaneous manner on a two-dimensional surface. Furthermore, Picasso flattened those recognizable three-dimensional forms, in a departure from his predecessors, to emphasize the two-dimensional quality of the canvas, and, in doing so, influenced every artist to follow.

The paintings and sculpture of Wardell Jackson exhibit some of Picasso's ideas and influence through his use of the overlapping planes, forms, and simultaneous perspective. A careful study of Wardell's work indicates a growing and progressive concern with similar thoughts of Picasso.

A consideration of the color used in Wardell's paintings, however, shows a movement from a subtle use to one that is more dramatic and exciting. This dramatic color use is the inward reality of Wardell Jackson beginning to surface. Art is that use of the inner reality through color that marks Wardell Jackson a true artist.

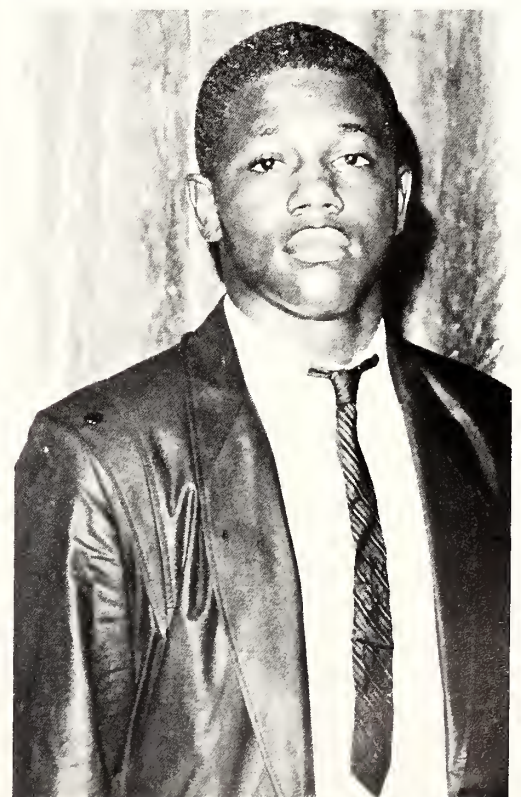
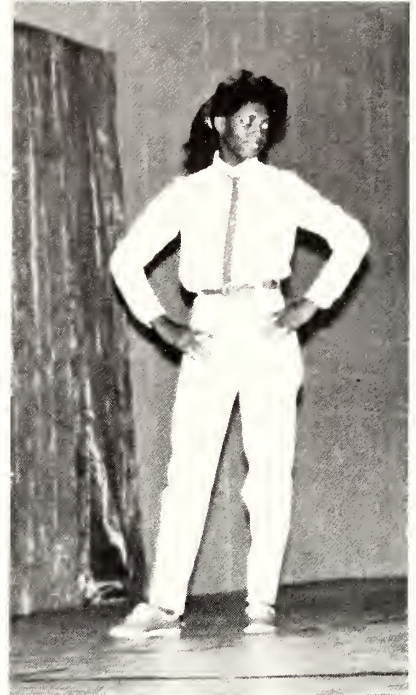
First Runner-Up

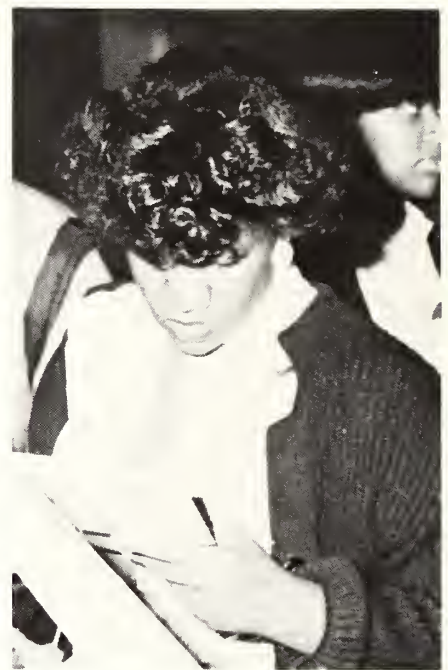

SENIOR DAY AT UTICA

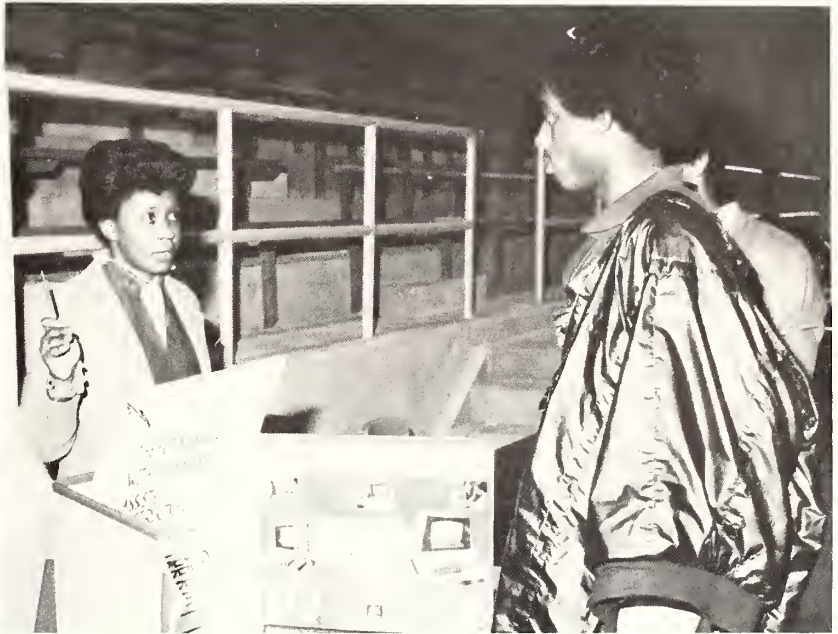

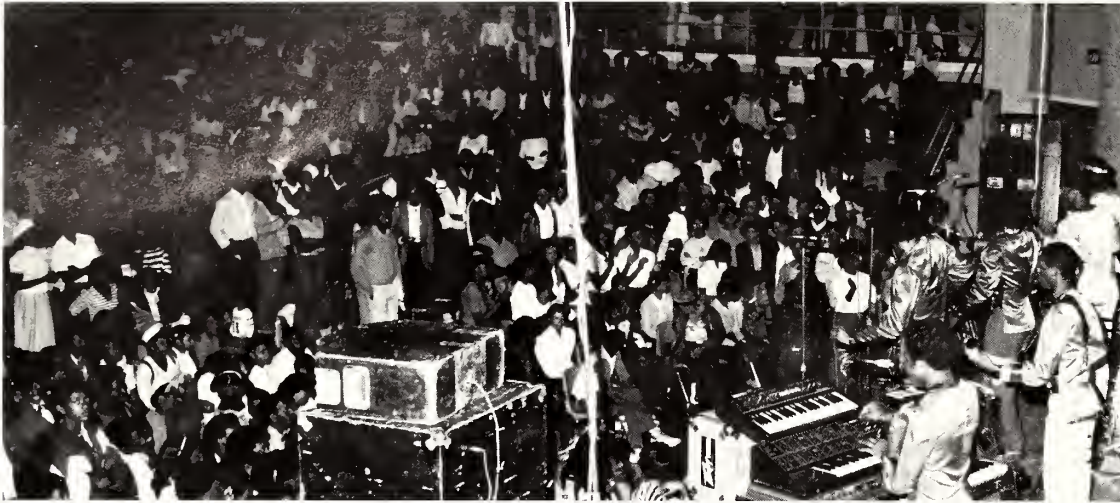

FIRST OF ITS KIND



Ground breaking ceremonies for a three-million dollar dormitory complex was held at the Utica Campus of the Hinds Junior College District May 15, 1983. These will be the first dormitories since Utica's inception in 1903.

This project was made possible by a grant from the Housing and Urban Development Program.

The long-needed dormitory construction on the Utica Campus will house approximately 350 residents. The three-story complex will feature living quarters, offices, a banquet area and a cafeteria. Completion date is scheduled for the Fall of 1984.

NUMBER 1 MEN'S SINGLES—STEPHEN LEE



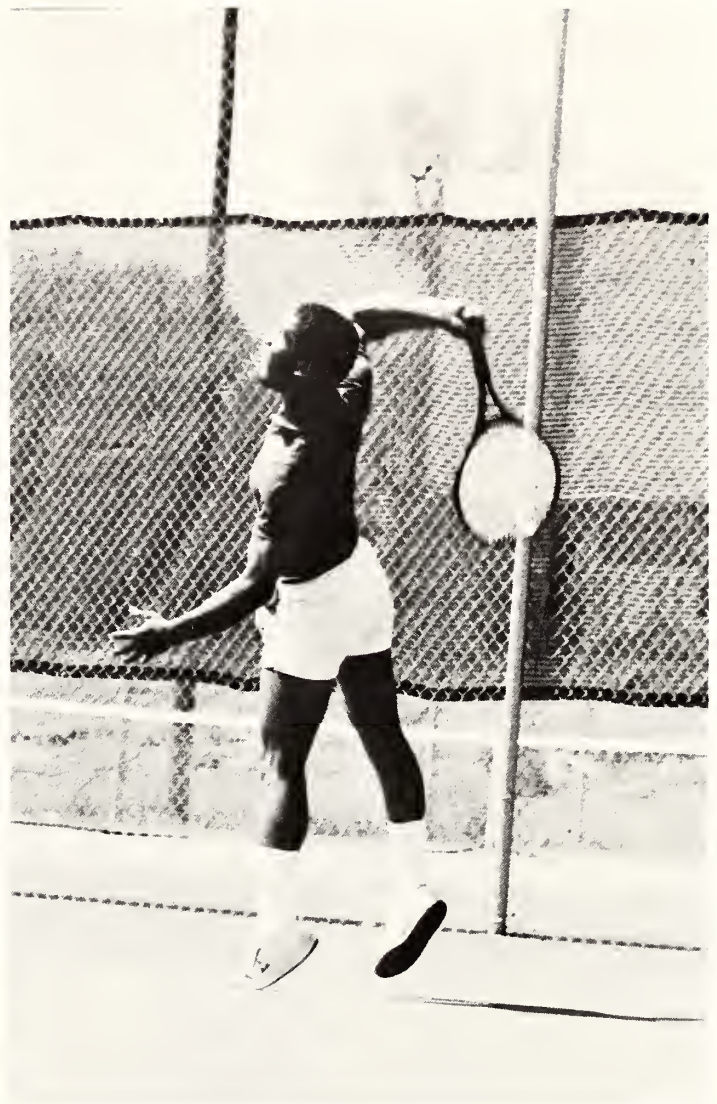

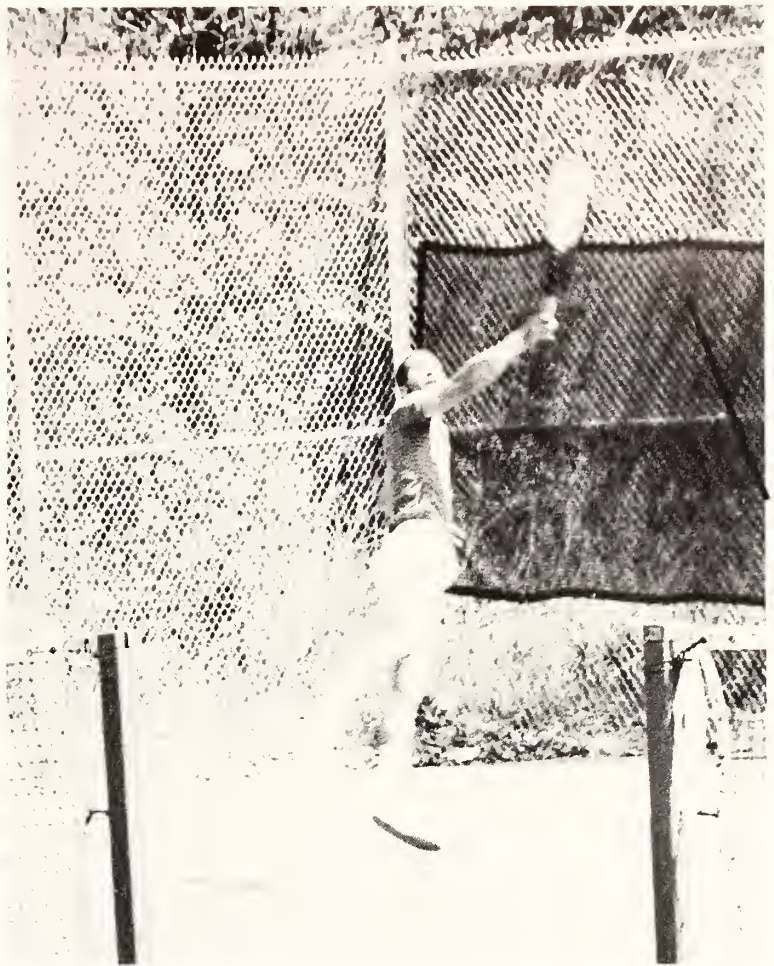

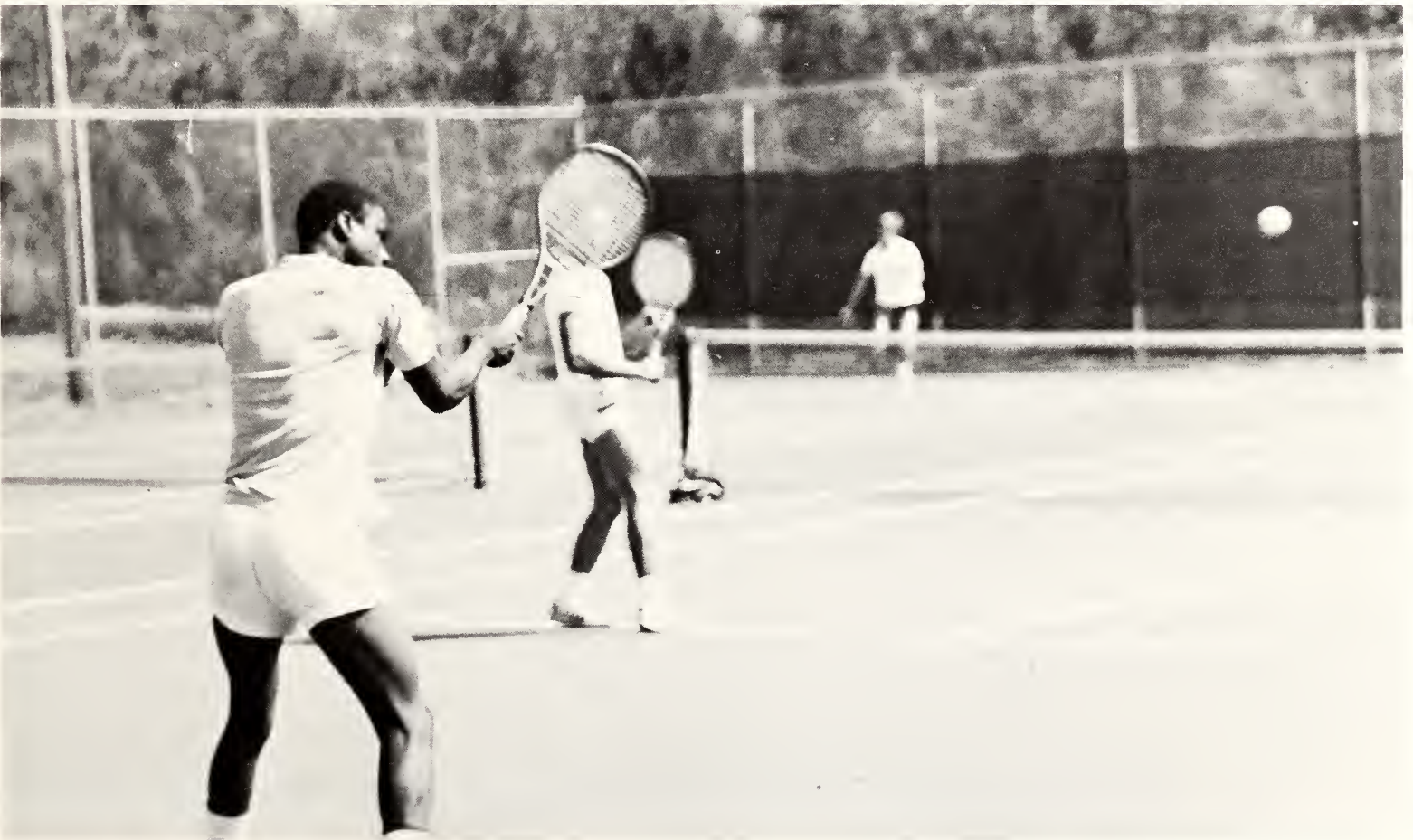

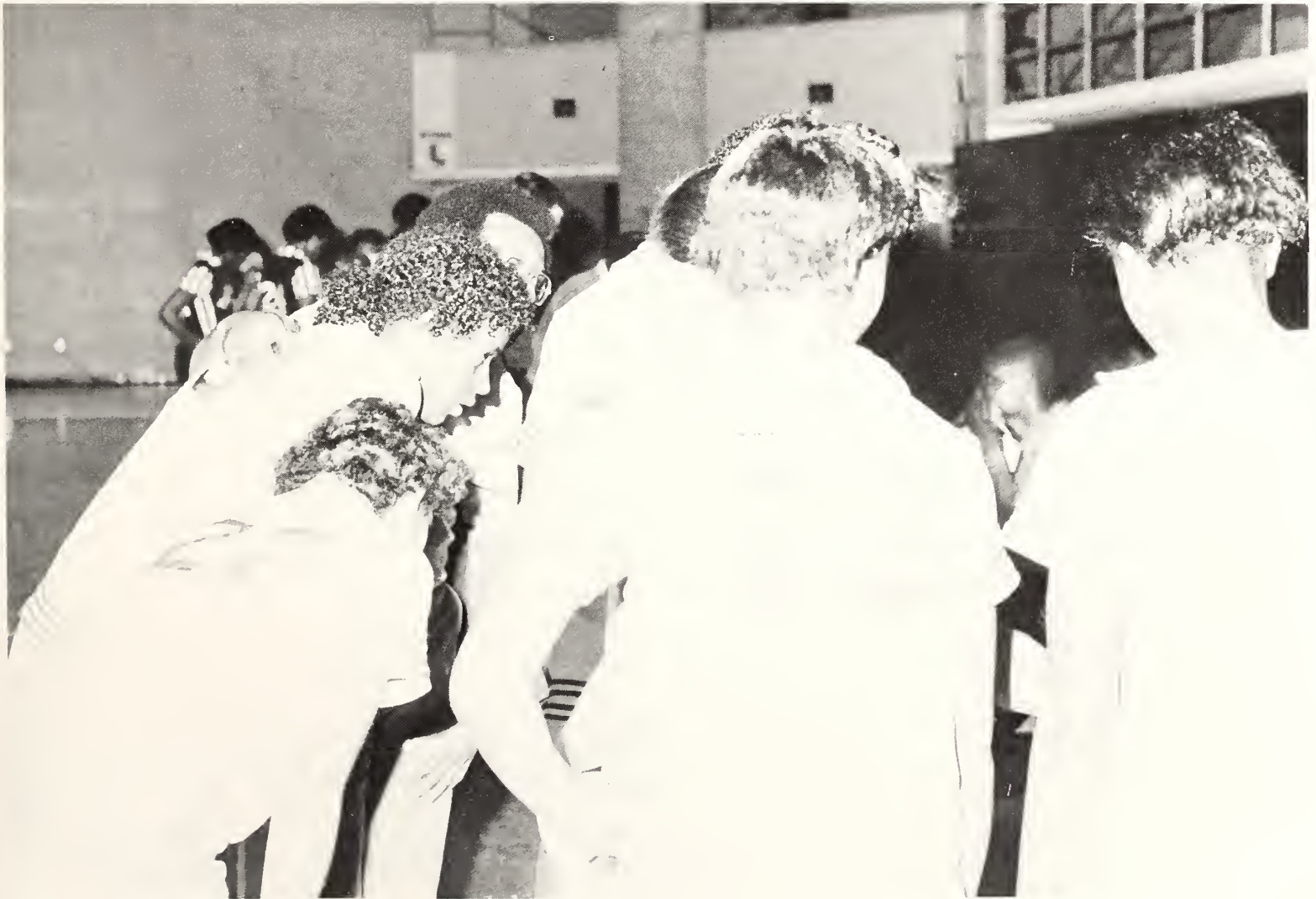

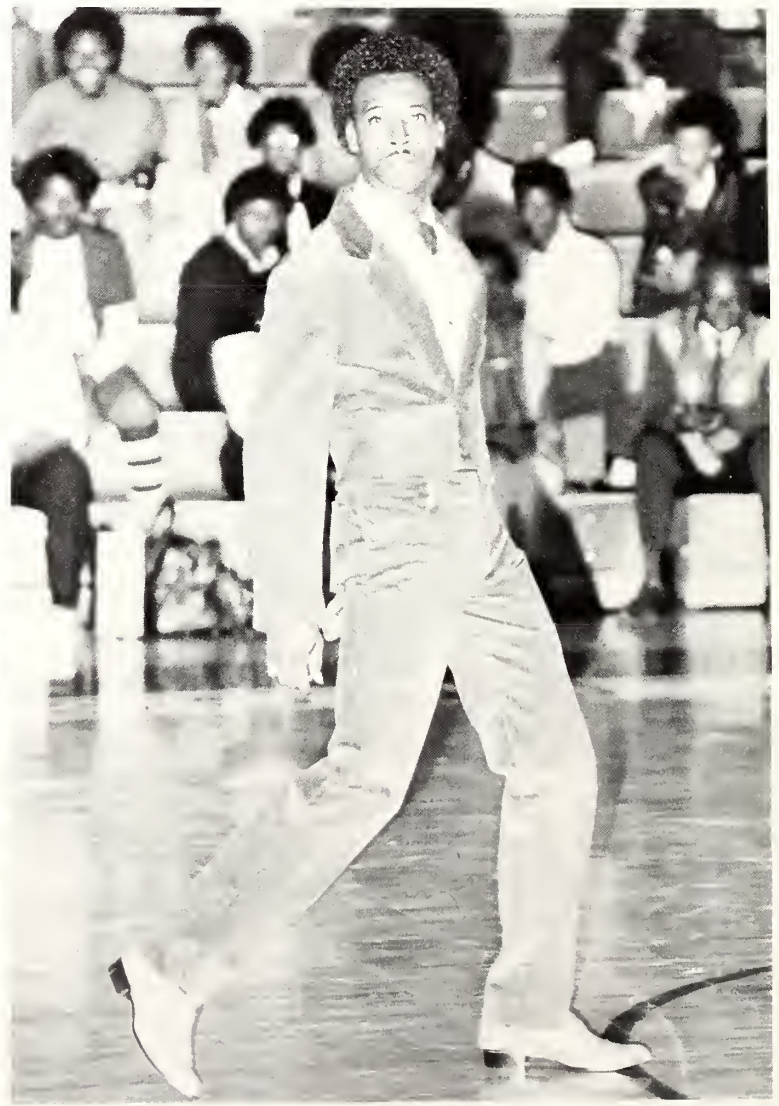

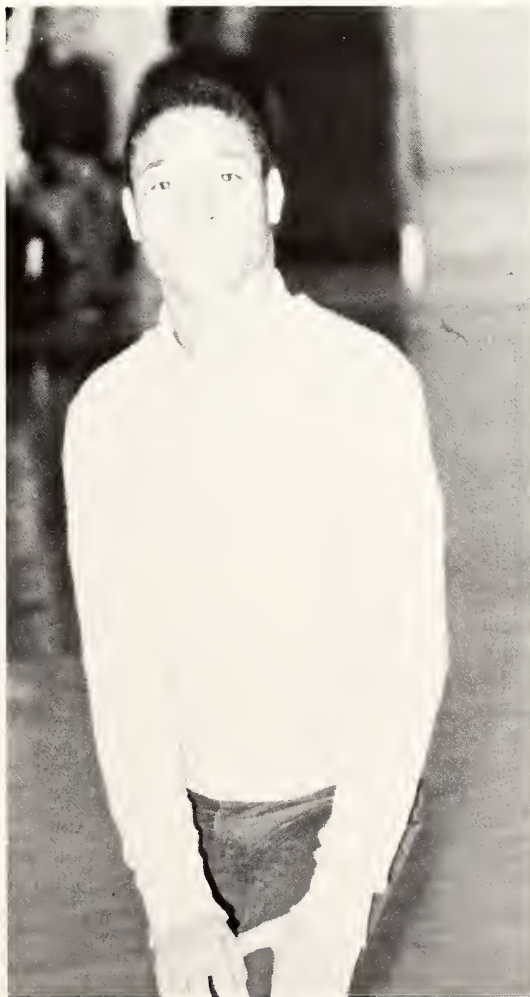
